Maybe if we wrote our government officials more often express ing our opinions and desires they would do a much better job of representing our interest and the interest of the majority in this nation of ours.

Here's the reply: Dear Mr. Bennett:

correspondence. I agree that the regulations published by the Department

of Health, Education and Welfare are inappropriate for many areas of Texas and could--if applied to the state-cause great damage to the health system.

I have enclosed a copy of a letter I wrote to Secretary Califano on this issue expressing my opposition to the regulations, particularly as they would adversely impare rural and rapidly growing urban areas. In this Congress. I have been one of the foremost advocates of improved rural health care services. Earlier this month, the Rural Health Clinic Bill which I sponsored, passed both the House and Senate. This bill expanded the types of services which the federal health insurance programs will pay for in rural areas.

You can be sure that I will work hard to prevent these guildelines from undoing my legislative efforts with regard to improved rural and other health services for the people of Texas.

As you probably know, these guidelines are "proposed" and will not be effective until all comments are received and evaluated.

I appreciate your taking the time to contact me.



BOTTLE, BOTTLE, WHO'S GOT THE BOTTLE?

When you go shopping at the supermarket some time soon, will the beverage cans or bottles you buy be refillable or non-refillable? If some well-intentioned legislators get their way, they'll all be refillable. Why?

They say it will decrease litter. Yet, experts point out, only a small portion of all beverage containers are improperly discarded. Actually, more than 93 percent of canned beverages are consumed indoors or on private property and thus not even candidates for litter. Most of the balance are consumed under controlled conditions like restaurants or ball parks. Many experts suggest that rather than have only refillable bottles, a program of public education combined with stringent enforcement of litter laws would control littering.

There is also evidence to suggest that municipal solid waste could increase-not

decrease-if you eliminate the beverage can and return to an all-refillable system. The reason for this is that the refillable bottle and its auxiliary packaging weighs 10 to 20 times more than the beverage can.

And how would a return to refillables affect jobs? Specifically, a Department of Commerce study projected a displacement of up to 82,000 jobs if such restrictive legislation is

Why do we now have non-refillable cans and bottles? Certainly there are many reasons, but the over whelming factor is that we have these convenience containers because con sumers like it that way.





The Senior Citizens Band from Comanche entertained our people and our guests. They were just great. We thoroughly ejnoyed them. They are always welcome. --GP--



SENIOR CITIZENS

Mv. wasn'tFriday a beautiful day? The air was so nice and pinkish looking. The windmills were all shift ed to high gear. Tho it seem ed to be drawing even the last dew drops from our community. It also seems to help keep the Firemen busy. So all should be very carcful with your fires, as the country is nearly like a tinder box now.

Our 84 gang is just staying at home and hoping that Santa will not forget them this year. Fats and Murel have already found the old whiskered man with his Ho!

Even Granny Kent is hoping for a large bottle of snuff. Big Foot wants a case of chili. My Boss is out of humor. You see she ran her watch through the washer and dryer. It seemed to slow it down, though it should be clean and sterilied by now. Mama had to get some mouth oil for her tongue. It seemed to be slow ing down some. So she said she could not stand that.

Our office gang is slowing down. It must be that old age is creeping up on them. Even the Pea Picker seems seems to be slowing down. He let old man Monroe twohele him. Hickey almost got a broken leg trying to get by someone in a hurry to play with Uncle Sam.

Floyd is playing more now since his land seems to be nearly to wet to plow. Uncle Sam said he could not see the banks of the Leon River when he crossed it Friday evening. I wonder if it was due to high water or high dust.

During the oil boom, we pulled up four joints of casing (80 ft) so they could shoot a well with nitro in the Sandy Vaught Field. It was flowing some gas. The shooter was putting down 25 quarts at a time. On the third trip down the gas blew it off the hook and it started blowing it up the casing. There was 500 quarts in the truck at the derrick. He said "everybody run." He would try to catch it as it blew out of the hole. The land was listed to plant in peanuts, though the oil field stopped all of that. I ran about 50 yards and fell in a furrow. The shooter caught that nitro. When we went back to the rig he had drops

of sweat on his face as large as walnuts. You see about a month before this accident the same thing happened at a well in Sipe Springs for our company. It blew a hole in the ground thirty feet deep and killed some men.

