Willy Pino Begins Externship At Winnfield General

Bobby Jordan, administrator of Winnfield Hospital in Winnfield, La. announced this week that an agreement has been reached between the University of Monterrey, Mexico Medical School and the Winnfield General Hospital on a clinical externship program to begin immediately.

Among the medical students is Willy A. Pino, the youngest of the medical students participating in the program. Willy is from Gorman. He is planning to go into the field of orthopaedic surgery after graduation. Pino did his premed work at Tarleton State University in Stephenville. His father, Dr. A. E. Pino, is a practicing orthopaedic surgeon at Blackwell Hospital in Gorman.

After completion of the nine month program in Winnfield, the students expect to receive their MD degree in June, 1977. They will then be required to complete a year of residency before receiving a license to practice medicine in the U. S.

In the Winnfield Hospital the students will not actually practice medicine but will work under the local doctors' direction to gain some knowledge about all phases of the work carried on at the hospital, including both general and specialized work.

The Scriptures Speak

Shalt Thou Be With Me In Paradise

"And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, Today shalt thou be with me in paradise." - Luke 23:42-43.

One subject on which there has been much misunderstanding is the subject of the salvation of one of the thieves who was crucified with Christ. Many consider his salvation to be an example of New Testament conversion. Herein lies the problem. The salvation of the man to whom Jesus said "Today shalt thou be with me in paradises" MUST NOT be considered an example of salvation under the will of Christ neither should it be placed in the same category as the conversions of Lydia, Paul, the Ethiopian, and the Philippian Jailor.

The thief on the cross loved and died under the Law of Moses. He was subject to the same rule and authority unto which our Lord was subject. Paul declared that Christ was "made of a woman, made under the law" (Gal. 4:4). During our Lord's public ministry He had the power to cast out unclean spirits (Luke 4:33-36), to heal the sick (Luke 4:38-39), to raise the dead (Luke 7:11-15), and yes, to save a thief (Luke 23:43). These miracles were the result of the power and authority given to the Son by the Father. They should not be associated with our conversion and our salvation. They were performed as a sign or an attestation of Christ. They were recorded, "that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name" (John 20:31). Paul declared that faith "cometh by hearing . . . the word of God" (Romans 10:17).

Whatever else may be said concerning the thief on the cross, it cannot be said that his salvation has anything to do with what the Lord requires of us today. Today we are living under a different will of the will of Christ. It became effective after the death of Christ (Heb. 9:15-17), and it was executed on the first Pentecost after His resurrection (Acts 2:27-47). On the cross Jesus shed his blood for our sins. The only way this sin offering is appropriated is by obedient faith.

"DEALING" With David

Last week we studied the first fundamental need that is first faced in childhood, that of being the need of a proper self-concept. David was made to feel important, not by his parents, but by Samuel. The prophet gave David his positive opinion about himself that allowed David to grow into mature adulthood.

The second great challenge of childhood is in helping a child to realize the gifts they have within them and call them to become responsible stewards of these powers. Each of us must realize that all of one's gifts were meant to be presents for someone else. Thus, a child needs to be given what I call "a Christmas Tree Spirit;" about himself or herself; that is someone to point out "the packages" that lie all about is one's nature and the encouragement to unwrap and discover and develop these capacities. Out of someone pointing out to David his gifts came the musician, the poet, the athlete, the warrior, the capable ruler who so blessed Israel.

I once read that Charles Campbell of the Federal Correctional Institute in Fort Worth, say that the great majority of the people in our penal institutions were not so much bad as they were inept. Somehow, they never developed any skill that helped them function creatively in society. They never learned to do anything that gave them satisfaction.

So there we have the two great needs of childhood. First the realization of self-worth, the child is important, and second, the sense of responsibility to take what has been given him and give this to others. By the grace of God, you both are something special and can do something special.

