I had the pleasure of attending the meeting of the Hospital Board of the South Eastland County Hospital District on Thursday night for an open meeting on interested citizens and the board and physicians. This meeting was held in hopes of ironing out some problems at the hospital. The lack of cooperation was the main point stressed by the citizens and part of the hospital board. It was stated that there was not enough cooperation by the physicians concerned. The lack of cooperation is hurting the hospital operations as far as income is concerned. It was clearly brought out that if the cooperation between those concerned was not forthcoming that the future of the Blackwell Hospital would be in jeopardy.

Gorman has three good doctors and the community is real fortunate in having these physicians; because some communities can't get a doctor to practice in their towns.

There was nothing mentioned about the quality of the physicians; as they are fine doctors. It was only the lack of communication and cooperation between the parties that concerned the citizens most.

The board must get down to it and secure the cooperations needed or else the hospital operation will be in jeopardy as far as the future is concerned. It was also stated that local folks could help tremendously in this respect by using the local physicians whenever possible instead of out of town physicians. Whenever a specialist is advised for something that can't be done here; then it is understandable. But if you need the services of a GP or an orthopedic surgeon; then we have the best. There are some areas of medicine that is not covered here; but that's nothing different from most smaller hospitals.

The citizen were urged to take advantage of the medical services available here whenever possible. This will help the financial burden on the hospital and also help to keep the doctors in our community. Most of those at the meeting were in agreement that something must be done to remedy the situation and were urging the hospital board to do whatever was necessary to accomplish this goal. It was a fine meeting and most everyone voiced their opinions or were in agreement with the opinions given.

I think its time for all of us to start working together and helping to straighten out this problem. If we "fall" work at it; it can be overcome and that's the most important thing. I think all will agree on this.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

PLEASE LOOK AT THE FACTS

A year ago we purchased the H. L. Capers property and since that time we have worked to restore the house and grounds as we remember them.

We were born and raised in the Gorman area and have memories here as everyone else does. We want everyone to understand that we are not trying to destroy a landmark. This can't be done for it will be here when we are all gone.

A copy of the donation deed will be in this weeks paper. Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Capers gave this property to the Quarterback Club and the City of Gorman, including in the deed eleven conditions and restrictions which were to be kept or the property reverted back to the owner. We feel that this deed has been violated in several ways.

If you knew Mr. and Mrs. Capers, you would agree that they would have objected to the immoral acts that have been going on in this park for too long. Read restriction No. 6.

In 1966 the swimming pool was abandoned. Such a waste. Read No. 3 restriction.

In 1968 water rights, for the purpose of irrigation, were sold by the City. This is still being permitted and as a result of this both pools of water were drained this summer, leaving all the fish to die. We know that some of you drove out to see this and for those of you who did not but are interested we do have pictures of the damage done. This water was not to be diverted in any way. Restriction No. 3.

We feel the City is responsible for these damages done to the property and for the water which was sold. Read No. 10 condition.

No. 5 condition states that all money charged, for anything in this park, be applied for up-keep of the park. Go look at the park and pools and see if you can say it has been kept up.

What happened to the plaques over the dressing room doors? They were placed to honor the memory of our boys who died overseas. Did their families remove them, because they felt this was no longer an honor? Who did?

We have spent much time and money to restore one of our memories, Troy's Grand-Dad Gowen's home. This is an early landmark also. Mr. Gowen cleared 80 acres with an ax and grubbing hoe, and built the house that stands now some sixty years later. This is all we have left of him, just memories and a history of his family from the year 1750 that demands respect when we read it.

We hope you can see that we are sentimental about our heritage. We think that Mr. and Mrs. Capers memories should be respected enough to keep this place, that they spent a lifetime to earn, as it should be kept, and the way they intended it to be or they would not have specified so in the eleven conditions and restrictions of the deed.

It is difficult to understand why, if this property means so much to everyone, it has suffered such neglect and abuse, until a dispute arises.

All we ask is that the law be kept in this Deed as it was intended, or Mr. and Mrs. Capers would not have written it the way they did.

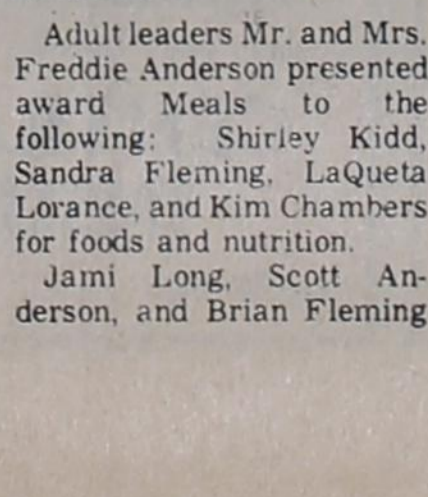

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF EASTLAND:

That we, H. L. Capers and wife, Carrie L. Capers, in Memory of Our Beloved Foster Son, Frank A. Gray, killed in action in the Country known as Burma on the 5th day of August, A. D. 1944, but subject to the conditions, reservations, exceptions and conditions herein set out as

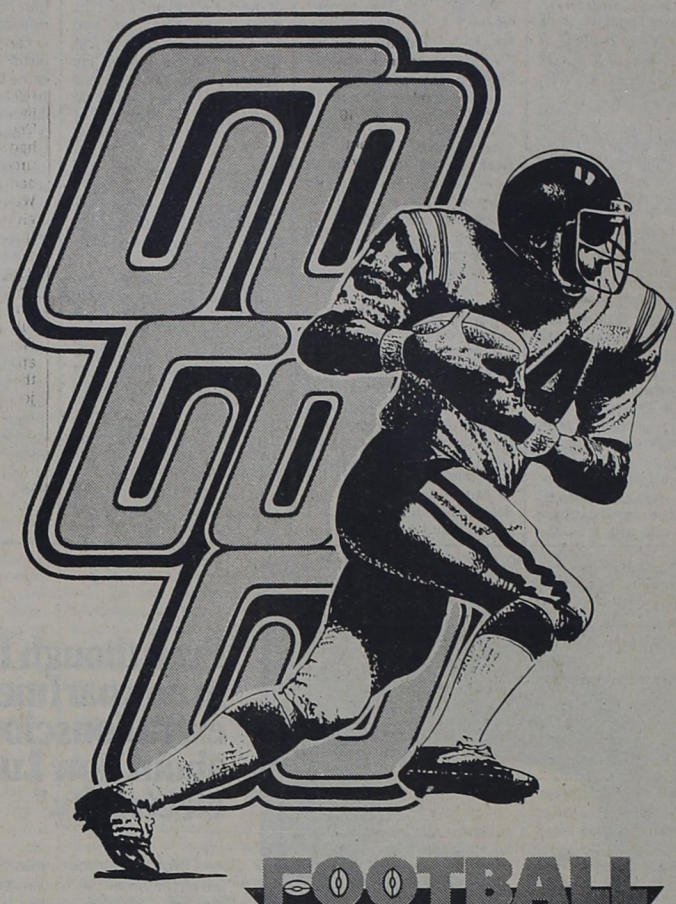

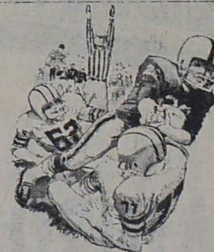

Halloween was the theme for the social hour, with a lighted pumpkin with a cut out face centering the refreshment table.