In the fall of 1919 the company drilled a well in the edge of the bottom. It was raining ten days every week that passed. Dub Graham and I cut weeds about ten feet high to put on the road. About every fifth wagon that passed over it, we has to repair it with weeds. The next year I was swabbing that well to make it flow. Just south of the well 100 yards Sterling Oil had a well. They had it on a pump. They were running the rods in the well. The

crew had oil all over their clothes. One young man had to smoke. So he went out to one side to light his cigarette. When he struck the match he became a living torch. He started to run. They caught him and rolled him on the ground and put him out. They just rolled him in a tarp and took him to Blackwells here in town. When they took the tarp off his skin all came off. He lived just a few minutes. I saw him burning. It was a horible sight. I had a few close calls myself. I remember Dunn and I

started to see about a casing job in his overland touring. No top on it. We came to a six inch line, so we just took a shovel and banked dirt over the line. When we went over the line the gasoline line to the carburetor broke. We had enough momentum to get over the line. The gas tank was under the back seat. There was no gas gauges on the car. So he took him measuring stick. No gas. He could not believe it. So he struck a match. Just a small flame. We went back to the warehouse and I opened the door and got some copper tubing that we kept for pumps and got two gallons of gas. In a few minutes we were on our way. We got the casing job that night.

I went with Dunn to Desdemona one Sunday to get some groceries. He decided to get some gas. He measured his gas and said ten gallons will fill it. The man started pumping and the



helped with the County Pecan Show. The 225 entries in the pecan show makes it the largest County Show here since we have been keeping records dating back to 1965. I've been told there were some larger pecan shows in the late 50's or or early 60's.

Workers cracked and shelled 2,250 pecans, about 40 pounds, in four hours. Ten pecans from each entry were weighed before shelling and kernels were weighed after shelling. The number of pecans per pound and percent kernels were caluclated. It took a lot of people to do all of this and we appreciate this help.

A few agricultural producers have told us they have not received their private applicator certificate although they have attended the training or mailed their application for a certificate. If any producer has not received his certificate he should contact the County Extension Agent's office.

All pesticide dealers must get new dealer's licenses since old licenses expires December 31, 1977. They may obtain these licenses from the Texas Department Agricultural in Austin.

Several acres of peanuts were dug and baled without thrashing this year. How much better is the hay containing peanuts? Harvesting a five busher peanut crop as hay without combining would result in a hav with approximately 25 percent higher quality than any baled after combining.

Due to the drought there are few small grain crops growing in Eastland County. But those who have grain crops should be alert for green bug damage. Green bugs suck plant juice and inject a toxin into the plant causing leaves to turn yellow or even die.

Green bugs ca reproduce and develop at temperatures from 40 degrees to 100 degrees F., but reproduce most rapidly between 70- 75



INDIAN MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY

By Jewell Dukes Huddleston Sunday afternoon's red sand storm was reminiscent of the dry years of 1917 as the pall of dust hid the sun and cast a shadow over the earth. Tons of sand boiled up in the peanut fields in the driving wind as we drove toward Indian Mountain

community. We were enroute to the old Rascoe homestead. Our hostess for the afternoon was Pearl Rascoe Westerman, who resides with her husband. Bud, on the farm where she was born.

The place was bought around the turn of the century by Pearl's parents, the late L. T. (Shug) and Myrt Morgan

The original two room home was replaced by a large frame house encircled with a veranda and trimmed with the ginger bread that was popular in that era. This house caught fire from an over-heated wood stove in 1945 and burned to

the ground. Today's home sits on the site of the old house and the original stone cistern lies

underneath the kitchen floor. Pearl and her brother, the late Barney Rascoe, grew up on the farm and started to school at Birdville.

Later their father gave two acres of the family farm for a school to be located in a more central part of the community. Bill Dillon matched Shug Rascoe's two acres another two acres on the west side of the road and the school house that served the community for many years, was

The two and one half mile trek to school was cut down to less than half a mile for the Rascoes. The teachers

boarded at the Rascoe home. Pearl recalled that her forebears came to this part of

Texas from Tennessee after The War Between the States. There were three uncles, Uncle Tom Rascoe, Uncle Enoch Rascoe and Uncle Bill Rascoe. The older generation is buried at Oakland Cemetery

scattered. Pearl Rascoe and Melvin (Bud) Westerman were married September 24, 1921 at the courthouse in Comanche. The presiding county judge performed the ceremony, and the honeymoon was spent in Rising Star.

