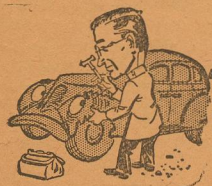

**FAT STOCK SHOW HAS  
FAT PURSE FOR PRIZES**

Ft. Worth, (Special) -- Exhibitors and contestants in the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show will have a grand purse of \$81,802 to divide at the close of the 10 day exposition in Fort Worth, March 9-18.

The cash awards in all departments are the highest this year ever offered at the Fat Stock Show which has been held in Ft. Worth annually since 1896. The total is approximately \$18,000 more than offered for the 1944 show.

John B. Davis, secretary-Treasurer, announced that the grand total includes \$90,375 for the world championship rodeo, which will be presented twice daily at 2 p. m. and 8 p. m. as the featured entertainment of the exposition in the Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum.

Never before in the 27-year history of the indoor rodeo at Fort Worth has the professional rodeo contestants had so much in cash prizes at stake as they prepared to enter the arena to compete in the popular western sport -- the rodeo.

Rodeo prize money includes \$21,375 offered by the stock show management, to which will be added entrance fees of the cowboys. Based on last year's figures the entrance fees are estimated at \$9,000. The figures do not include the contract price of salaried performers.

For each of the five rodeo events the management offers \$4,275 plus entry fees put up by the contestants in the respective events. The five events and entry fee follows: Bareback bronc riding, \$30; saddle bronc riding, \$50; Brahma Bull

Mrs. M. J. Benefield of Odessa is visiting her sisters, Mmes. C E Sutton, Dick Gray and Lester McDonald.

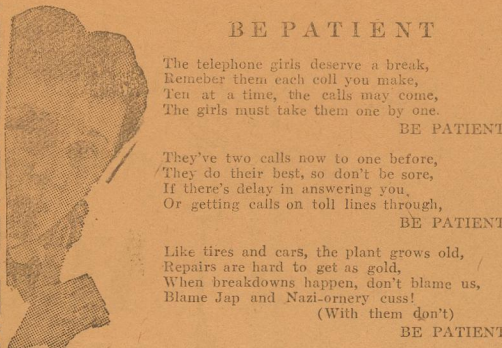