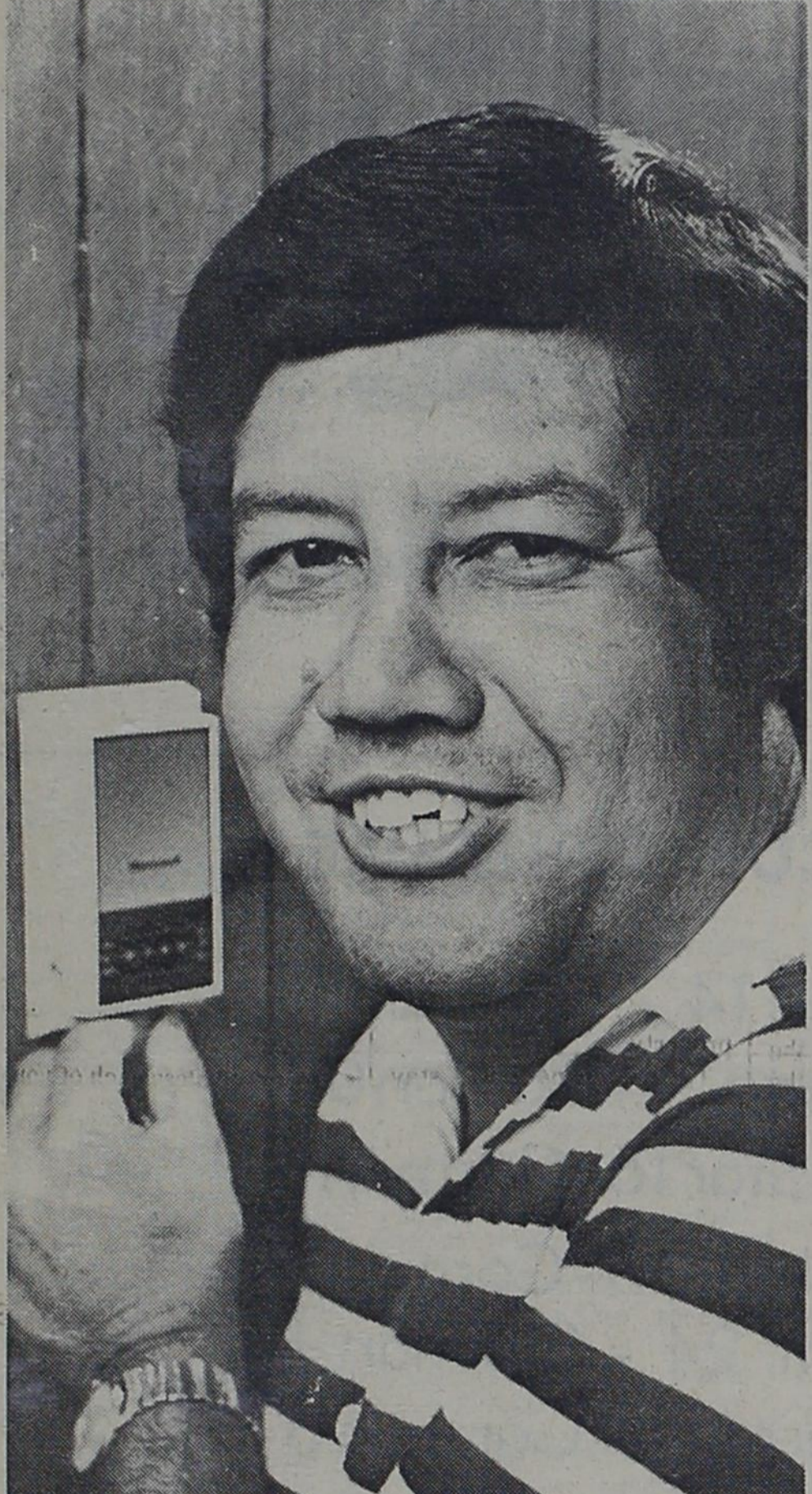

**PARK DEED PROVISIONS**

STARTS ON PAGE 1 follows, to wit:

1. That the land and premises herein is now known as Bass Lake Park and that said Bass Lake Park is to be hereinafter, named, known designated and operated as "Frank A. Gray Memorial Park" and it is contemplated that the Quarterback Club erect or cause to be erected a Tablet or Plaque in said Frank A. Gray Memorial Park in memory of the men and women who have lost their lives in the service of Our Country. When said Tablet or Plaque is erected in said park, the name of Frank A. Gray shall be the first name at the top and beginning of the list of names on said Tablet or Plaque. The Quarterback Club of Gorman Texas, shall have the power and authority to determine the names of the deed and the manner of selecting them except as to the name of Frank A. Gray which name shall be the first name at the top of the list.

2. That no entrance fee of any-king or description shall ever be charged any person for admittance to said park, except on Special Occasions, and then except a limited number of days, not to exceed thirty days in any one year, and when admittance charges to enter said park are charged no person under the age of twelve years shall be charged an entrance fee in excess of fifteen cents as entrance charge and on days when such entrance charge is made this charge is made this charge shall also be the only charge made for persons under twelve years of age and shall entitle all persons under twelve years of age the right to bathe in the lake in bathing suits furnished by said person without additional charge.

3. That the present bathing pool may be enlarged or improved and shall remain substantially where it is at the present time and in no event shall the natural flow of water into this swimming or bathing pool be changed or diverted in any manner affecting the efficiency of the present flow of water into this pool and in no event shall this swimming or bathing pool be abandoned and other pool made in this park and different and higher charges be made for the privilege or swimming or bathing in said pool.

4. That no person of any age shall be charged in excess of fifteen cents in any one day for the right to swim or bathe in said swimming or bathing pool provided said person furnish his or her bathing suit. Bathing suits may be kept for persons who have no suit and desires to bathe and swim and the charges to be made shall be fixed and regulated by the club or organization operating the park or by the City of Gorman, in the event the city should ever operate the park.

5. That the net proceeds received and produced for admittance to the park or produced and received inside of the park by any exhibition, show, sale, or any other method or enterprise shall be used and expended for the improvement or improvements and/or the up-keep of the park and said net proceeds shall not be used for any other purpose.

6. That this park will be a living memorial for the men and women who gave their lives for their country, and nothing of a lewed, immoral and/or vicious nature shall be tolerated or allowed in any place inside of this park.

7. The Quarterback Club of Gorman, Texas, is located in Gorman and is a local Association of men and in the Vicinity of Gorman and is for business purposes controlled by young men under the age of thirty-five years.

