The Panthers drove the distance in 10 plays with Mel Maxfield going the final one yard with 7 minutes left in the third. The drive featured a 14 yard pass to Burgess. Burgess added the two-pointer on a run and the Big Red went out in front by 21-0.

Then in the third period Joe Bob Huddleston ran the Panther punt back for 45 yds. and a touchdown with only 45 seconds left in the third. Quinn added the two points to make the score 21-8.

Then the Big Red Machine really showed their stuff by taking the ball on their own 38 yard line and driving the entire distance in 17 plays to score again, also killing over 6 minutes of the final quarter to the score read 27 to 8. Then Maxfield faked it up the middle and almost walked into the right endzone for the two-pointer to make the final score read 29-8.

The entire Panther team was really ready for this one. They were hitting hard from the first whistle and were still "socking it to 'em" when the final whistle sounded. The Panthers have a fine defense again this season, much better than was expected from all sources. They will go far this season if they can continue to show the fine spirit and determination that they started out with at De Leon. And that's exactly what we think they will do. "Go All The Way!" For if history repeats itself, the last time the Panthers defeated De Leon, they won district and played Eden in the first round of the play-offs.

The Panther offense looked great behind some of the finest blocking we have seen since last season. The offense rolled up 200 yards on the ground and 37 in the air.

Also in the first Panther drive Ricky Troutman caught a 23 yard aerial from Maxfield.

Billy Burgess led the Panthers with 121 yards in 33 carries. Keith had 85 on 14 carries. Maxfield had 26 on 14 keepers, and Blaine Gibbs had 18 yards on 6 carries.

