





County Shares Travel Dollars

AUSTIN, -- Eastlano County received \$3,195,300 of the State's \$6,075,952,000 travel receipts in 1976, a national study missioned by the Texas Tourist Development

Agency has disclosed. In The 1976 figures reflect an increase of 13 percent in travel receipts over 1975 when Eastland County's business accounted travel for \$2,820,000.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Eastland County in 1976 had 120 of the state's 227,258 travel- related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$628,000.

TEXAS HAS BEST OVERALL BUSINESS CLIMATE IN NATION

Comptroller Bob Bullock presented Texans last week with a Christmas present 49 other states wish they had -- the Number 1 national ranking.

"I'm not talking about football, although we're Number 1 there, too," Bullock said. "What I'm referring to is that Texas holds the title for having the best overall business climate in the United States."

The Comptroller backed up his announcement by releasing a new report published by his office, entitled "Texas Means Busines." The report compares Texas with other states in terms of taxation, government spending as well as other economic factors.

"Texas is the only major state with neither a corporate nor a personal income tax," Bullock said. "And most of our other taxes are either lower than the national average or the lowest, period."

Bullock added that the 4-per cent state sales tax is right on the national average. "But

our receipts from that sales tax have grown faster than any other state -- 31 per cent over the past two years, compared to a national average of only 17 per cent."

He pointed out that Texas has the second lowest overall state tax burden per capita -only \$273, far below other major industrial states such as Michigan, where it's \$413. Pennsylvania, \$432, California \$500, or New York with \$541.

"On the other side of the coin, while most states talk about controlling government spending, Texans have done something about it," Bullock said. "Forty-seven other states spend more money per capita on state services than we do in Texas."

Bullock continued, "While seven other states were losing 565,000 jobs during the recession, the Texas economy was still growing and adding an additional 150,000 jobs. While Texas has had no new taxes since 1971, 39 other states were suffering tax increases."

It also estimated \$127,100 in state and \$27,300 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1976.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sec-

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's shore of the national travel market on a county- bycounty basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out- of- state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip. his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model

comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

LICENSE PLATE RENEWAL NOTICES

AUSTIN - License plate renewal notices for almost 11 million motor vehicles are in U.S. post offices throughout Texas for delivery to owners beginning the day after Christmas.

R.W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division, State Department of Highways and Public transportation, said the renewal notices were stuffed into envelpoes, pre-sorted by zip code, boxed and delivered to post offices to expedite delivery. Work to get the renewal notices ready for delivery started in early-October.

"The plate renewals for passenger cars and light trucks (such as pickups) will be different from last year. A new law requires that renewal dates be spread as equally as possible over 12 months, rather than have all expire at one time (April 1) each year," Townsley said.

Since the Motor Vehicle Division does not maintain records by owner's name or birth date, the license number of the vehicle has been used to determine the month of registration renewal in the future.

Renewal notices have been issued to reflect the number of months and the prorated fee to be paid to register each vehicle under the new system.

A complete explanation of the new system is enclosed

with each renewal notice for passenger card and light trucks (one ton or less). It is imperative that vehicle owners not lose the registration notice as it must be presented at the county tax

collection office to abtain new license plates. Because of the new system, registration may take longer this first year than ever before. The new law authorizes county tax assessors-collectors to start processing the renewals a

month early. Your county tax assessorcollectors is ready when you are - any time starting with the county's first work day in 1978.

"Look for your friendly postman to bring your license plate renewal notice shortly after Christmas," Townsley said. "Do yourself a favor -- take your renewal notice to your county tax offfice and register early. You'll be sorry if you don't -GP-


