MIKE KEITH TO PARTICIPATE IN NATO GAMES

AUGUST 31 -- Navy Airman Michael J. Keith, son of Mack J. Keith and Renelda R. Keith of P.O. Box 13, Gorman, Texas, is participating in the major NATO exercises "Bold Guard '78" and "Northern Wedding '78" in northern Europe.

He is assigned to the amphibious assault ship USS Guadalcanal, homeported in Norfolk, Va.

"Bold Guard '78" and "Northern Wedding '78" are designed to refine coordination, command and control capabilities in the external reinforcement of NATO's northern flank and in conducting combined land operations. Taking place over wide areas of the Eastern Atlantic, North Sea and English Channel, maneuvers will include amphibious landings in the Shetland Islands and Southern Norway. A large scale landing on the west coast of Denmark's Jutland Peninsula will be followed by an overland movement of the combined allied forces for large scale maneuvers in Germany.

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The Panthers come into this season following last year's fine showing in the Class B ranks and De Leon is again rated high in Class A ranks. Both the Panthers and the Bearcats lost some key players by graduation, but both are expected to have fine ball clubs again this year.

The Panthers lost four starters last season but with the fine workouts that they have had the Big Red have some real fine players to step in and take over the positions which had to be filled. Gorman has shown some bright spots in scrimmages with Goree and Newcastle and are looking forward to the opening game Friday night. They have really put in some tough practice sessions in preparation for the upcoming season

Wagley, a spry 81 now, is Ranger's largest employer. He paid our \$1.5 million in salaries to his 145 employees last year and is in the middle of an expansion program that will mean another 50 jobs.

"I just kind of came here from Abilene and stayed," Wagley said. "My wife stayed in Abilene and said I'd be back in six months. Well, now I have a house there and one here and I go to Abilene on weekends."

Wagley's company has been bought by Tiger International, but he's under a three-year management contract.

"They asked me what I knew about the business, and I told them nothing, but I know people," he said. "That seemed to be what they wanted to hear."

The company focuses on tank cars and hopper cars, and can handle repairs and conditioning from the wheels up.

Located on a sprawling lot miles long, Texas Railway Car Corp. had 350 cars in the year awaiting and others strung on sidings awaiting admission.

"We told 'em all we couldn't handle any more and to stop sending them," Wagley said. "But apparently some of them didn't get the word."

Wagley and his employees are quick to point out that recent industry survey showed his company first in preference for such work.

On a 100-plus degree day workers in the years were still smiling, receiving friendly waves from Wagley as he drove by. "I think of them all as my children—or grandchildren," he said.

What all those kids do out there is weld, straighten, sandblast, clean, stencil, fix and inspect cars that are boken, dirty or damaged. A company team often drives or flies to railroad wreck scenes to accomplish transfer of chemicals from leaking or burning cars into safe ones that can be hauled away.

Back in Wagley's office, the talk turns to the city of Ranger.

"Some of the people will tell you that there were 50,000 people living here during the oil boom (there are now around 3,300)," Wagley said.

"We're doing well and there are a lot of other people doing well," he said. "The Key is people. These are all good people our here. That's what we need. Good people."

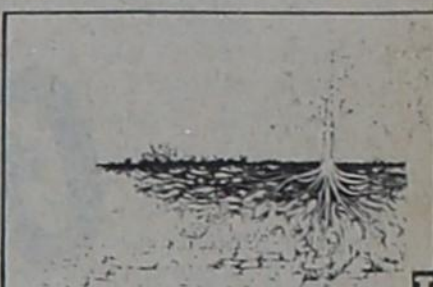

IS YOUR SOIL all it should be?

To increase alkalinity, use finely ground limestone. To increase acidity, use flowers of sulfur. Both cures are available at most garden supply centers, as is peat moss, which is mildly acidic.

A new book for gardeners, the Reader's Digest Illustrated Guide to Gardening, points out that of the 16 elements known to be necessary to plant growth, three—carbon, hydrogen and oxygen—come from the air and water. The rest are from the soil. Nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are needed in the largest amounts, are used up the fastest and are therefore the chief ingredients of most fertilizers.

Keeping the right amount of the right chemicals in your garden soil can make a better garden more of a sure thing.

EASTLAND (RNS) — An Abilene architecture firm has been hired by the Eastland County Commissioners to draw up plans for the new county jail.

The commissioners at their regular meeting Monday hired the Abilene firm of Boone and Polk to prepare the designs so that bids could be called for by Jan. 1.

In other business, the commissioners set the road and bridge tax rate at 30 cents per \$100 valuation as passed in the Aug. 12 elec-

tion.

Sheriff R.B. White was granted permission to hire three new jail guards, making a total of five jail employees. Currently an Eastland couple manages the jail.

The commissioners accepted a low bid of \$5,055, submitted by Fullen Motor Co., for a new pickup truck to be used in Precinct 4. The list price of the truck was \$6,849.70 with a trade-in allowed on a 1972 pickup of \$1,790.70.