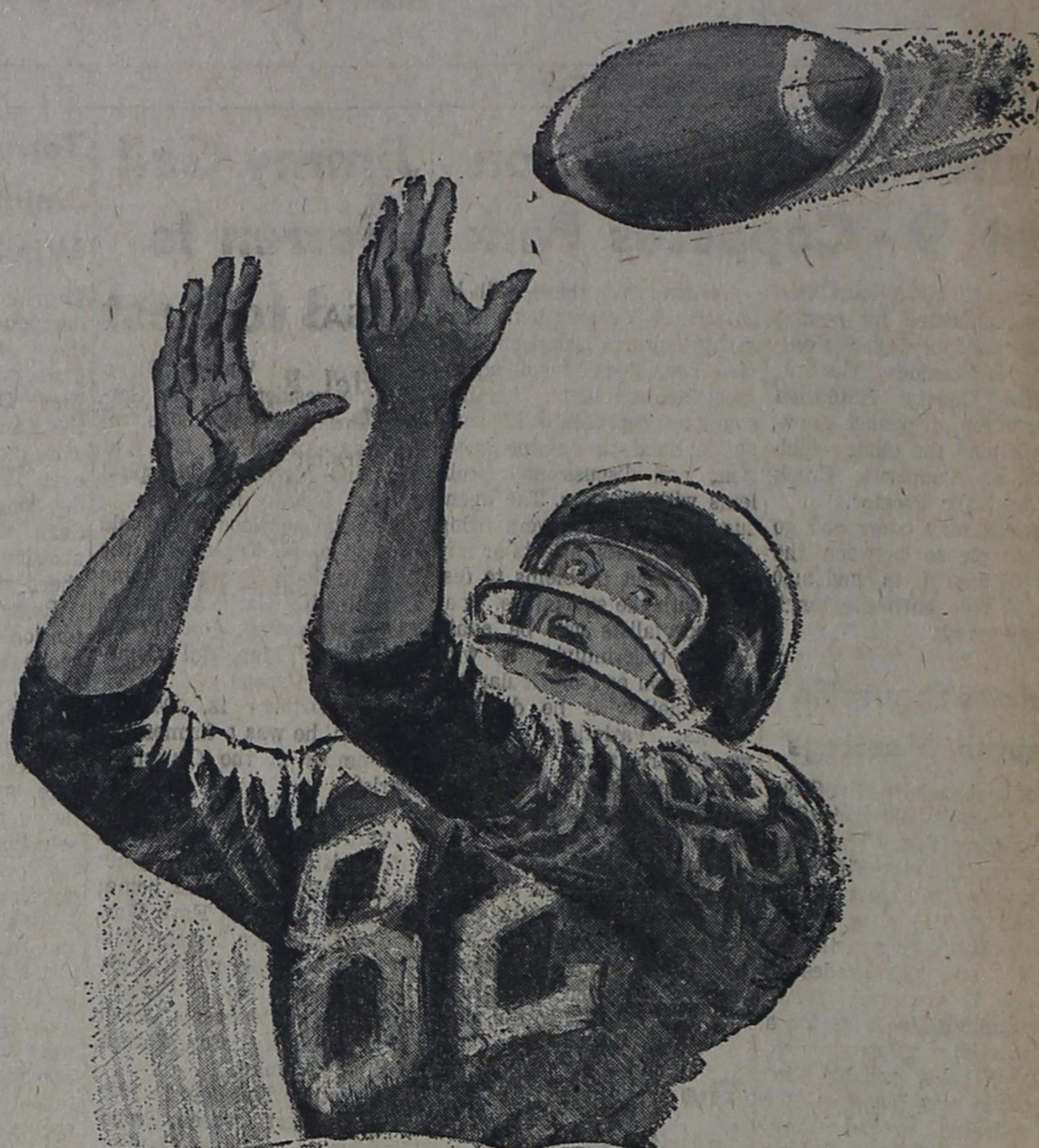

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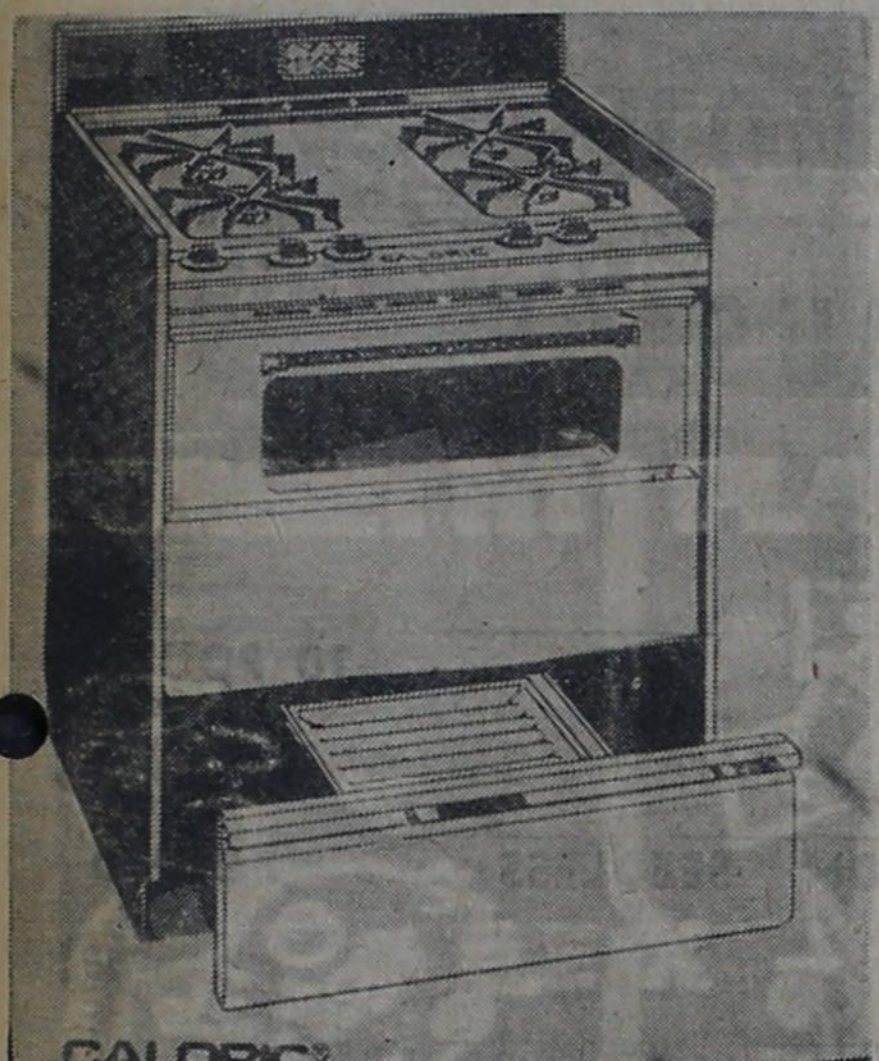
