Richter said "Mayor Smith is a proud addition to our Texans in Agriculture organization. With leaders like Mr. Smith, we will have a strong margin of victory in our rural areas. That means we will carry Texas for Jimmy Carter."

## Eastland County Officials Protest \$20,000 Cutback

The approximate \$20,000 cutback in county government costs by the Eastland County Commissioners has brought protests from the county clerk and the tax assessor-collector.

The protests were heard at the last meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners' Court from Johnson Smith county clerk, and Nancy Trout the tax assessor-collector.

Both Smith and Mrs. Trout said that their offices could not efficient operate if the cutbacks were carried out. Both offices faced a combined cutback of \$16,000 to \$18,000, said Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey.

The cutbacks, drawn up by county auditor Emma Morris, were approved by the commissioners Sept. 27. This recent meeting was the first since the cutbacks were approved.

Although the cutbacks were not immediately necessary, Bailey said, eventually, if the cutbacks were not made, short term loans would have to be sought to meet expenses.

Also increased automation and more efficient filing practices have reduced the number of workers needed, he added.

These cuts were necessary because of increased operating expenses for the county while the income remains the same," Bailey said.

In August, Eastland County voters turned down a tax issue which would have meant \$60,000 in funds for the road and bridge department of the county. Had these funds been voted in, Bailey said, the county may not have been forced to make the cutbacks.

Hardest hit by the cutbacks were the tax assessor's office and the county clerk's office, Bailey said. The tax assessor-collector's office will lose two deputies while the clerk's office will lose one.

Commissioners also eliminated part of their work force, auto expenses for constables were cut and a justice precinct was eliminated by the consolidation of two precincts.

"However, if we find that the efficiency of the departments are drastically reduced by the cutbacks, we can always reinstate the funding," Bailey said.

## PANTHERS OVERWHELM LOMETA; PLAY AT RISING STAR FRIDAY

The Number One State Class B ranked Gorman Panthers kept their season record perfect last Friday night in a no-contest game when they hosted the Lometa Hornets in one-sided 60-6 ball game.

The Panthers took advantage of another break shortly after, taking a short, Hornet punt on the Lometa 24 and scoring in 3 plays with Keith hitting for 1 yard; Gibbs going for 7; and then Burgess polishing off the remaining 16 yards with 10:10 left in the second period. Stacy Webb kicked the PAT and the score was 29-0.

Gorman recovered a Hornet fumble on the next series by Lometa when Webb pounced on the pigskin at the Hornet 20. Maxfield hit for 1; Keith for 15 and a first down at the Hornet 4; then Jack Jackson rammed it in on the next play with 9:01 left in the second. The kick failed and the score was 35-0.

Then with 4:24 left in the first half Blaine Gibbs tackled QB Woody Conrad in the end zone for a 2 point safety, and the score was 37-0.

On the ensuing kick the Big Red took the kick on the Hornet 44 and scored in just two plays with Keith rambling for 18 yards and then Ron Roby took the handoff and raced the rest of the way for the TD with 3:49 left in the half. The kick failed and the score stood at 43-0.

Then with time running out in the first half Mel Maxfield boot a 26 yard field goal to make the half-time score 46 to 0.

The Big Red added another touchdown in the third period with Tim Swanner taking a 14 yard pass for the score to cap a 26 yard drive. Gibbs had gotten the first 12 on a run. The score came with 9:00 left in the period. Webb added the PAT and the margin was 53-0.

The Panthers tough defense held and forced the Hornets to try a punt. Chuck Troutman broke through to block the punt, picked up the ball and ran it in from the 9 yard line with 8:35 left in the third. Webb again added the PAT and Gorman was ahead 60-0.

The lone Hornet score came with 4:38 left in the game. Bryan Sullivan scored from the one yard line after an interference penalty set Lometa up at the 1 with first and goal. The drive covered 53 yards. The kick failed and the final score was 60-6.

The Big Red again showed outstanding play by the entire team and were never tested all night.

Burgess led Gorman with 128 yards on 10 carries; Steve Keith had 57 on 7; Blaine Gibbs had 54 on 9; Maxfield was 6 for 43 yards; Roby had 18 on 2; Ricky Troutman hit for 14 on 3; Jackson had 10 on 2; Tim Swanner got 9 on 4; Rick Townley 8 on 3; and Marty Carr got 2 on 2 tries.

