County Fair Expands Programs For 1977

Prospects continue to look bright for another successful County Fair says Gerald Bint, Chairman of the Eastland County Fair Association. Several new fair features including a carnival and a pet show, plus expanded exhibits and booths should combine to make this, the second Annual County Fair both educational, entertaining and fun. Dates for the Fair this year are September 29, 30 and October 1. All Fair activities will take place at the Eastland County Livestock Show facilities which are located northwest of the city of Eastland on F.M. 3101.

Bint, of Cisco who is serving as Chairman of the Fair Association this year, said "that many fine people from all locations in the county are pulling together to make this county-wide event a giant success. People are hard at work finalizing plans for the many different activities that will make up this year's fair."

Some of the events that have been scheduled for the Fair include a County Hay show and Auction sponsored by the Young Farmers organization, a carnival sponsored by the County Home Demonstration Council, a concession stand filled with lots of good things to eat and drink, both commercial and educational booths sponsored by county businesses, clubs and other organizations, a fine arts show and of course competition in the various divisions which will include agriculture, horticulture, and living plants, and home crafts. The home crafts division is composed of baked goods, clothing, handwork and preserved foods. Many of the divisions will be sub-divided into age groups.

Workers for the divisions are located in all parts of Eastland County. They are urging all county residents to participate in this year Fair.

The success of the fair is dependent upon the good participation and support shown by all county people. People who are interested in learning more details about a particular division are invited to contact any of the people working in that division. A complete set of Fair rules and regulations will be printed in all county papers as soon as possible.

FARM DRYER CLINIC SLATED HERE SEPT. 14

All owners of farm peanut dryers are urged to attend a peanut drying clinic set for September 14 at the First National Bank in Gorman. It will start at 10 a. m. and end by noon.

Speakers for the clinic will be Dr. Leland Tripp, Dr. Thomas A. "Chip" Lee, Richard Withers and James S. Denton, all of Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Others on the program will include: Tom Birdsong of Birdsong Peanuts and Ross Wilson, Manager of Southwestern Peanuts Growers' Association.

Discussion topics will include: Things to do from now until harvest, preventing segregation 3 peanuts, and proper operation of the on-farm dryer. Other topics will be: a peanut buyer's view of peanut quality, and the effect of quality on sale or loan value of peanuts.

The 1977 peanut harvest season is near. An essential part of making a profit from peanuts is to deliver a high quality crop to the market place. Good peanut dryer techniques help to maintain the quality that industry wants and results in more money for the grower.

All peanut growers are invited to the clinic. Many of the discussion topics will be of interest to all growers and not just of those who own dryers.