8. To do with location of land and boundaries.

9. The grant of the fee simple title to the above described tract of land is granted, donated and conveyed to the City of Gorman, Eastland, County, Texas, but the possession, use and operation of said tract is granted to the Quarterback Club of Gorman, Texas, for the purpose of operating a park for use and benefit of the public in accordance with the conditions, restrictions and reservations of this grant, hereinafter and above defined and set out for so long as the Quarterback Club of Gorman, Texas operates the said park to be known, named, operated and designated as "Frank A. Gray Memorial Park", in accordance with this grant. If the Quarterback Club of Gorman, Texas ceases to exist the City of Gorman may take complete possession of said park and operate said park in accordance with this grant or may select some other club or association or person to operate said park in accordance with this grant.

10. The Quarterback Club or such other clubs, association that operates or may operate the park shall be responsible and liable for any and all damages, if any, caused by any one in this park and the City of Gorman shall not be liable for damages, unless the City of Gorman takes over the operation and operates the park and then only for such time as the City of Gorman actually operates the park.

11. In the event the said "Frank A. Gray Memorial Park" shall entirely cease to be operated as a park for a period of two years then and in that event the above described land and all building and equipment of every nature and kind shall revert to H. L. Capers and wife, Carrie L. Capers, their heirs and assigns.

**TO HAVE AND TO HOLD**  
The above described premises, together with all and single the rights and appurtenances belonging to the said City of Gorman, Eastland County, Texas, subject however to all of the conditions, restrictions, and reservations hereinbefore set out in this grant.

The Woman's Study Club met in the home of Mrs. Louise Rankin, Monday, Oct. 10 for the Federation Day Program.

Each member answered to roll call with a club memorior. Mrs. Jerry Brown gave the Leader of Pledge to Club; Mrs. Bernice Jeffs, gave our Club Heritage on our 30th Anniversary. She began by stating "In the fall of 1946 a group of young women met to plan a Federated Club, and on December 2, 1946, a group of 20 women met in the home of Bernice Jeffs. Mrs. B. B. Brummett helped organize the club, officers were elected, and the club constitution and by-laws were written. "The Club chose colors of gold and white and gardenia for their flower. "Step By Step We Gain The Heights" was chosen as club motto. One of the first projects the club chose to do was to get the streets of Gorman cleaned. A request was made to the city to implement a garbage pick-up. This was done and an assessment of 25 cents was made to each household to provide funds for this service.

To raise funds, the club held bake sales, prepared meals for the Business Men's Club, monies derived from these projects were used to build a bicycle rack at the school, pay lunches to under privileged students.

Beginning of the second year the club sponsored a Halloween Carnival and raised \$665.00 which was used for beautification of Frank A. Gray Memorial Park. The club continued each year with fund raising projects by holding bake sales, selling cookbooks, and raffles. Accomplishments for the second year was the construction of the rock arch way to the entrance of Gorman Cemetery and to mail out letters for cemetery funds.

In the year of 1953 the club started the publication of the telephone directory, this project was very profitable and was continued for many years.

In 1956 the club presented the name of Oaklawn for the new cemetery and City Com-

I say this in honor of the memory of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Capers who in their lifetime gave so much to entertain the children here.

I for one, spent many happy hours in the King Theater, 2 hours of picture show for a dime until 12 years old and 25 cents for older. All this was at the park for free, all this was thanks to the Henry Capers' for making this possible.

The park means more to some than to others. Some go to enjoy a quiet picnic, while other don't care and want to destroy all that is good about having a free picnic grounds. It's a short drive, to just get out of town awhile. We and many others here don't own farm land, and nearly all have Posted, Keep Out, No Hunting, No Fishing, signs everywhere and we have to drive to Lake Leon or to Proctor just to fish. It being so far, we don't go often. I remember 3 favorite places my daddy loved to go and take the family fishing or just a day in the country. There was Bass Lake, Round Hole on Sabana and his grandfathers place. He lived to see the day when only Bass Lake had no signs up saying to keep-out, and was asked nicely not to go on the others because a cow was shot. He only carried a fishing rod. But sometime when only one person does wrong, it effects the lives of many others.

In my heart I feel the people who think they bought the park are in the wrong, this time and will effect the life of many others. To them it is land to make money, to us it is something that can never be replaced.

If they can buy the park and destroy the good deed the Capers left to our town, it seems hopeless to work hard to build a dream when theirs can be taken away so soon and their son's memorial marker to prove their intentions of a public park.

Someone told me it was back in 68 the rules of the deed were broken. If this is true why did donations come from all over the USA to improve the park. The money used to improve it and was announced weekly who the donations were from and published in the paper.

Why did the person that believed she bought the park allow the city to remain improving her land.

Something was mentioned about the natural water drainage being changed. Well, to my knowledge this was changed on the private property of the late A. L. Underwood before 68. The water drained across the Underwood place on across the road and across the Bruce Thomas place on back of the Ball Park across the Duster highway across the late Lee Kirk place across the road through Whit Russell place to Bass Lake. 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
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