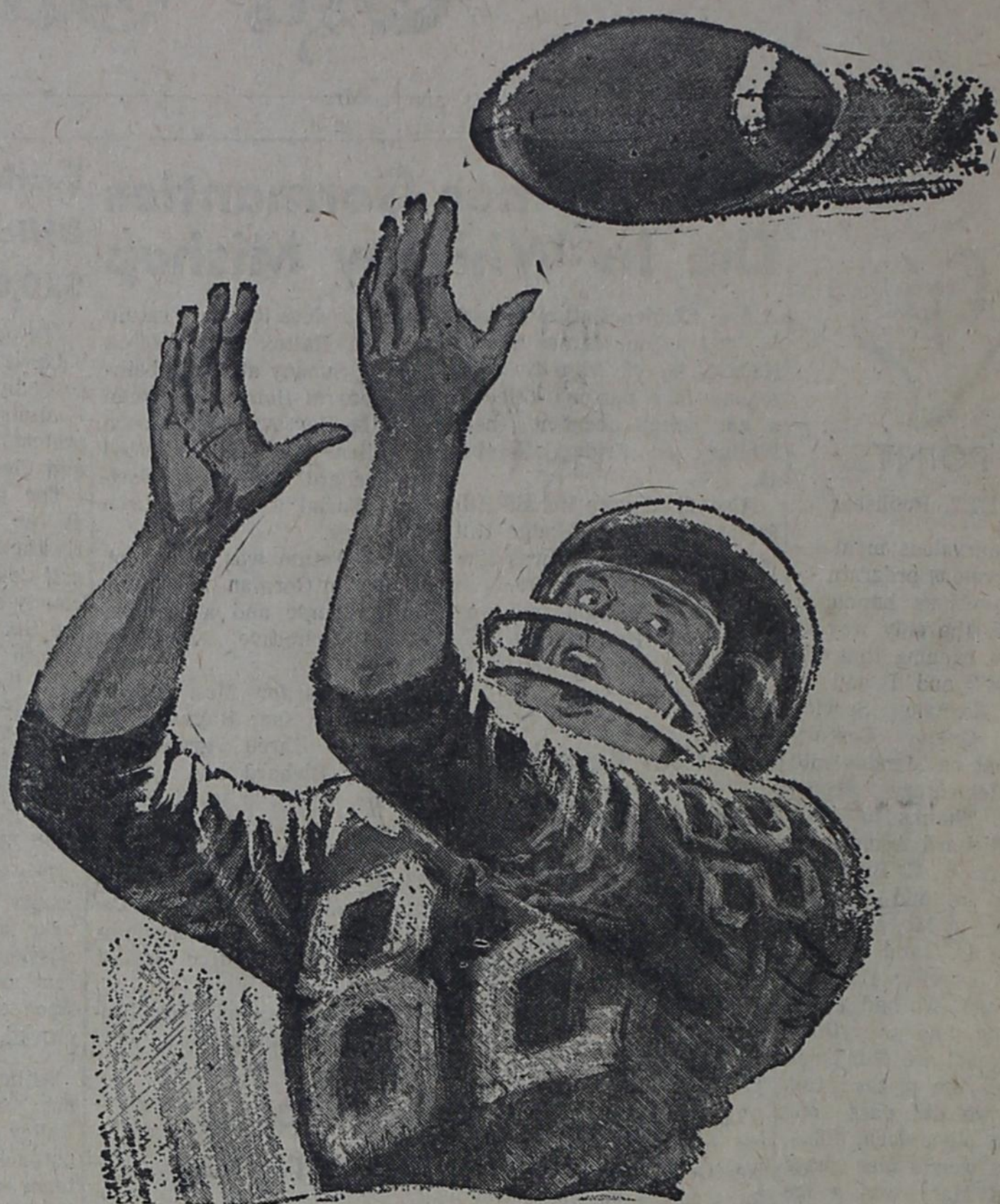

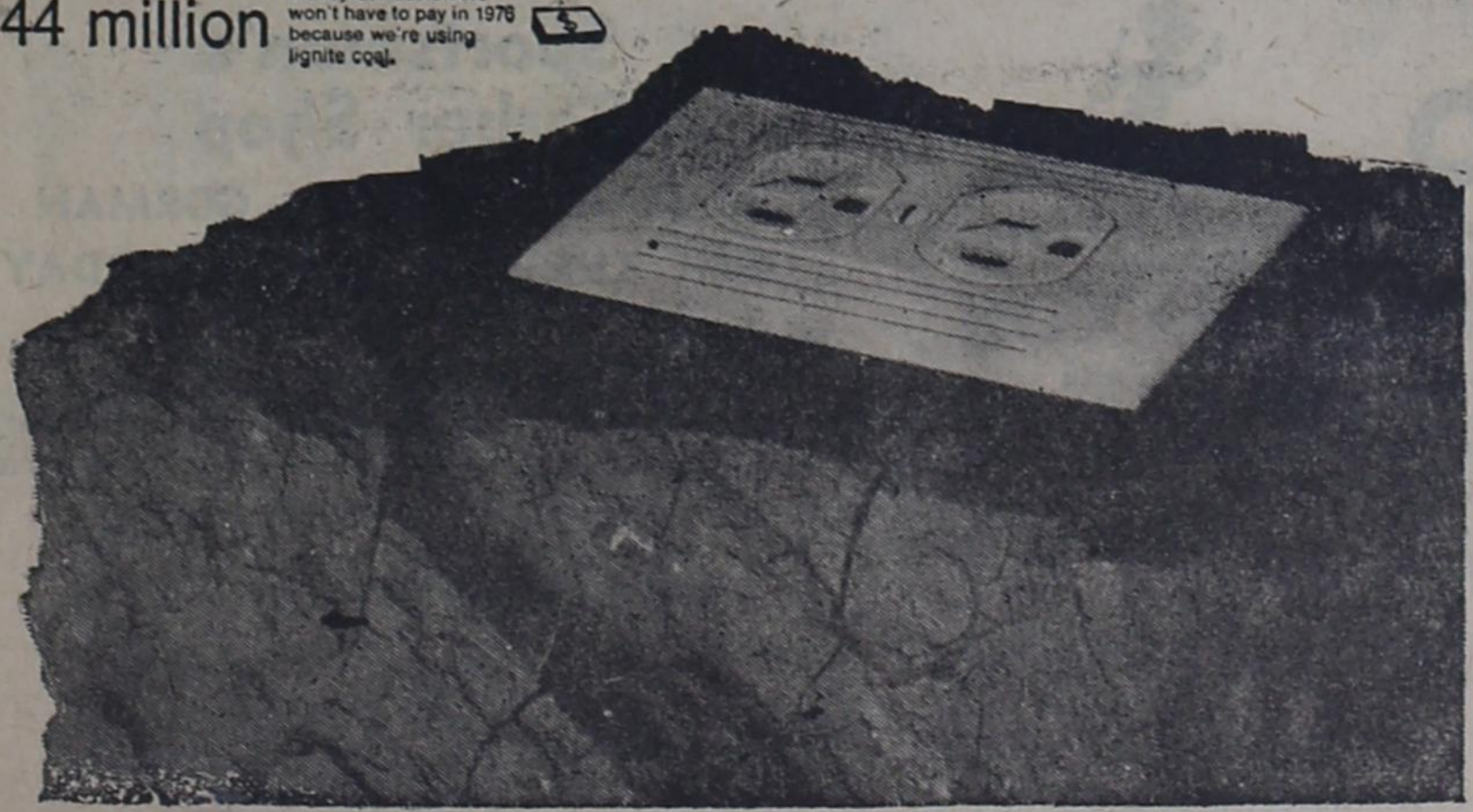

### The Scriptures Speak

"Born of Water and of the Spirit" "Jesus answered, Verily, Verily, I say unto thee, except a man be born of water and of the Spirit he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." — John 3:5.

Recorded in this verse of scripture is our Lord's explanation of the new birth. Nicodemus had misunderstood the statement made by Christ in verse three. He had understood the birth of which Christ spoke to be a physical birth. But in verse five Jesus revealed the elements, the nature, and the essentiality of the new birth. In this verse our Lord answered the question: "How may one enter the kingdom of God?" He did so by presenting the essential ele-

ments of the new birth. Nicodemus, a subject of the Jewish law, was not in the kingdom of heaven. Jesus told him that he must be born into the spiritual kingdom of God, the kingdom over which God's Spirit was to abide and rule.

The new birth is one "of water and of the Spirit." It is one where these two elements, "water and . . . Spirit," are inseparable. Both elements are essential to regeneration. In his commentary entitled The Gospel of John, Paul Butler has written, "There cannot be a separation of the terms 'water and Spirit.' There is no article (the) in the original language with either word. Regeneration is one single action. That is, the initial act of the new birth is completed at the time a person submits in faithful obedience to baptism in water for the remission of sins (Acts

2:38)."

The very first conversions to Christ in the gospel dispensation were Jews. To the men of Israel who had gathered at Jerusalem on Pentecost Peter declared: "Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). Those who gladly received the word of the gospel (v. 41) were baptized, and the same day the Lord added them to His church (Acts 2:47). Those people had submitted their will to the will of God. They were "born of water and of the Spirit."