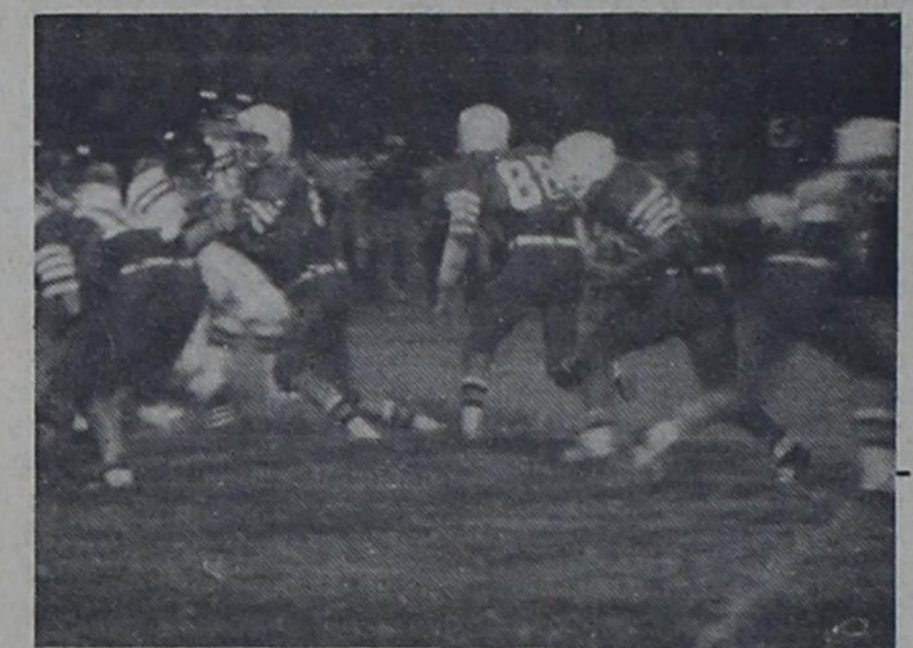

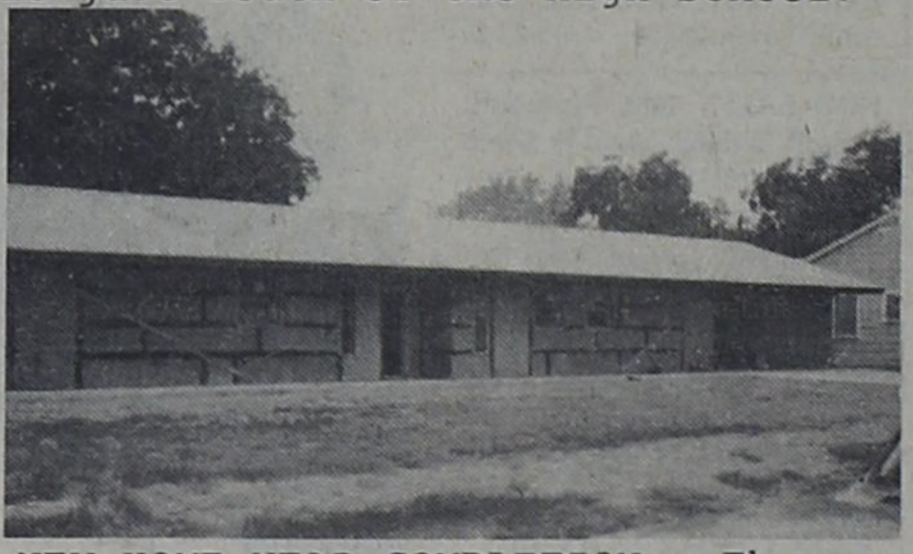

GORMAN NURSES TO HOST LNVA MEETING MONDAY

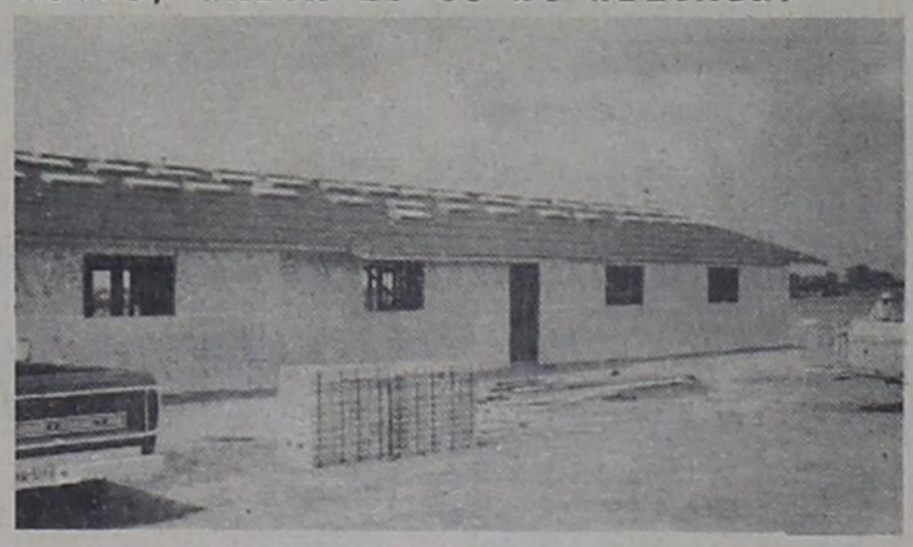

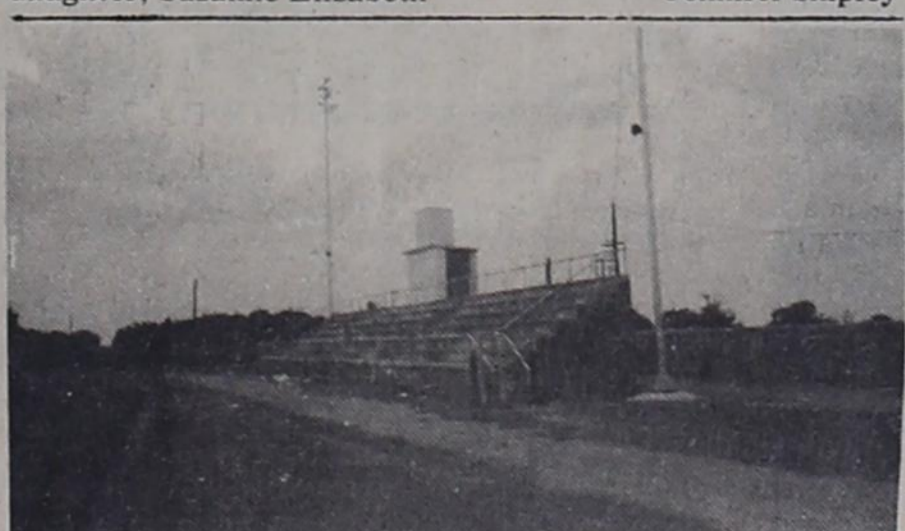

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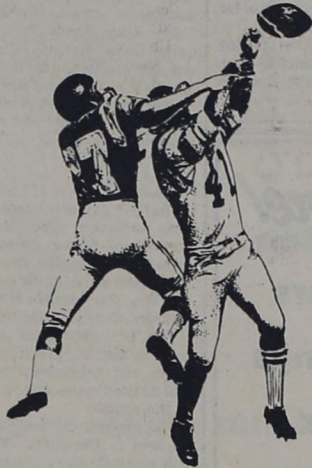
George Hedrick, TESCO senior electrical engineer, inspects a lignite coal-fired plant at Martin Lake. In 1983 four such units will be in operation there.

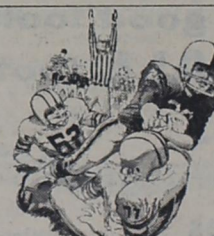

County Officers Speak At Drug Meeting

Citizens of Gorman interested in the drug problems of the town met September 1, in the Methodist Fellowship Hall to hear Emory Walton, District Attorney of Eastland County and County Sheriff, Ronnie White discuss the local drug abuse problem.

A film showing actual drug abusers was viewed.

When asked why young people become involved in drugs the authorities agreed that there is no specific answer but seemed to agree that drug abuse begins as experimentation and is continued in order to be "in" and for other psychological reasons.

Authorities (law and education) agreed that the person most able to be aware of and control drug abuse is the parent or guardian of the minor child. It was stressed that parents should be aware of and involved with the child at an early age and be especially sensitive to the pre-teen and teenagers emotional highs and lows.

If you suspect your child is involved in drugs there are a few symptoms to look for: listlessness, pupil dilation, nervous mannerisms, strange odor in clothing and/or hair, change in friends and many more. (one symptom does not constitute drug abuse).

The group was also told that possession of a nd - or smoking a marijuana cigarette is punishable as a class B misdemeanor.
