## Peanut Growers Protest Labeling By Butz As 'Vicious Little Lobby'

Washington, D. C. — "Peanut growers are not a 'vicious little lobby' as Secretary Butz has been referring to us—we are honest farmers producing a wholesome product and we are here to protest his efforts to wreck a farm program which has served both farmers and consumers well over near 40 years," a group of peanut producers told a House Agriculture Subcommittee here.

"We reject H.R. 12808. It is not a producer bill and it is not supported by the rank and file of producers. It is a Ford-Butz plan and it would be a wrongful, unwarranted and backward step," said the producer spokesman appearing before the Oilseeds and Rice Subcommittee.

"It is not the nature of the peanut support program itself which has resulted in the advance in costs from \$3 million in 1972 to \$150 million in 1974," Reuben L. Johnson, director of legislative services for National Farmers Union, told the Subcommittee. "It is the way in which the program has been mal-administered in the past two years in order to inflate its costs and force its termination."

"If the supply management provisions of the program had been used effectively, the cost of the peanut program could have continued to be very nominal."

But Johnson warned that an open-ended planting program could be even more costly to the federal government than the existing program, citing the reality that the fiscal 1977 federal budget for USDA will have to be enlarged by \$128 million because of the adoption of an open-ended planting program on rice for 1976.

The NFU spokesman said that the consideration of a new peanut stabilization program should be left to 1977 as part of a comprehensive new farm and food policy.

"It does not make sense to adopt as a stopgap this year, an open-ended program which could not be part of a viable long-term stabilization program for peanuts," he said.

Appearing with Johnson at the committee hearing was A. Jack Hall, of Windsor, Va., speaking for the Virginia peanut producing area. He said that if H.R. 12808 is approved, the peanut program is at an end. A double-price standard, coupled with open-end production will bring boom-and-bust prices which will disrupt the normal stable market situation which has prevailed under the traditional program. Congress should also consider the sources of opposition to the present program before it takes action, Hall said.

Texas Farmers Union members participating in the hearing were Eldon Brauchle and Clyde Finch, both of Charlotte Texas.

The Farmers Union testimony also placed in the hearing record a statement opposing H.R.12808 adopted at a meeting of peanut producers from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, held in Sherman, Texas in February.

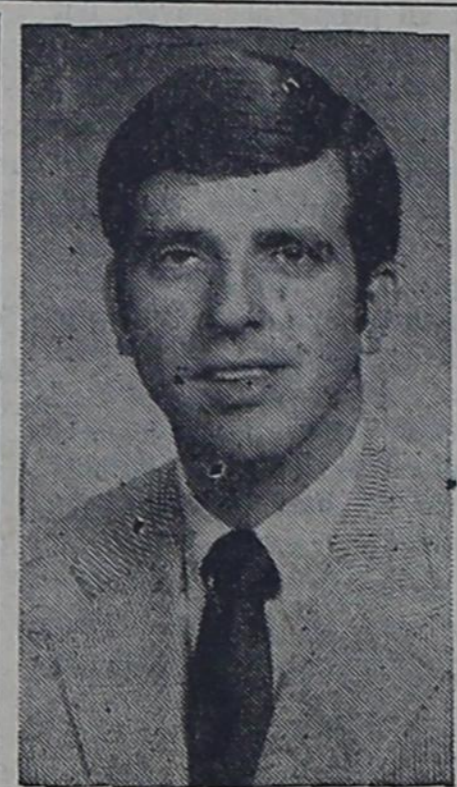
Following the parade, Mr. Burleson will be honored at a public reception to be held in the lobby of Cisco's First National Bank between 10:45 and 11:45 a. m.

