## As It Looks From Here

IF IT IS MYSTIFYING TO THOSE OF US who sit in the midst of where bureaucratic regulations are made, certainly it must be more so for those away from Washington who must comply with them.

EVERYONE IS FOR clean water, clean air, health and safety and for protecting the environment generally. Those who want to see common sense and practical measures adopted for these purposes are sometimes accused of being for dirty water, dirty air, unsafe and unhealthy working conditions. Nothing could be further from the truth.

A FEW EXAMPLES MAKE THE POINT. Thousands could be cited but a few are current in creating serious problems without solving anything.

IN 1972 CONGRESS PASSED THE "Clean Water Act." Under that law, anyone doing any dredging or filling work on "navigable waters" must have a permit from the Corps of Engineers. In this instance, it was the Courts who applied the rule that "navigable waters" means all waters of the

United States.

INITIALLY, THE CORPS OF ENGINEERS interpreted the ruling as meaning that any rancher or farmer wanting to enlarge a stock pond or deepen an irrigation ditch or plow a field, or a mountaineer who merely wants to protect his land against erosion, will have to get a Federal permit.

AFTER SCADS OF COMPLAINTS, THE CORPS is now proposing somewhat more narrow requirements but still has red tape which really does nothing to abate water pollution. Efforts are now being made to clarify this situation to limit the Engineers' authority to protect navigable waterways and important estuaries which provide breeding ground for aquatic life. This is what was intended in the first place.

A DR. JOHN FINKLEA OF THE EPA resigned his position last year but was then named Director of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health. Reading some of the regulations of OSHA gives rise to further suspicion that the Doctor is in the right place to issue more asinine regulations. One only has to look at some recent instructions on farm safety. One is to be careful of wet floors in a cow barn, with a further warning that

it is dangerous to stumble over a lying down animal.