The power of the new birth is not manifested by a miracle through prayer, in the confession of sins, or by one's decision to "receive Jesus" as some claim. There is no "mystery" as to how one is "born again." Peter explained that the power is: "Being

born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth forever . . . And this is the word which by the gospel is preached unto you" (1 Peter 1:23,25).

**A&M To Give Us "Chunky Cheese"** **Debra Hutson and Scott Roberts To Repeat Vows**

COLLEGE STATION (AP) - Texas A&M researchers are testing the feasibility of putting peanut protein in cheese.

A \$16,778 grant from the Texas Peanut Producers Board at Gorman is backing the project at the Food Protein Research and Development Center.

The peanut growers see their product as a possible answer to forecasts of diminishing supplies of milk for use in producing cheese.

Dr. Karl F. Mattil, head of the protein center, said some major manufacturers of dairy products fear that by 1985 they will be able to buy only about one-half of the milk that will be needed for making such products as cheddar and cottage cheese and yogurt.

The protein center developed several years ago a new process for extracting a high quality protein concentrate from peanuts.

Hattil says the peanut protein could be used to stretch milk supplies while posing no threat to dairy farmers. He believes it is a "safe bet" that within 10 years dairy products like cheeses and ice cream will be stretched with protein from peanuts.

Mattil and Dr. Carl Cater are thinking in terms of 50-50 blends.

Commercial firms, Mattil says, have not gotten into peanut protein because they do not know what the government will do with the acreage controls and price supports on peanuts. He said capital problems also would include buying a year's supply of peanuts at a time.

Mattil said the use of peanut protein has been lagging behind other proteins like those from soybeans and cottonseed because of the government's artificially high price. Total costs for the peanut protein concentrate were estimated by Mattil at 32 to 35 cents a pound.

He said the peanut protein is highly soluble, an important advantage over soybean protein.

If a product is sold as milk, Mattil said, the Food and Drug Administration will require it to be nutritionally equivalent to milk.

To do this with soybeans, he said, produces a product with a thickness of a milkshake. With peanuts, he said, the result is pretty much the same as milk.

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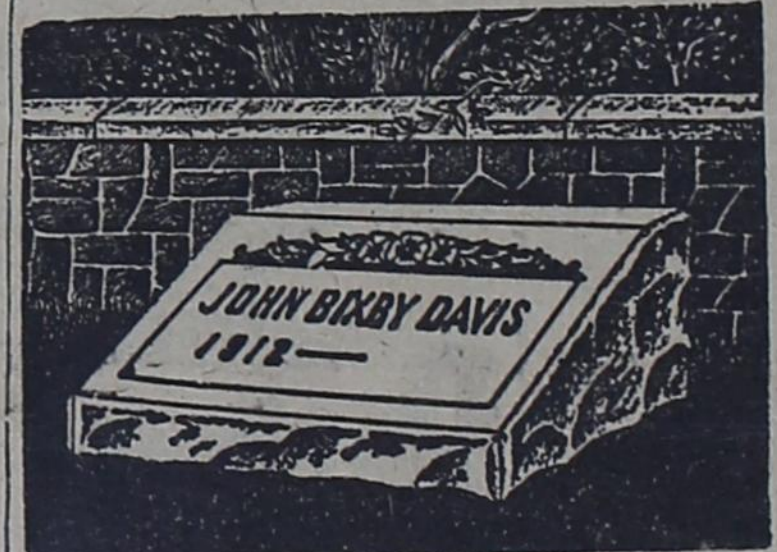

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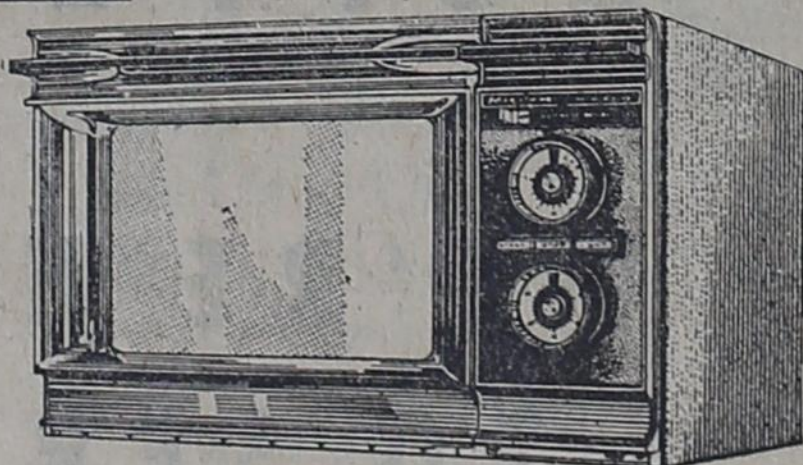
