CARBON FIRE DESTROYS TWO SCHOOL BUSES

The Carbon Schols lost buses and equipment in excess of \$50,000 in Saturday morning's blaze at a bus barn.

Arson is suspected in the fire, and charges have been filed against Richard Lewis, 17, and Dale Griffin, 17, both of Carbon, and Jack Adams of Eastland. They have been released on \$5,000 bond, according to District Attorney Emory Walton.

Supt. Marshall Hickman has stated the 3 a. m. fire destroyed two school buses, heavily damaged another bus and slightly damaged a fourth in the bus barn and shop fire.

Also in the bus barn was a six-wheel military vehicle, used as a winch truck, which also was destroyed.

Added to the loss was a metal shed containing a riding and self-propelled mower, air compressor, grinder and other shop equipment.

Hickman said Woodrow Mangum, a nearby resident, was awakened shortly before 3 a. m. and called the fire department and the school supt.

"Mr. Mangum drove one bus to safety, and Delbert Smith braved the smoke to save two," Hickman said. "If it hadn't been for these two gentlemen, everything would have been destroyed."

Supt. Hickman stated that school had not been interrupted by the fire.

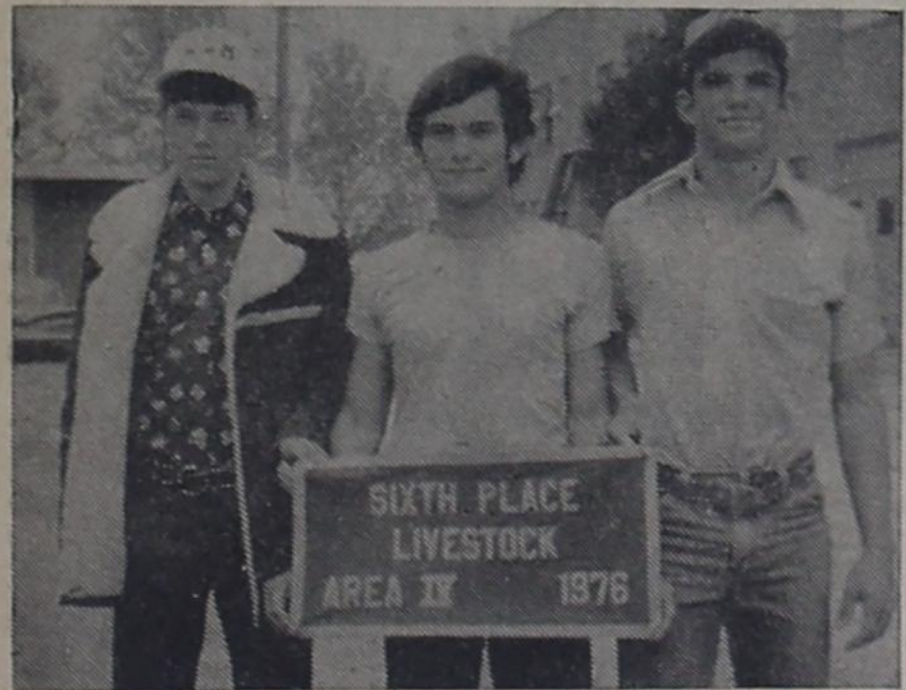

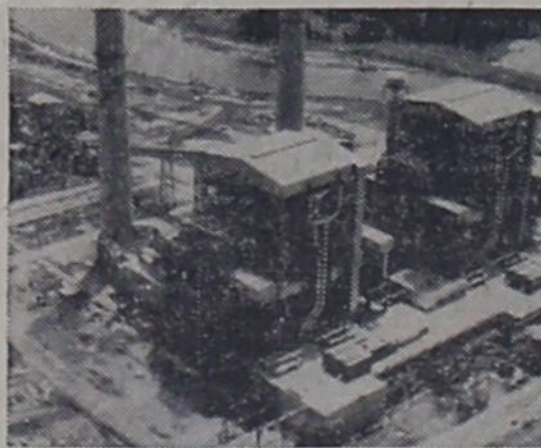

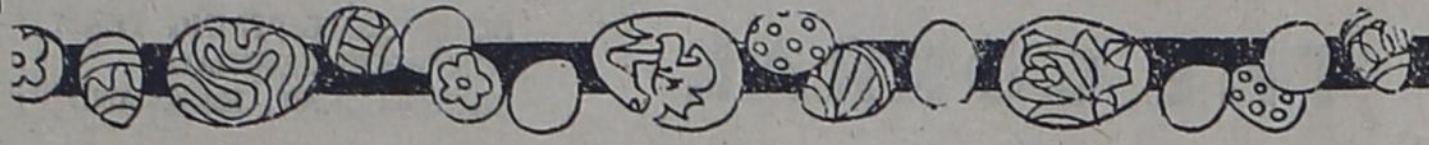