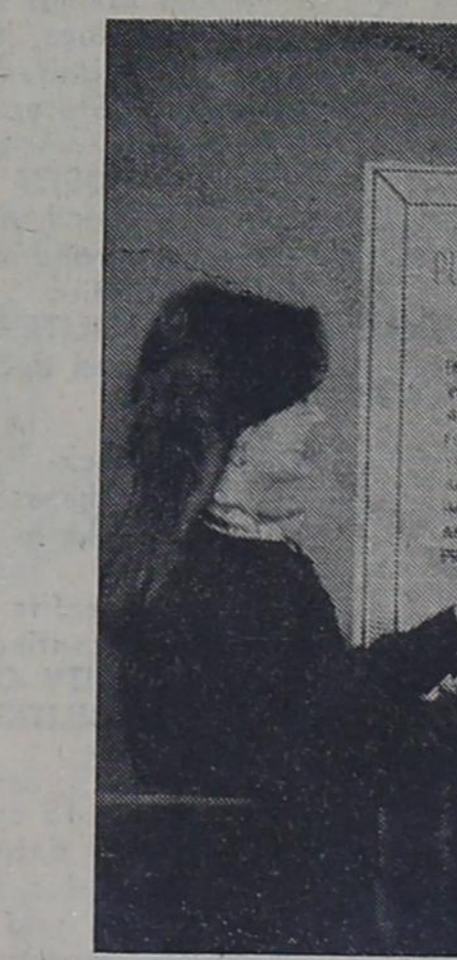

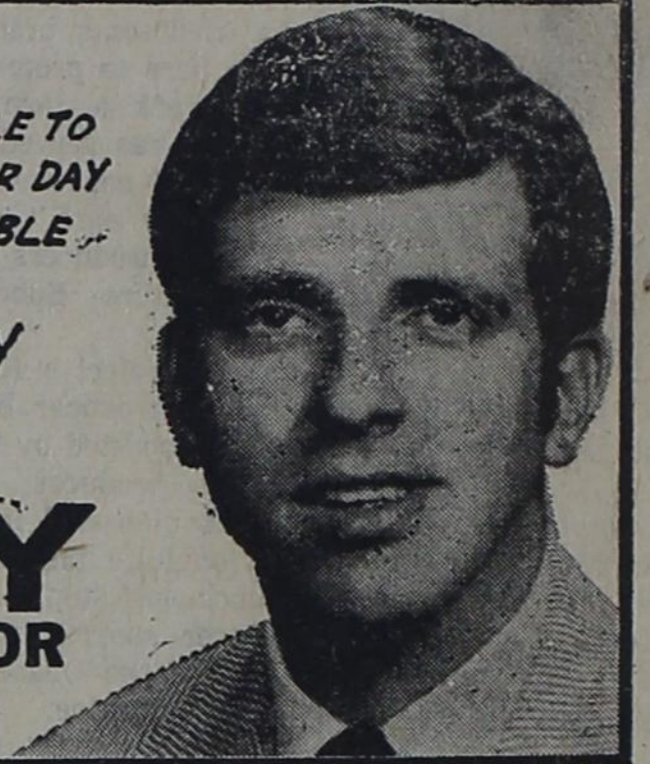

# As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE BARRAGE OF LETTERS, TELEGRAMS and petitions against the proposal, officially entitled the "Child and Family Services Act", is proving effective. For the time at least it is bottled up in both House and Senate Committees. Hopefully it will remain there.

A SIMILAR BILL WAS BEFORE THE CONGRESS in 1972 and was the subject of this release on August 3 of that year. (Should anyone

wish a "re-run" of that article please let me know.) SOME INFORMATION BEING CIRCULATED ACROSS THE COUNTRY is not entirely accurate concerning the provisions of this proposal but it is bad enough without exaggeration. If enacted, when HEW got through issuing rules and regulations it might be about like some of the things being said about it. The Bill itself says that the service shall be given only to the children "whose parents request them" but should the bureaucracy get its hands on this it might not be recognizable in operation.

IN THE FIRST PLACE IT WOULD DUPLICATE AN enormous complex of authorities and programs already

financed by Federal funds at a cost of more than \$13 billion a year. This measure would set up yet another layer of bureaucracy at a cost of \$1 billion a year.

IN THIS SPACE IN 1972 WE SAID, "... THE ASSUMPTION of those who promote and support these ideas seems to be that an institution, run by an impersonalized staff,

can substitute for parental love and care.

"AS DR. ERNEST VAN DEN HAAG, NEW YORK UNIVERSITY psychoanalyst testified, 'the assumption that social science has as yet produced a tested theory of child rearing is sheer fantasy. Only a few variables have been de-

tected and they suggest that family care should be encouraged, not replaced.'

"NO ONE ARGUES THAT THERE IS NOT A NEED for remedial services for disadvantaged and neglected children. There are programs already in effect for this purpose. The whole concept appears to be that the Government and its agents know how to provide 'healthful and stimulating development' of children. Dr. Van Den Haag further testified: 'If the government has such knowledge it is a well kept secret of which the scientific community is quite unaware.'

"MR. GEORGE GILDER IN A RECENTLY PUBLISHED ARTICLE had this to say: 'When these havens (family and home) are eliminated, where does one go to find love and individual affirmation — to be accepted for who one is, rather than for what one does or how much money one makes? Where can one find meaning and a sense of the future — of human transcendence? Not in a day-care center, I trust.'

THE CONCEPT OF COMMUNAL CHILD REARING is alien to America and would deeply affect the traditional values found in the family unit.

# Bentsen Seeks to Halt Closing of Small Post Offices

Washington, D. C. — Senator Lloyd Bentsen Wednesday said any legislation providing Federal aid to the U. S. Postal Service should bar post office closings for a two or three year period.

Bentsen wrote Senator Gale McGee, Chairman of the Senate Post Office Committee, after Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar testified before the Committee this week that more postal cutbacks will be necessary unless Congress acts within two to four months.

"I do not think Congress should approve additional aid for the U. S. Postal Service without requiring postal officials to drop their plans to close rural post offices," Bentsen said in his letter to McGee.