A Very Unboring Barbecue For Two

It's patio season, and you are planning a romantic dinner for two *à la fresco*. How do you produce a really interesting meal with a minimum of fuss and bother? Try this elegant and delicious version of meat on a skewer: Beef Kabobs à la Grecque.

Designed to please a discerning palate, these kabobs are an interesting combination of garden-fresh vegetables—zucchini slices and whole mushrooms as well as onion and green pepper wedges—plus marinated sirloin steak. (When you're feeding just two, you can afford to splurge a little on the entrée.)

What gives these kabobs a special gourmet flavor is the Greek style marinade. A robust red sauce, its sophisticated taste is a happy blend of sauteed garlic and onion, hearty Contadina tomato paste, lemon juice, salt and cummin. Let the steak cubes rest in this Mediterranean marinade a good four hours in the refrigerator. Additional sauce should be used to baste the kabobs while cooking.

To carry out the Greek flavor of the meal, serve a rice pilaff with the kabobs and a marinated vegetable salad. Soak cucumbers, black olives and chopped pimientos in oil and vinegar, then serve on a bed of lettuce leaves with a sprinkling of feta cheese on top. Pass a basket of crusty bread, torn into chunks and spread with sweet butter.



For dessert, the perfect pastry is baklava—that super-sweet cake made up of infinite leaves of crunchy pastry drenched in honey and pine nuts. (Call local Greek and Armenian grocers as well as restaurants to find out who sells baklava in your area.) An alternate dessert suggestion is a tangy lemon soufflé.

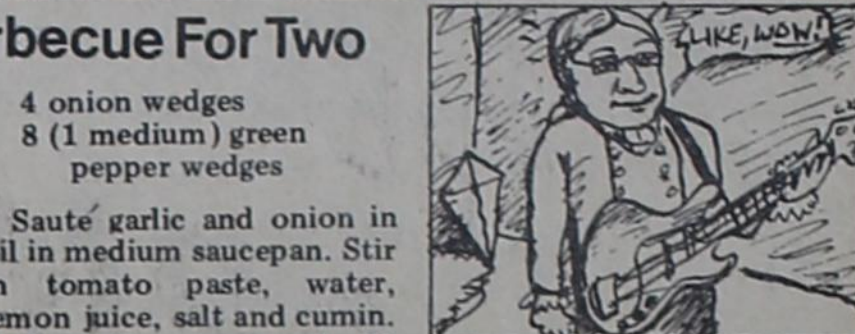

GORDON SPOT

It will soon be time to spray your pecan trees for the control of the pecan weevil. Some pecan growers have found weevils on their trees, but the infestation has been light so far. In the coming weeks we expect a heavy infestation of the weevils.

There are two reasons to expect a heavy infestation of weevils. The pecan weevil has a two year life cycle and two years ago the infestation was heavy. The soil moisture in most areas of Eastland is ideal for emergence of the weevils.

The adult weevil is a brownish weevil about three eighths long. The weevil's snout is as long as the body. If the weevil punctures the pecan while it is in the water stage the nut falls. After the nut kernels have hardened, the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little pickets in the nuts. Creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads hatch and feed inside the nuts during the fall, completely consuming the kernel and finally reaching a length of about three fifths inch. The grubs then chew a hole about 1/8 inch in diameter in the shell, emerge from the nut and drop to the ground in late fall or winter. They burrow into the ground where they stay for two years.

Jarring of limbs gives an indication of weevil presence in trees. To accomplish this, place a large sheet under a tree and jar the limbs with a padded pole. Weevils will drop to the ground and remain motionless for a short period of time.

When you find an average of three weevils per tree control measures should be applied. Two to four applications of Carbaryl (Sevin) made at 4 to 12 day intervals will give effective control of the adult pecan weevil.

Sevin should be used at the rate of 3 pounds of 80 percent wettable powder or 4 pounds of 50 percent wettable powder per 100 gallons of water. When using any pesticide, read and follow the directions given on the pesticide label carefully and use the

insecticide only as directed. Mulches are important for the fall vegetable garden to conserve moisture and reduce soil temperature. But gardeners should be aware that diseases and insect pests can be introduced with some mulches.

For example, nematodes can be brought into the garden, particularly when using peanut hulls as a mulch. Peanut hulls do serve as a carrier of root knot and lesion nematodes which attack garden vegetables.

In addition to the nematode problem, organic mulches such as grass clippings, leaves and plant debris have the possibility of increasing a disease known as Southern blight. Southern blight is a fungus that lives on organic material in or near the soil surface. During the summer after an extremely dry period followed by scattered

The base of the plants may show a white fungal growth with small light tan to dark brown structures the size of a pin head or so. These are sclerotia, the overwintering bodies of or Southern blight. These will drop off the plant and remain in the soil for the next crop season.

Certain diseases such as Southern blight as well as nematodes can be avoided by using plastic or paper mulch.

Of course, large amounts of organic material are good for the soil, so we suggest working the material into the soil as deep as possible so that it can decompose at a lower level. Composting organic materials before applying them to the garden also helps in disease prevention.
