## Nation Looking at First Presidential Preference Vote

The whole nation is going to be looking at Texas as it holds its first (and probably last) presidential preference vote in connection with the party primaries next Saturday.

The Democrats will find a combination English - Latin American ballot when the polls open at 7 a. m. Saturday at the nine county precinct voting spots.

Three presidential hopefuls each have three delegates on the ballots as well as one set of totally uncommitted group of three delegates.

Statewide Gov. Dolph Briscoe and others are urging that voters check all three of the Lloyd Bentsen delegates in order to insure a strong leadership for Sen. Bentsen and Gov. Briscoe at the New York Democratic Convention in June. In Eastland County, Mike Collins, is one of the Bentsen delegate nominees.

It's true that Bentsen is a dropout of the presidential race, but his leadership of the Texas delegation is considered necessary in the wide-open convention where he and his delegates could be, if not kings, then at least king-makers.

Therefore, Bentsen is being considered the Texas favorite son, even though delegate nominees for Wallace, and Carter also appear on the ballot.

Further down, voters find the races:

Incumbent Bentsen opposed by Leon Dugi, Hugh Wilson and strongest of all, Phil Gramin for the United States Senate seat.

Cong. Omar Burleson of the 17th District is for the first time in a while unopposed for re-election.

It's a horse race in the railroad commission race where eight (count 'em) include Jerry Sadler (former land commissioner), R. R. Williams, Lane Denton, Robert (Bob) Wood, Woodrow Wilson Bean, Terence L. O'Rourke, David Finney and Jon Newton.

Associate Justice Supreme Court Jack Pope is unopposed.

Charles W. Barrow and Don Yarbrough are vying for Place Two on the top court and James G. Denton is unopposed for Place Three as is John F. Onion, presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