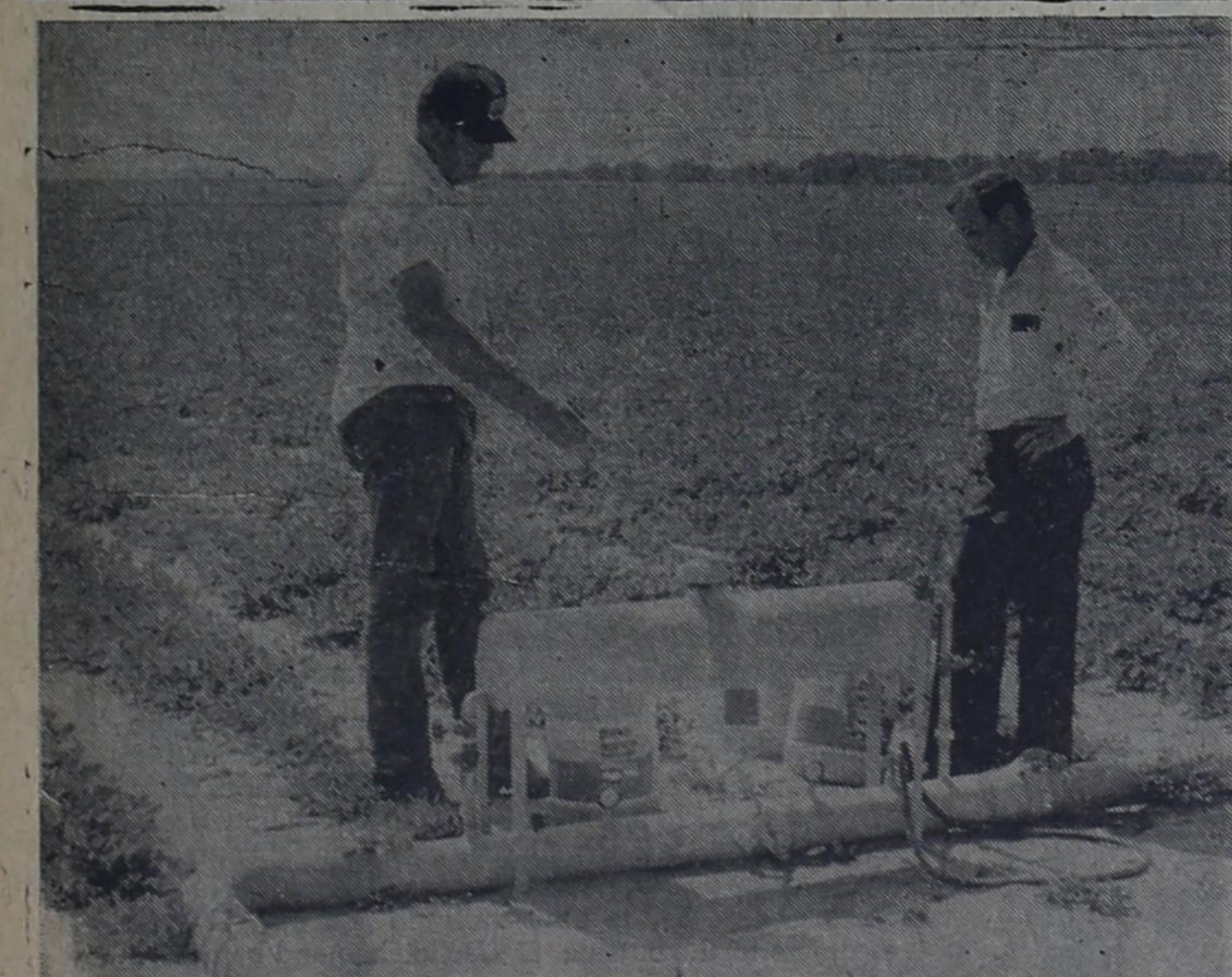

## KIMMEL AND GEORGE WERREN DISCUSS POTENTIAL OF NEW APPLIANCE

George Warren uses four applicators on his 140 acres of peanuts, and states he is very pleased and enthusiastic with his results. At present George is applying chemicals for leaf spot and web blotch control, with place for sulfur applications, and chemicals for southern blight control during his next irrigation interval.

Inspection of Warren's crop shows excellent coverage on peanut leaves, especially on inner leaves.

Kimmel states he is very pleased with all tests run, and with the accuracy of distribution. Tests show and expect time lapse from first sprinkler to last.

There will be several research tests conducted in central Texas by Charlie Rogers, local Nematologist, using a variety of chemicals applied through irrigation systems. Local tests will also be conducted for research by Dr. T. A. Lee, Jr.

The mules were real gentle. I would put lines over my shoulder. Dad told me to try it for two rounds. Too bad for me. He said, "you are it". So I planted some forty acres the way. I guess it was about 1913. The thrashers were run by steam. I remember in Nov. 1910. I went by Perry's Mill. They were crushing hull and all. Getting the oil and selling the other part for feed. We want to thank the Ross brothers for the use of our office. We thank Marcie for helping us find it. A thousand thanks for Uncle Sam for the windows and screens. To Judge Wilson for the work and Charlie for his work. Even thank Doc for swiping a chair. Mr. Monroe for peddling peas to help us out. Do not want to forget to thank Tennessee Turtle and myself for watching and supervising the job well done. Also Trailer Clyde and Fisher men and Hickey.

In the fall of 1900, after my mother died, we were living with Granddad Scott. They lived where Dall Jobe's house is. I do not see how I came out alive. Our sow had ten pigs. They were nearly a month old. They began to disappear, one every night or two. The pen was near the road. We decided someone was stealing them. One evening just about sun down we were at the well and heard a pig squeal. Dad looked and saw the sow starting to eat her own pig. They had been cleaning the land and there were four axes lying against the fence. Dad grabbed an

axe. He was going to make her drop the pig. It was a double bit and he nearly cut her head off. They built a fire and dressed her and we had chittlings and sausage.
