GRANT APPROVED

Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a Farmer Home Administrative Grant in the amount of \$43,500 to the West Central Texas Council of Governments for comprehensive planning. The council will develop a required strategy to implement improvement in housing, community facilities and business industrial development with local gain government and citizens involved in the planning and process and emphasis placed on meeting the needs of low income and minority residents. Counties involved are Callahan, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent Knox, Mitchell, Runnels, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Nolan, Scurry and Taylor.

Grant funds may be used to hire professional, technical clerical staff to carry out rural comprehensive planning and evaluation and to work tests or surveys necessary for the planning activity.

The Gorman Panthers took on another strong Class A ball team last Friday night and really put the Dublin Lions to the test before losing the game which was still in doubt until the final play of the game when a Panther pass was intercepted and returned for a touchdown on

the final tick of the clock. The Panthers don't owe anyone any apologies for their performances the first 2 weeks of the season as they have taken on two strong teams and have given both of them all they wanted in close games. We have heard some talk about the boys letting down some, but folks don't you believe it. These kids are putting 100% into every play and every game. So lets all support them and give them our encouragement for the games to come. The Panthers will do alright this season.

The Big Red defense held the Lions to only a total of 229 yards on offense while compiling 211 on the ground and 50 yards in the air. If the Panthers could have rested some of their players like the Lions were able to do it could have made a lot of difference in the outcome. 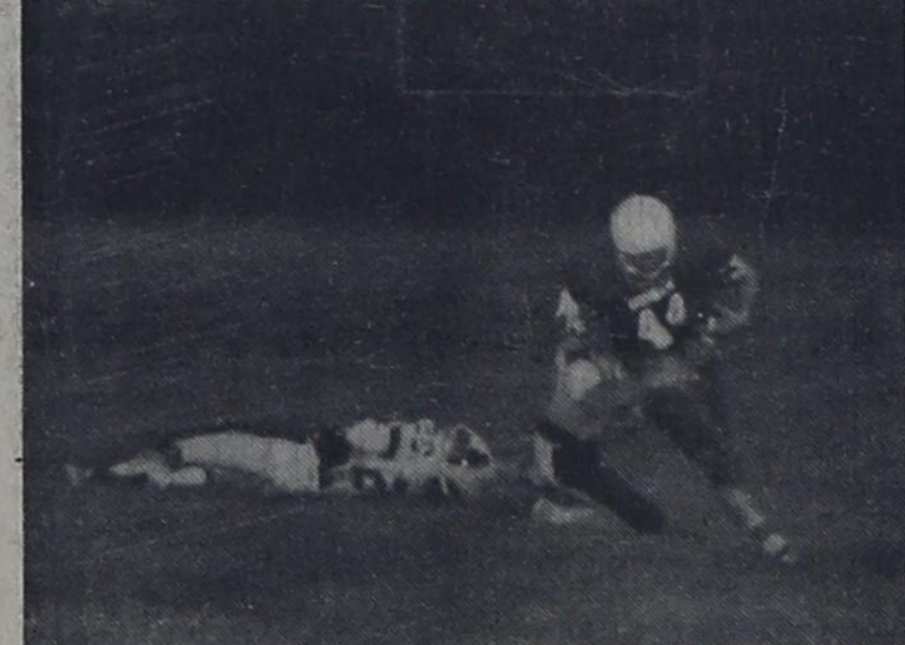

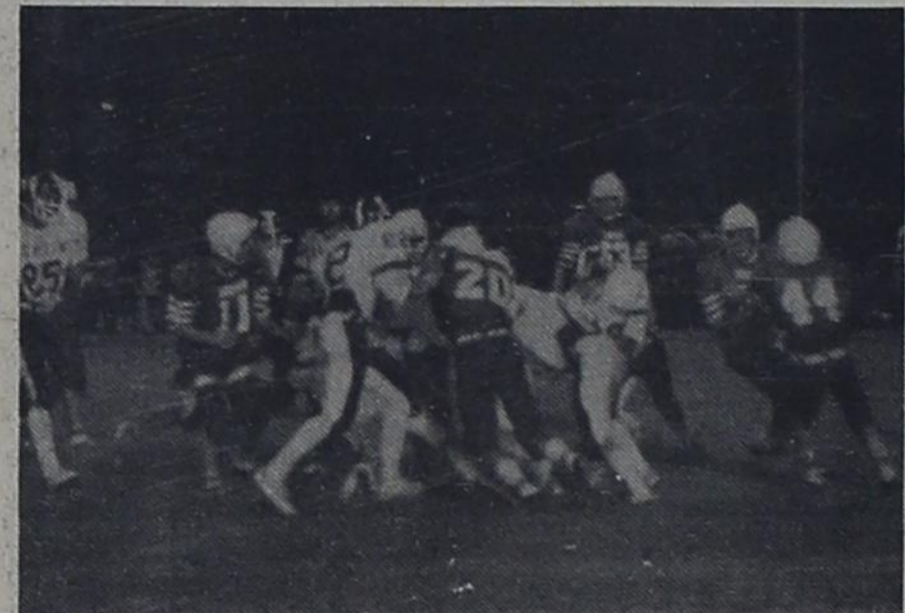

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise indebtedness or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit for fire-fighting purposes."