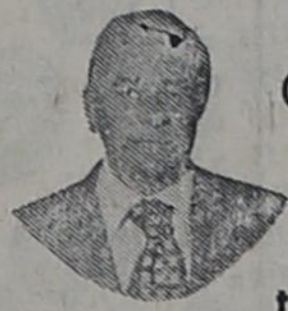

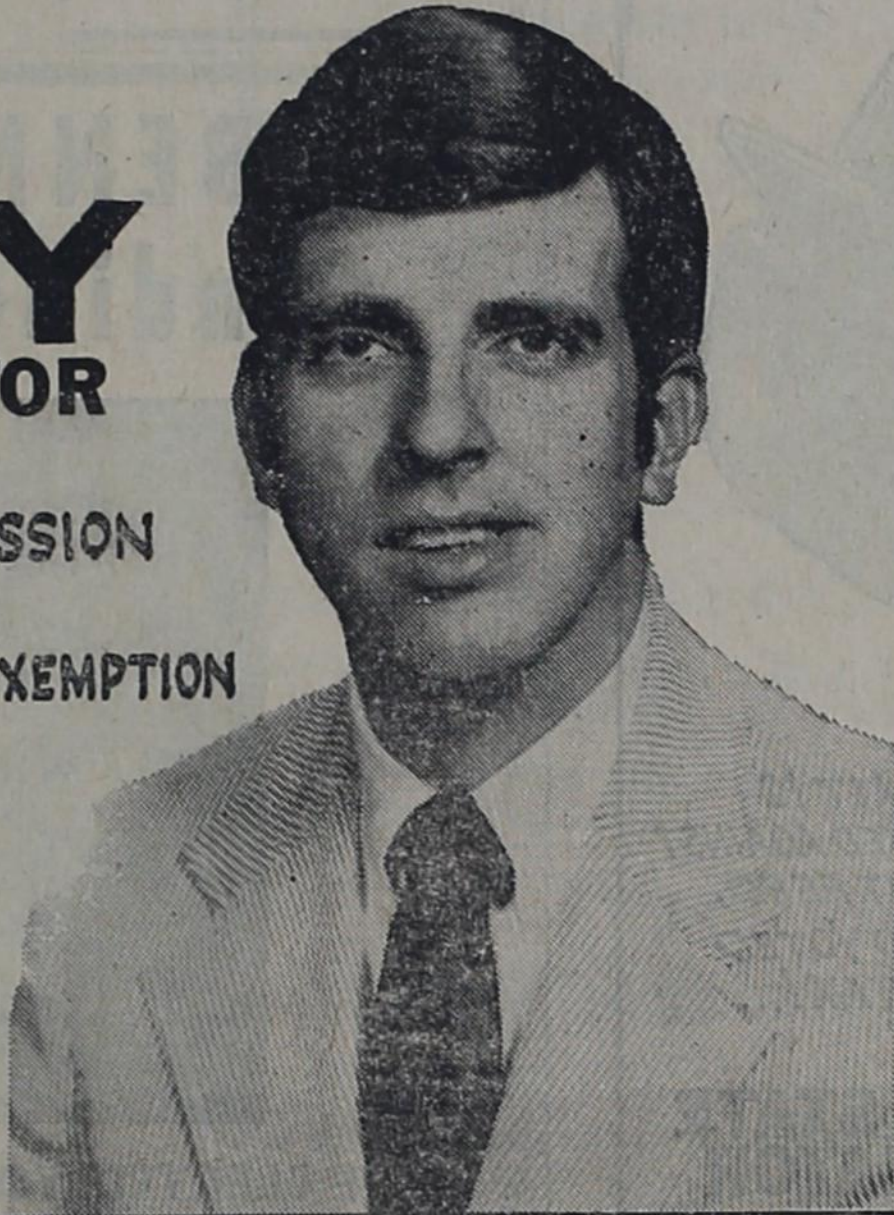

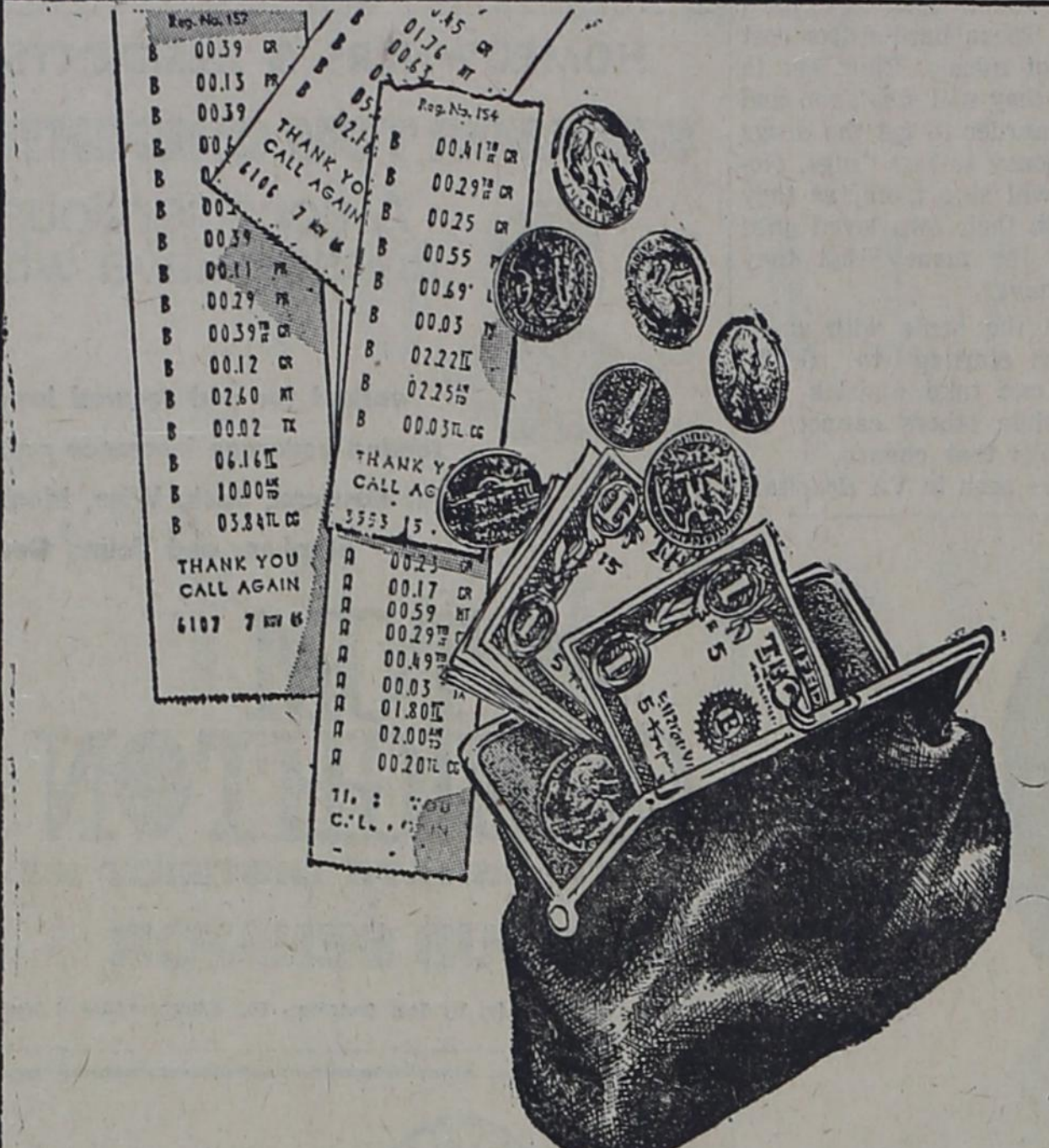

We have been able to do this and to take care of the precinct work, despite the heavy financial and organization problems that resulted when the county was redivided, and the precinct, both as to finances and working force, is in good shape.

