TESCO Gets Rate Increase

Bill Marguardt, president of Texas Electric Service Co., said today he is "very concerned about what this PUC ruling may mean to our customers."

"We need enough money to keep our fuel-changing program on schedule. That's the only way our customers will have reliable service at the lowest possible price." Marquardt said.

The Public Utility Commission today granted Texas Electric a \$44 million increase rather than the \$79 million requested by the company.

The PUC order means the average monthly residential bill will increase from about \$24 to about \$27.25 according to a quick estimate by Texas Electric.

Texas Electric is building power plants that use lignite and nuclear fuel, which are cheaper and more abundant partment.

Marquardt said it is too early to know exactly what effect the PUC ruling will have on the company's fuelchanging program.

"For the sake of our customers, we'll try to keep the fuel-changing program on schedule. That means we'll need another rate increase sooner than planned," he

Texas Electric generated 28 percent of its customers' electricity with lignite last year. If that amount of electricity had been generated with marketprice natural gas, it would have cost customers \$58 million more on their electric

bills," Marquardt said. "As I said in my testimony before the PUC, we estimate that in 1983 we will save our customers about \$225 million by having these lignite and nuclear plants in operation. That'a a \$190 savings per year