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."



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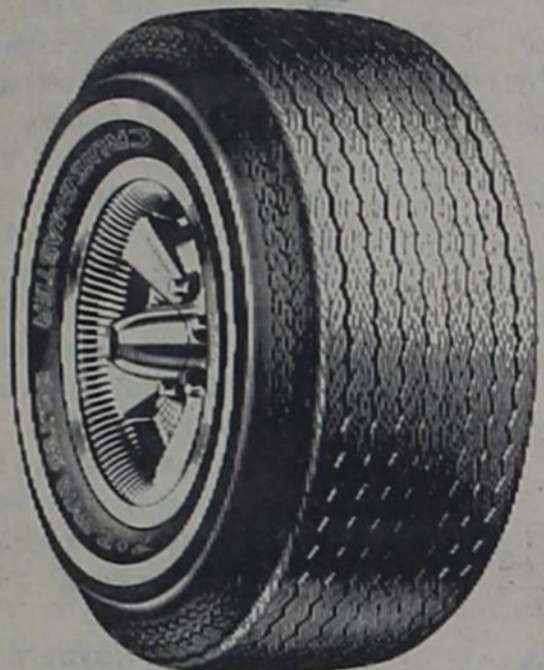

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The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Sometimes it's hard to say "no" to a door-to-door salesman, even one selling something you don't particularly need or want.

And many Texas consumers find only after that persuasive sales pitch has ended and the salesman has departed with a signed contract that they could have bought the same or a similar item in stores all over town, sometimes at a much lower price than they had agreed to pay.

But our Attorney General's Consumer Protection attorneys point out that there is an important protective device for Texans who find they made a mistake in purchasing goods or services in their home. It's the Texas Home Solicitation Act, passed by the Legislature in 1973 and amended in 1975.

Under this law, a consumer who is solicited at his home by someone selling goods or services that cost \$25 or more, or real estate costing \$100 or more, has a chance to change his mind.

The act gives consumers the right to cancel a home solicitation transaction up until midnight of the third business day following the day the contract was signed.

The person soliciting the sale must furnish the consumer with a copy of the contract or a fully completed receipt before leaving the premises. In it, the date of the transaction, name and address of the seller, and a notice of the right to cancel must be printed in large, dark type near the spot on the contract reserved for the buyer's signature.

In addition, the law requires that a completed "notice of cancellation" be attached to the contract or receipt for the consumer to use if he decides to cancel the sale. If the seller receives such a cancellation

from the consumer, he must return any payment or contract within 10 business days.

One important point for the thousands of Spanish-speaking Texans is that the contract or receipt, the notice of right to cancel, and the completed cancellation notice must be in the same language the salesman used for his sales pitch. In other words, if the salesman spoke Spanish, everything must be written in Spanish.

The act also states that the seller cannot transfer your contract to a finance company or other third party until midnight of the fifth business day after your contract was signed.

Additionally, the seller must pick up any merchandise or title to realty he sold you within 20 days after cancellation or you can keep them with no obligation.

However, our attorneys point out that consumers who want to cancel a home solicitation sale also have some obligations under the law. To cancel such a sale, a purchaser must mail or deliver a signed, dated copy of the cancellation notice or his own written notice, or must send a telegram to that effect to the seller no later than midnight of the third business day after the sale. Our lawyers recommend sending a registered letter or a telegram so you have proof the seller received the notice.

And protection under this law does not extend to purchase of farm equipment; insurance regulated by the State; real estate sales where the buyer is represented by his lawyer; or where the transaction is made by the licensed real estate broker; sales made according to a

preexisting retail charge account or agreement; or sales where the two parties had previously met and negotiated at a business office where the goods or services were offered or displayed.

Our attorneys point out that a violation of the Home Solicitation Act is also a violation of the Deceptive Trade Practices Act, and that a person who believes such a violation has occurred should contact our Consumer Protection Division in Austin, Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Lubbock,

The heart of the concept, the solar collector and space heating system, provides for approximately 540 square feet of flat plate solar collector panels that capture heat through a 50 percent glycol and water solution.

This liquid solution transfers heat through a heat exchanger into a 550 gallon insulated storage tank. From the storage tank, it is circulated through a series of fin tubes built into the air-handling unit which circulates the warmed air throughout the building. The system is expected to provide 70 percent of the facility's heat requirements, backed-up by a conventional heatpump system. The building's temperature can be sustained for two to three sunless days without help.

While there are several solar-oriented projects in the immediate area, Olney Savings' solar venture is one of the first commercial buildings to be developed without the help of federal funds. Though the concept is certainly no major technological break-through,

it is an innovative and timely contribution to the energy conservation effort in the North Texas region.

Rose Construction Company, Abilene, was the General Contractor for the construction of a new branch office building located on the Eastland County Courthouse square. Designed by Lambert-Dunham Associates, a Wichita Falls based architectural firm, the branch office for the savings and loan association was designed to blend into the rural-urban atmosphere and allude to a Texas county courthouse square.