The experience that I have had in dealing with these difficult problems is something I hope you will consider when you cast your vote for the man you want to represent you as Commissioner during the next four years. You should consider, especially, that your Commissioner, under the present county set-up, is really a minority of one, on the Commissioners Court. 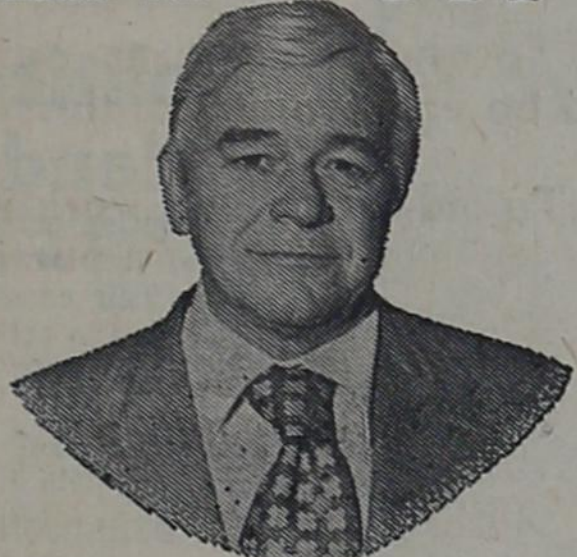

