## Growers May Ask Double Probe On Pneumatic Sampler

Inspection Service officials in Texas and Oklahoma have agreed to take larger samples of peanuts from which to determine the official grade from certain loads of farmers stock peanuts. The problem, pointed out at a meeting of grower leaders with Inspection Service personnel in Ft. Worth on July 10, involves bulk loads of peanuts known to have large concentrations of foreign material at certain places in the load rather than an even distribution throughout the load.

Lack of labor or proper equipment on the farms or at the buying points following drying, for distributing foreign material, often results in large concentrations either on the sides of trailers or in the center, depending on the method of loading or dumping peanuts into trailers. Where these conditions are known to exist, growers or buyers on behalf of growers, may request operators of pneumatic samplers to use 2 probe patterns rather than the customary single pattern in obtaining load samples for the official grade. This procedure will result in a much more representative sample of the load since the sample will more nearly contain equal portions from all parts of the load as opposed to the customary probing pattern calling for an unequal number of probes on the sides compared to the mid-sections of loads.

The use of two probing patterns rather than one is expected to take very little additional time. However, growers should request this procedure only when trailer loading conditions result in obvious maldistributions of foreign material. Custom cleaning of high foreign material lots may be a more profitable approach when-ever practical to do so.

## Search Underway For Peanut Quality Production Winner

Growers in many communities throughout Texas and Oklahoma are participating in production contests. First and second place winners in both Texas and Oklahoma along with their wives will be awarded an expense paid trip in February to Miami, Florida, and on to the Bahamas. These awards will be made by Elanco Products, Incorporated. Local contest winners will be selected following the harvest season. These growers will then be eligible to compete at the state level. Winners will be judged on the basis of top dollar value per ton plus adherence to peanut quality standards previously announced and made available to all local sponsors. A single MQ-94 (Sales Memorandum) representing a load of at least 10,000 pounds will serve as the official contest entry form. A grower may enter as many loads for judging as he desires.

The quality contest is but one phase of an extensive peanut quality improvement program being carried out in the Southwest this year. Program sponsors are the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Texas Peanut Producers Board, Oklahoma Peanut Commission, the Southwestern Peanut Shellers Association and Texas and Oklahoma Agricultural Extension Services. Heavy emphasis is being placed on grower practices from digging through combining and on proper curing practices.

Growers winning awards will join state winners from other peanut producing states on February 15 in Miami for the cruise to Nassau. During the cruise a peanut seminar will be conducted involving growers, Elanco personnel and extension and research personnel from some of the peanut producing states. The seminar will include discussion on weed control, insect control as well as irrigation and harvesting methods. Local growers may wish to contact their local peanut buyers for their area and to learn details of the contest.

# Gorman Drop Blanket 40-0; Go To Rising Star Saturday

Boy! That new wrinkle of the Panthers in the backfield last week was sure something. It wasn't the Wishbone T, but it was what the Panthers and their fans have been "wishing" for. With Kelly Henderson at quarterback, Wesley Rogers at fullback, and Johnny Scitern and Jackie Selman at the halfback posts, the Panthers exploded for 339 yards on the ground, and the outstand-

ing team defense did a magnificent job to drop the Blanket Tigers 4 to 0 Friday night.

Everyone was buzzing this week about the new set up in the backfield as surely they should do as Johnny Scitern got 167 yards on 14 carries for a whopping 12 yard average; Jackie Selman ran superbly for 142 yards on 9 tries for an amazing 15.6 average; Wesley Rogers got 62 yards on 15 trips for 4.1, Billy Self had 10 on 3 for 3.3; Kelly Henderson got 6 on 3 keeps for a 2 yard average and Rudy Espinoza got 2 on one carry.

The Panthers started the explosion on the first play from scrimmage when Johnny Scitern blasted off from the Tiger 43 yard line and soared into the end zone almost untouched for the score. Wesley Rogers booted the extra point and Gorman led 7 to 0 with 1:51 left on the clock in the first period.

The Tigers came right back as on their first play from scrimmage they came out in a double set to the right, faked a run to the left and then threw back to the right for a 68 yard completion to shake up the Big Red. However, the Panthers recovered and held the Tigers on four downs and took over the ball on their own 9 yard line.

The Panthers scored again with 57 seconds left in the first period on a pass to Scitern for 6 yards to cap a 90 yard drive that took only 12 plays. Rogers again booted the PAT and the Panthers led 14-0.

The Panthers scored again on a beautiful 19 yard scamper by Jackie Selman with 8:59 left in the second quarter capping a 33 yard scoring drive in just 3 plays. Rogers kicked the PAT and the Big Red had a 21-0 bulge.

Gorman held the Tigers on the next possession, then took over the ball on their own 29 following the punt and rolled for another score in 13 plays with Wesley Rogers getting the final 3 yards with 15 seconds left in the half. The kick for PAT was no good and the halftime score stood at 27-0.

On the second possession by the Tigers following the second half kickoff, Johnny Scitern stepped in front on a Tiger pass receiver, caught the interception and raced for 47 yards to the promise land to add another six pointer with 8:21 left in the third. The kick for PAT by Rogers was good and the score was 34-0.

The Panthers' final tally came with 5:10 left in the 4th period on another of Jackie Selman's thrilling scampers, this time for 13 yards. This capped an 82 yard drive in 8 plays which also featured a 26 yard scamper by Selman and an 18 yard pass to Scitern. The PAT try was blocked and the final score was 40-0.

Enough cannot be said for the Panther defense, as they finally started working as a unit and accomplished the ultimate for a defensive team, a shut-out. This was, undoubtedly a team effort on defense with all the boys putting it together to halt the Tiger offense.

It was also a team effort as far as the offense was concerned, thanks to that offensive line opening the huge holes for the running back, and also some fine blocking by the backs themselves. This was without a doubt the most explosive backfield set up we have seen for the Panthers in some time. Henderson did a real fine job at the man-under post and Jackie Selman finally came into his own following an injury and returned to his old form of outstanding running to spark the offense. I think all of you will agree with me that the Offensive Player of the Week would have to be Jackie Selman, and we sincerely hope he has gotten back to his fine play after being cleared by the doctor.


So, when you go to the Pep Rally Friday night at 7:30, be sure and pat ALL the team on the back for a fine game.