After living near Hasse for a short time the Westermans moved to the oil fields in West Texas where they resided until their return to the home place in 1960 to care for Grandfather

Their Golden Wedding reception was held at the Gorman Fire Department Hall in Gorman on September 24, 1971. The Westermans have two daughters, Geraldine Barker and June LaVerne Selman; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. One grandson was killed in an oil field rig accident near Fort Stockton at the age of 18 years

in 1966. Today the Rascoe farm lies idle from the crops of cotton and grain of yesterday. Light grazing is maintained for a small herd of cattle.

The giant Post Oak trees that encircle the grounds around the place have been there for more than one century. A clump of native Lantana and a giant crepe myrtle are in the front yard.

Pecan trees fill the back yard and spill over in the vegetable

The original barn still stands and is filled with hay. The "drive-through" underneath the hav loft will accomodate a wagon loaded with fodder. Petrified wood lies in a heap, placed there long ago by the hands of the late Shug Rascoe. A rick of Post Oak firewood gives proof of plenty of fuel for

the wood heater this winter. A brood of baby chickens follow a clucking hen across the yard and the family dog, Chico, escorted us to the car as we departed.

Hayden (Hayde) Barbee was born on May 27, 1894 in the Indian Territory that was to later become the state of Oklahoma.

His parents were B. F. (Ben) Barbee and Sallie Maddox Barbee. On moving to the Indian Mountain community the Barbees settled on the old Armstrong place and began raising cotton and grain along with their neighbors.

Hayden Barbee and Euna Pulley were wed in Gorman by a Baptist minister, who also doubled as the Justice of Peace, Rev. W. R. King.

To this couple were born the following children, Clyde, Ruby, Gilbreath, John, Sallie, and LeRoy. John was a victim of World War II. There are now nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The Barbees had no formal observation of their Golden Wedding anniversary as Hayde spent 104 days in Blackwell Hospital at Gorman with a heart condition. He stated that a number of friends did come by and recall the date to him. The Barbees spent their busy years in the Indian Mountain community. Hayde recalled that he and his late wife "sat up" with uncle Tom Marsh during his last illness. In those days no one was taken to a hospital, and neighbors took turns sitting at the

bedside.

During the years that the Barbee children attended school at Indian Mountain one of the big events was "Literary Night." The chief attractions were usually in the form of debates with sometimes as many as five on each team. Popular topics of the day were chosen by the debate teams. Havde said there were times that the top floor of the old school house held a "standing room only" crowd. Camp meetings were also held in the summer months on the school grounds. The different churches in the community took turns in holding services in the school house on alternating Sundays.

Hayde recalled his one year of attending school at Duster. His teacher was Clara Glover. The Barbees lived on the Heathington place at that time.

The Barbees moved to Gorman in 1964. Mrs. Barbee passed away on October 25. 1970 and since that time Hayde lives alone at the home in the edge of town near the

Gorman school grounds. His popular pasttime is fishing. Only Saturday he had enjoyed a day of his favorite sport at Lake Leon. He also has several good fishing spots and uses minnows for bait. We asked what he fished for and his reply was "Anything that

One of the principal landowners of the community was the late Uncle Lewis Echols and his good wife, Aunt Sarah, who were well-known and respected by their neighbors. Uncle Lewis was known for his good management and thrifty habits. He grew crops of cotton and grain.

The Echols' orchards are well-remembered for the abundance and variety of the fruit. The vineyards bordered on the orchard.

But Aunt Sarah's love was flowers. Even the fence was a blaze of glory and we recall the nosegays from her yard that the "sweet girl graduates" carried on graduation night. This was before the days of the cap and gown and each girl chose her favorite color for her graduation dress. Aunt Sarah had any color and any variety of flower for the big occasion.

She had a "baking day" and her stacks of pie crusts were always in readiness for unexpected company. The huge loaves of bread sent an aroma throughout the house that gave hungry boys and girls a "coming" appetite.

How many times we recall sliding down the big hay stack that had stalls around the huge stack where cows had munched their way into the feed. The huge old house was built around a cistern and a pulley and bucket brought up the cold rain water for a fresh

drink. The Steeles reside on the old Echols home site today.

As we drove back down the country lanes the sand storm reminded us that some things do not change.

Now at 95 when I hear some good old breakdown fiddling it makes my feet itch to get to the floor. A few words to the kids. Don't marry too young. Have all the clean fun you can and you will always remember your most memorable Christmas.