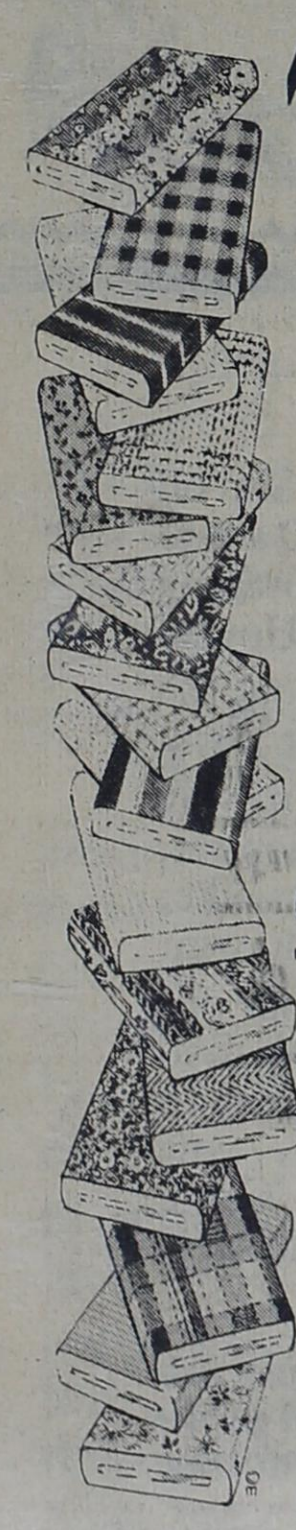

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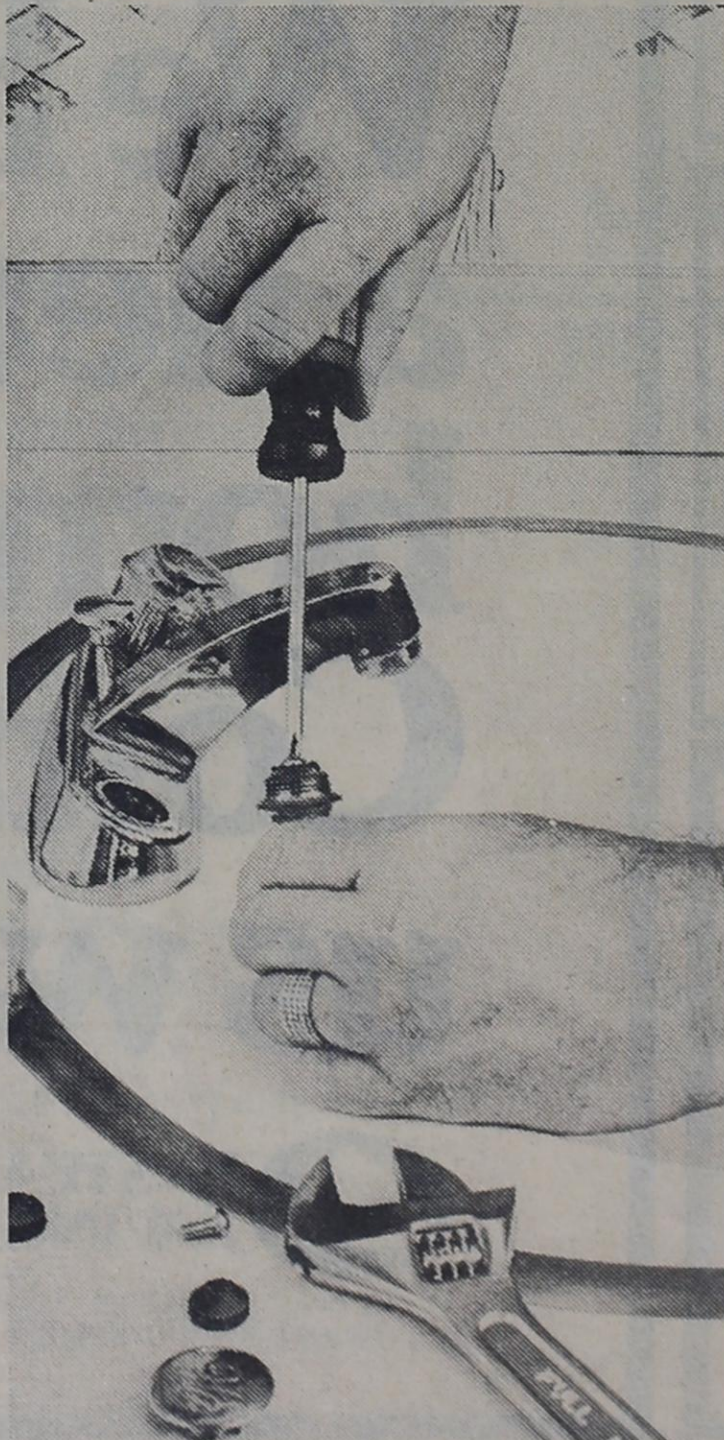


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