"I urge that any legislation authorizing such aid include a prohibition against further reductions in mail service to rural areas for two or three years, giving Congress time to investigate the Postal Service and pass remedial legislation if necessary."

Senator Bentsen pointed out to McGee that reductions in mail service would be especially harmful to Texas. Proposed shutdowns of 3rd and 4th class post offices threaten more than 600 post offices in rural areas and small towns in Texas.

Bentsen has already introduced legislation requiring the Postal Service to take into account the number of families served by a post office, its nearness to other post offices and the amount of travel required to reach the alternate facilities before it could close a post office.

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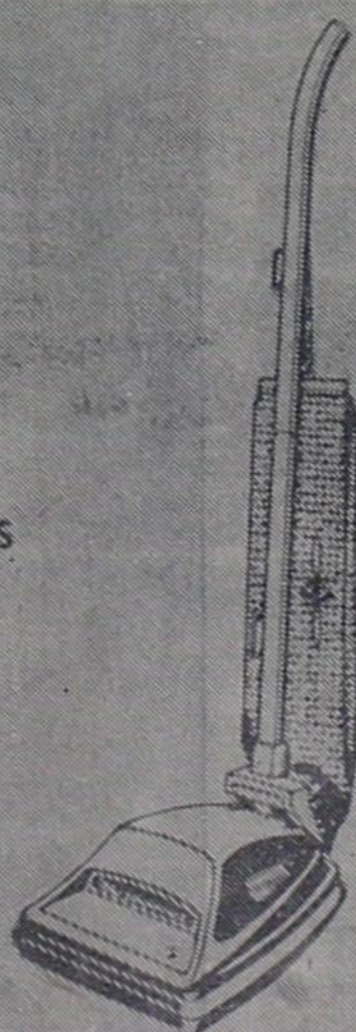

We have been able to do this and to take care of the precinct work, despite the heavy financial and organization problems that resulted when the county was redivided, and the precinct, both as to finances and working force, is in good shape.

The experience that I have had in dealing with these difficult problems is something I hope you will consider when you cast your vote for the man you want to represent you as Commissioner during the next four years. You should consider, especially, that your Commissioner, under the present county set-up, is really a minority of one, on the Commissioners Court. He must content with the urban interests of the three northern precincts of the county and he will need the best experience and the strongest persuasion possible to serve you to the best advantage.

It is a man-sized job and I hope you think I am man enough to do it. If so, I will appreciate your vote and influence in the primary next month.

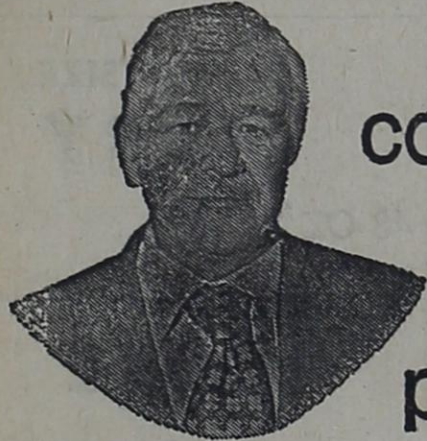

If your children want to fly kites, be sure they fly them in an open area well away from any overhead power lines. And never try to rescue a kite from a power line or pole. Call us instead.

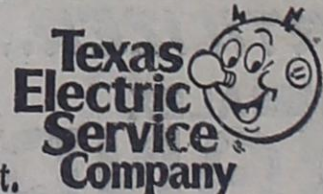
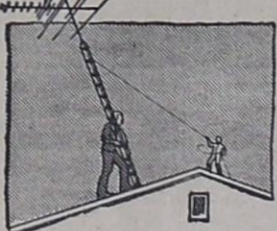
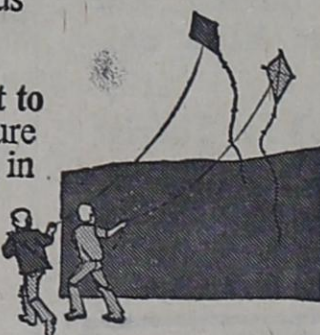
If you're installing a new television or CB antenna, be sure enough distance is allowed so that even a falling antenna would miss the power line. Don't try to

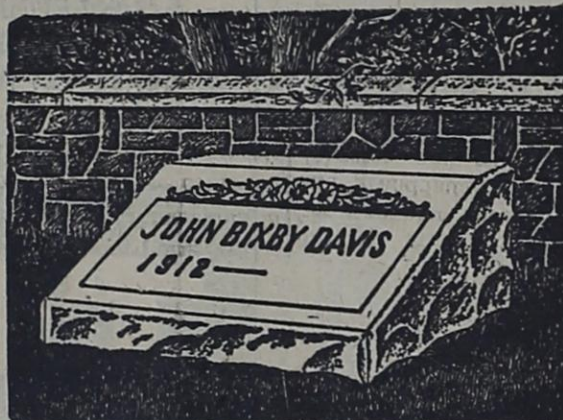