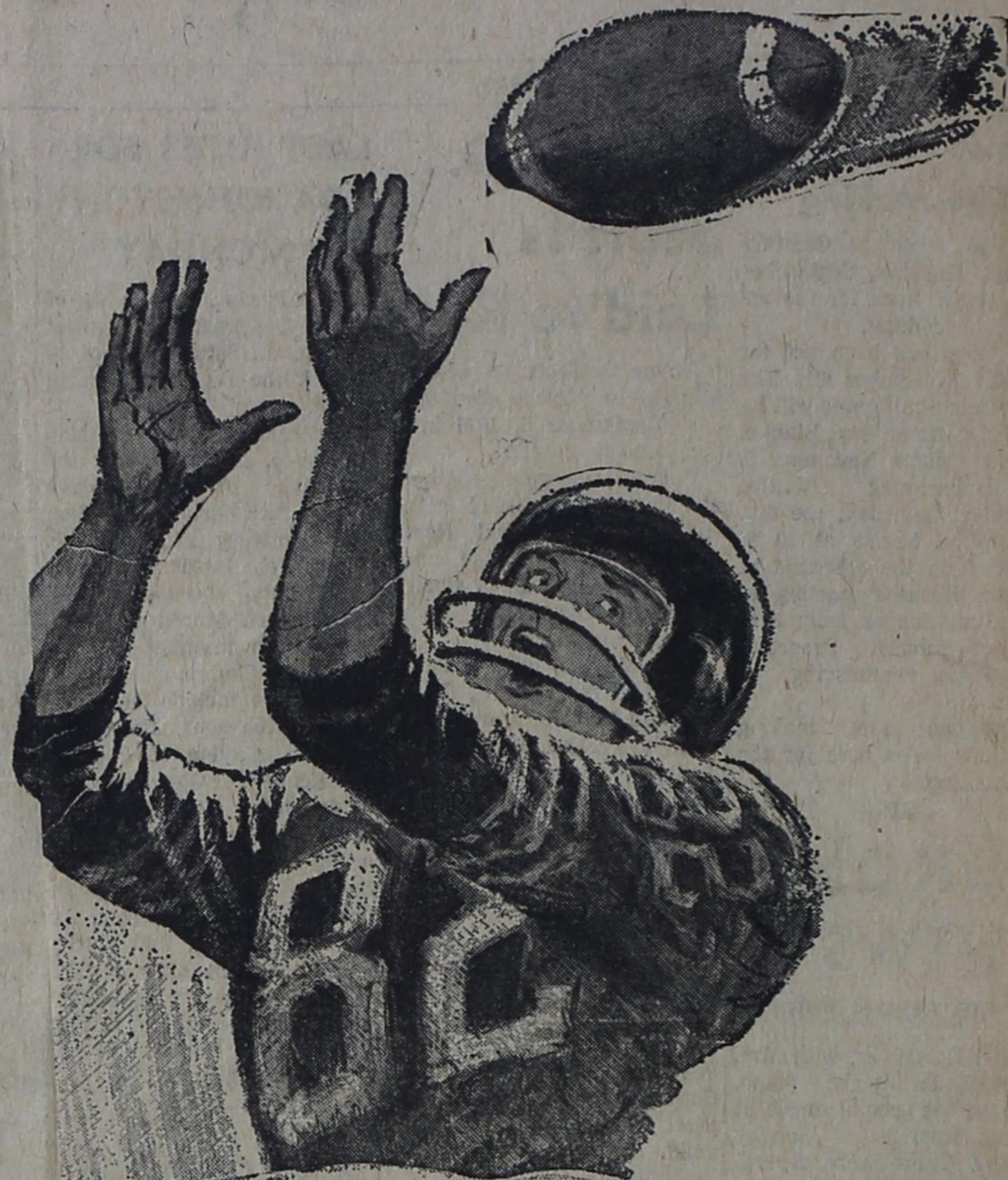

GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principal amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

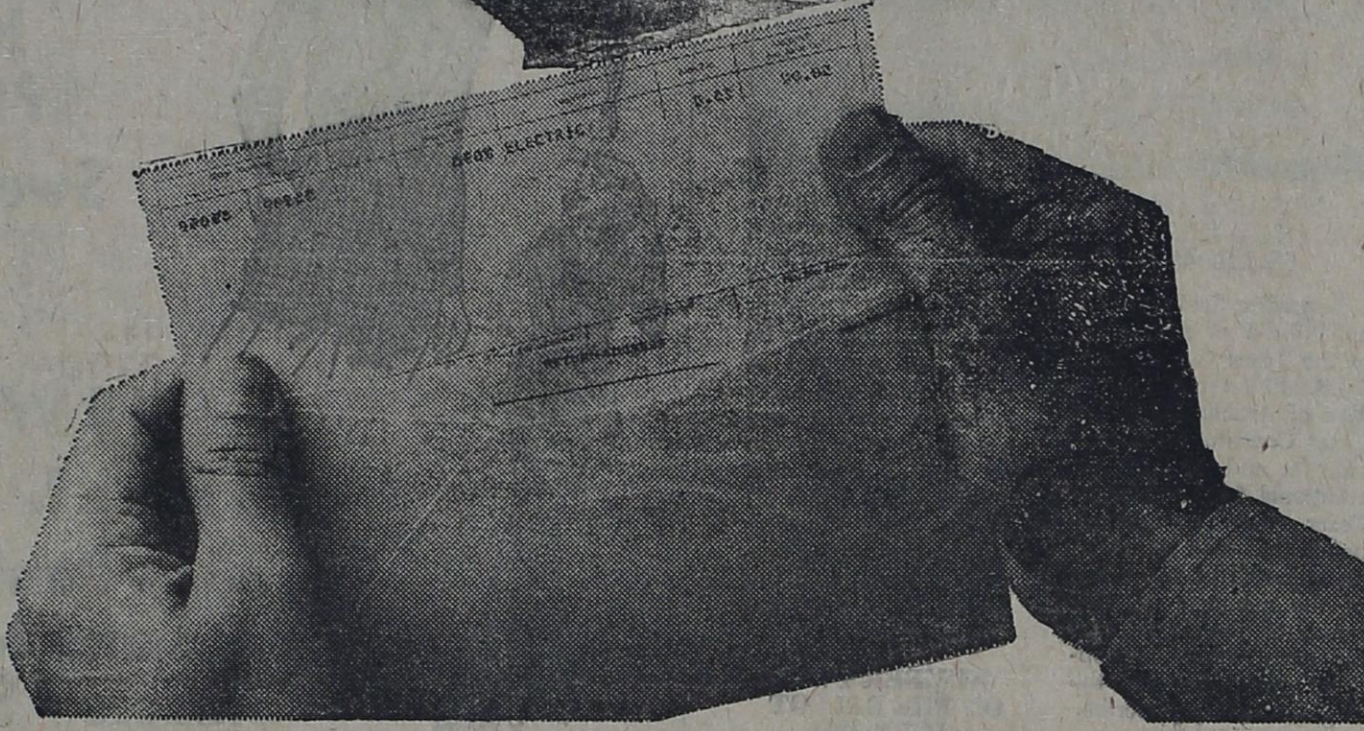

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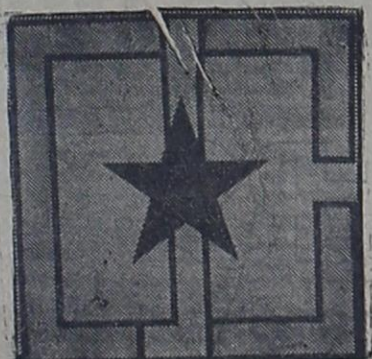
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