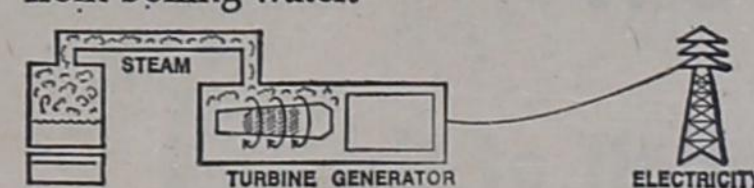

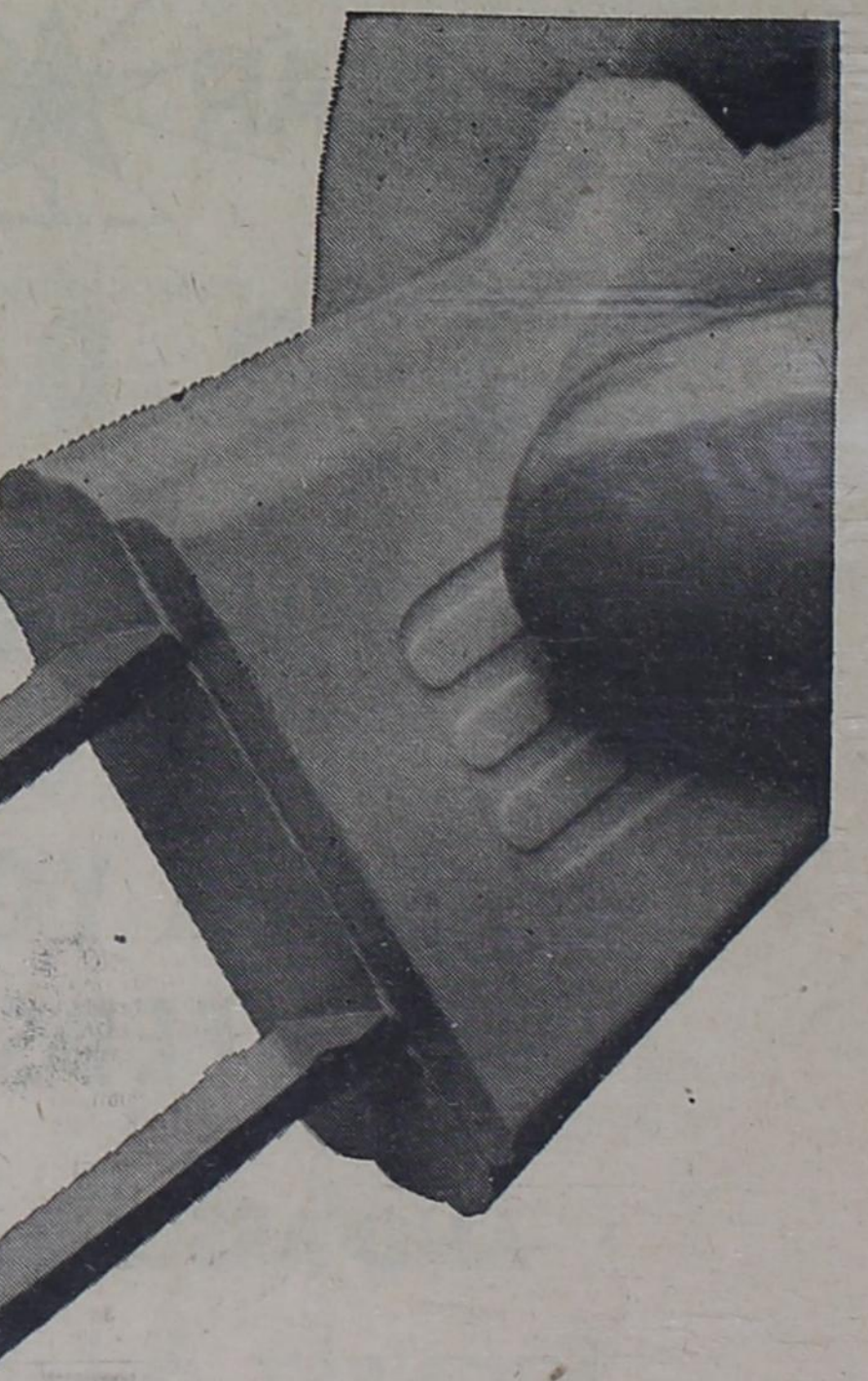

### The Washington Nobody Hears About...

#### Legend and Lore of Bicentennial Era

The tourist attractions of the nation's capital have been praised around the globe ever since the city became a mecca for sightseers. And Washington has often been called every American's second hometown.

But unlike the legend and lore surrounding our own hometowns, visitors to the capital seldom probe beyond the external beauty of its monuments. And there is much to explore. The hard-to-believe but true stories of Washington ghosts and spies. The intriguing behind-the-scenes accounts of its statues. The odd habits of First Ladies.

As we approach the country's 200th birthday, let's examine some of the obscure facts that have molded the history of the capital.

One of the most disturbing of the Capitol ghost stories is that of Major Pierre L'Enfant, the designer of the city. History reveals that this talented engineer was never adequately paid for services he rendered. And he died penniless. His ghost, looking distraught and hungry, resides in the Capitol and wanders about the basement. And every time someone starts making noises about changing the layout of the city or beautifying it in some way, L'Enfant's ghost appears and begins strange and fitful noises.

Ghost stories abound in Washington. Probably the most famous of the Capitol ghosts is the Demon Cat, a large cat that seems to grow until it reaches the size of a panther. Just as it is about to spring, the observer faints or



the cat leaps over his head and out of sight. The Demon seems always to appear just before a national tragedy or a change of administration.

What about statues in the capital? Take the Marquis de Lafayette statue in Lafayette Square. He's the French fellow who helped us in our fight for independence. The statue shows Lafayette holding out a cape-draped arm in tribute to America. At the base of his figure stands a topless female, sword in hand, saluting Lafayette, Pulitzer prize-winning Washington author Constance Green contends that the semihide lady might be saying: "General, give me back my cape, and I'll give you your sword."

