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Region XIV Alternative Certification Program

Applications for the Region 14 Education Service Center's 2000-2001 Alternative Certification program for certification of special education teachers will be accepted from January 4, 1999-February 25, 2000. The program allows college graduates wanting to be special education teachers to earn certification as they train and teach full time, serving as interns with mentor teachers in area school districts. Participants complete course work and training in the spring and summer prior to entering the classroom. During the internship year, further college course work and training is continued.

Applicants are selected from those meeting the following admission requirements: Received bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education; attained a minimum of 2.5 grade point average overall OR 2.75 on the last 60 hours; earned at least passing scores on the Texas academic Skills Program (TASP); acceptable score on a critical thinking test administered at Region XIV ESC; completion of an interview process.

Those who are interested in applying for the training program must have passed the TASP (Texas Academic Skills Program). The latest possible administration that an applicant can take the test and still be eligible for acceptance into the program is March 4, 2000. Registration deadline for that test is February 4, 2000. Emergency registration (by phone only--(512)927-5398) is November 4-November 10, 1999.

The teaching certificate enables recipients to teach anywhere in Texas in special education in grades Pre-K-Grade 12. Reciprocity is available in some other states.

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

Veterans Day Reflects Common Bond of Service

What is it about America's veterans that brings us together on veterans Day? Are we living in the past--attempting to capture a fleeting moment in time that has long since past? Certainly not!

What brings veterans together for Veterans Day is a bond formed in uniform. It is the bone that is entwined within our hearts and minds, which is simply stated: I shall not fail those wi whom I serve.

It has been more than a quarte tury since the guns fell silent in Vietnam. Longer still for Korea--and nearly a lifetime for World War II. Yet, that bond of military service--which transcends the years--compels us to come together and keep the faith with those with whom we served.

This final Veterans Day of the 20th century will include observances with the youngest generation of veterans, the men and women of the Persian Gulf War. These are Americans who sacrificed for others. These are Americans who continue to serve us in uniform. These are Americans who will gather on many more Veterans Days because they also feel that common bond.

As you American military members spend this day deployed to Kosovo, Bosnia, Iraq, at-sea and in distant remove locations, it is appropriate for all of us as a nation to take the time to say "thank you."

It is this common bond that compels us to continue to struggle to find answers for what is right and demand that our nation provide a strong veterans health care system for those who gave so much when called upon. As veterans we have kept our bond of service to our nation. As veterans we ask that our government keep faith with

That is why we gather on this Veterans Day. That is why all Americans should gather with veterans this day. For America's

veterans are a special group of men and women bonded through service, committed to the future.

Turkey Basics Safe Defrosting

"The Big Thaw"

Turkeys must be kept at a safe temperature during "the big thaw." While frozen, a turkey is safe indefinitely. However, as soon as it begins to defrost, any bacteria which may have been present before freezing can begin to grow again.

A package of frozen meat or poultry left thawing on the counter more than 2 hours is not at a safe temperature. Even though the center of the package may still be frozen, the outer layer of the food is in the "danger zone" between 40 and 140 degrees--at a temperature when foodborne bacteria multiple rapidly.

There are three safe ways to defrost food: in the refrigerator, in cold water, and in the microwave.

Handling Frozen Turkeys

Immediately after grocery store checkout, take the frozen turkey home and store it in the freezer--or refrigerator, if you want to begin defrosting it.

Frozen turkeys should not be left on the back porch, in the car trunk, in the basement, or any place else where temperatures cannot be constantly monitored or ensured.

Refrigerator Thawing

When thawing a turkey in the refrigerator, there are several variables to take into account:

- Plan ahead: allow approximately 24 hours for every 5 pounds in a refrigerator set at 40 degrees.
- · Some areas of an appliance may keep the food colder than others. A turkey placed in the coldest part will require longer defrosting time.

Refrigerator Thawing Times (Whole turkey)

8 to 12 pounds.... 1 to 2 days 12 to 16 pounds... 2 to 3 days 16 to 20 pounds... 3 to 4 days 20 to 24 pounds... 4 to 5 days

Foods defrosted in the refrigerator can be refrozen without cooking, but they may be some loss of quality.

Microwave Thawing

Follow the microwave oven manufacturer's instructions when defrosting a turkey. Plan to cook ti immediately after thawing because some areas of the food may become warm and begin to cook during microwaving. Holding partially cooked food is not recommended because any bacteria present would not have been destroyed.

After cooking, meat from a turkey thawed int he microwave can be refro-

Cold Water Thawing

Allow about 30 minutes per pound. First be sure the food is in a leak-proof package or plastic bag. If teh bag leaks, bacteria fromt he surrounding environment could be introduced into the food. tissues can also absorb water like a sponge, resulting in a watery product.

Immerse the turkey in cold tap water. Check the water frequently to be sure it stays cold, change the water every 30 minutes until the turkey is thawed.

Cold Water Thawing Times

8 to 12 pounds..... 4 to 6 hours 12 to 16 pounds... 6 to 8 hours 16 to 20 pounds... 8 to 10 hours 20 to 24 pounds... 10 to 12 hours

A turkey thawed by the cold water method should be cooked immediately. After cooking, meat fromt he turkey can be refrozen.