About First Ladies? There's a lot to say. How about President Polk's bride, for instance.

She frowned on dancing in the White House and for years after she left the custom was not revived. Or Mrs. Rutherford B. Hayes, who refused to serve alcoholic beverages in the White House. Her state dinners were described by the press as events where the "water flowed like champagne." Silent Cal Coolidge's wife, Grace, was regarded for her education, gaiety and humor. At the very staid inaugural parade, a constituent belated "God Bless the Coolidges!" Grace turned around in the presidential box and shouted back: "He has!"

**Public Law 93:641  
Could Close  
Rural Hospitals**

The Administrator, Richard Arnold, of Blackwell Hospital recently received from the Hubbard Lake Hospital Group Inc. and Northeast Texas Health Advisory Group a news release which brings out the fact that the Blackwell Hospital could be faced with very serious cutbacks in service even to the point of not being able to stay open due to the passage of PL-93-461, otherwise known as The Federal Health Planning and Resource Development Act of 1974.

The release reads as follows: Title: "Do You Know Public Law 93:641?"

The provisions in the law for establishing "primary care" (meaning simple care only) hospitals will mean the end of rural hospitals as you know them. You, the patient, are going to lose your right to choose your hospital and doctor.

(1) The law proposes an experimental plan creating a two-level system of medical care. The people in rural areas, in order to receive advanced or more sophisticated care, would have to go to the cities as the rural areas would only have "primary care" hospitals.

(2) The law specifically singles out centers for such things as obstetrics (delivery of babies), pediatrics, coronary care, intensive care, etc. The development of these centers for these specialized areas will deprive the rural population of good medical care at the local level.

(3) There are no medical studies showing that this two-level system of medical care will result in better care for people. Russia, according to a recent medical journal, does have a similar system that is not working for people in rural areas.

(4) The proposed law, when it becomes fully operational, will make it very inconvenient for the people of rural areas that wish to go with sick members of their families to a medical center many miles from their home town. This will result in a loss of income to families who have family members who are critically ill.

(5) The people will lose their freedom of choice of hospital and physician.

(6) Our nursing homes in rural areas will be unable to function properly without the nearby medical support of both physician and hospital.

(7) The proposed moving of patients to centers in the large cities will reduce the income of rural hospitals. Even a 10 percent reduction in income will force the rural hospital to lay off many people. This reduction in trained personnel will cause the hospital to discontinue many of the advanced services it now offers.

(8) Good doctors will not stay in an area of "primary care". They will move to where the centers are located in the cities, and the young doctors will not be attracted to the "first aid care only" atmosphere of a rural hospital practice.

(9) The proposed system will not save money, which is supposed to be the purpose of the law. According to the Federal Register the average routine cost for the rural hospital in Texas is \$68.00 per day compared to a large hospital in Texas which has an average routine cost of \$83.00 per day.

(10) The ruins of the health care system which remain for

Misinterpreted**

Washington, D. C. — The Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare has informed Senator Lloyd Bentsen that, contrary to some reports, the Health Planning and Resources Development Act does not call for concentrating hospital services in urban areas.

Bentsen had written H.E.W. Secretary Mathews earlier this month expressing concern about reports that the law "will close rural hospital in Texas or change them into primary care facilities."

"We very much share your concern over the adequacy of health care facilities and services in the rural areas," Mathews said in his reply today.

Mathews said the first priority stated in the Health Planning and Resources Development Act, in fact, "singles out rural areas for special attention."

"Clearly, regionalizing all hospital service in urban areas would run directly counter to these Federal initiatives and priorities."

"As we understand this Act of Congress, it was in no way designed to work the kind of hardships on rural areas which are so gravely feared by those in rural Texas who have also communicated these concerns directly to the Department," Mathews said.

"We cannot support any approach which would adversely affect the ability of rural areas to maintain adequate health care services and the requisite health care facilities."

"Please also be assured that the implementation of this Act is intended to be conducted locally in a fully open manner and in such a way as to provide for consultation with the citizens of the area, their providers of health care, and local officials," Secretary Mathews said in his letter to Senator Bentsen.

Eli Ginzberg, Ph.
