The Panthers scored first in the big battle when they took the ball on their own 47 yard line and in just two plays the Big Red went the distance. Blaine Gibbs got about 7 yards on the first play and then the bomb went off, as Jimmy Johnson got the pitch and went to the outside and outran everyone on a beautiful 48 yard run for the touchdown with 3:44 left in the first period. The kick for point was blocked and Gorman led 6-0.

This score held up until the third period when the Elks got the ball on a short punt by the Panthers and took over on the Gorman 31 and went the distance in 7 plays with Mark Kyle getting the final 5 yards with 3:01 left in the quarter. Watkins booted the extra point and the Elks led 7-6.

After a pass interception on their own 47 yard line the Elks took the ball and moved in for the score in 6 plays with Troy Alexander coming up with a completion after the ball had been tipped in the air by a Panther defender and scored from 30 yards out with 9:25 left in the period. A pass try for two points failed and the score read 13-6.

The Panthers fell short on their next possession, but then proceeded to stop the Elks and forced them to punt. Then the bomb went off again as Jimmy Johnson caught the punt without even breaking stride and went right through the Elks defenders, breaking numerous tackles and with sheer determination went 62 yards for the score to give the Panthers 6 more points. This happened with just 5:42 left on the clock. Then came the big decision for the Panthers, and they chose correctly as they went for the win and tried for the two point play. Blaine Gibbs took the pitch-out to his left and behind a fine block by Bob Hagood and another good block on the outside by Jamie Snider, Blaine rammed into the end zone for the go-ahead points and made the score 14 to 13.

The game wasn't over, however as the Elks took the kickoff and moved down the field with time running out and moved to the Panther 12 yard line before the Panther defense exerted its muscle and held the Elks on fourth down and two and took over the ball on their own 12 yard line and ran out the remain-

ing time on the clock for the victory.

This was a tough victory for the Panthers as they seemed to have trouble playing defense against the big Elk offensive team. However the Big Red came through when they had to and got the victory.

Johnson led the Panthers with 80 yards on the ground in 9 carries and also had 62 more yards on the punt return. He had another good punt return as the Panthers fielded the punts instead of letting them hit and roll and put them in good shape after the punts. Gibbs got 63 yards on 18 trips. Larry Keith had 13 yards on 3 carries and almost broke into the clear on one of the runs. Billy Simpson had 2 yards on 4 keeps.

The Panthers will be hard pressed again this week as they host a very tough Lometa team on Saturday night in the homecoming game. The Lometa team has beaten the Eden Bulldogs this season and also the Rising Star Wildcats. The Panthers will have to return to their tough defensive play this week to hold this fine offensive team and keep their district record unblemished. And we think that the Panthers have the stuff necessary to do just that. As you know they always seem to come through when the going gets tough.

Lets remember to give the praise that is deserved to the fine blocking of the front line players that allows the runners to make yardage. Lets give the boys a pat on the back and urge them on to victory this week.

Go Get 'Em Panthers! Remember, game time is 7:30.

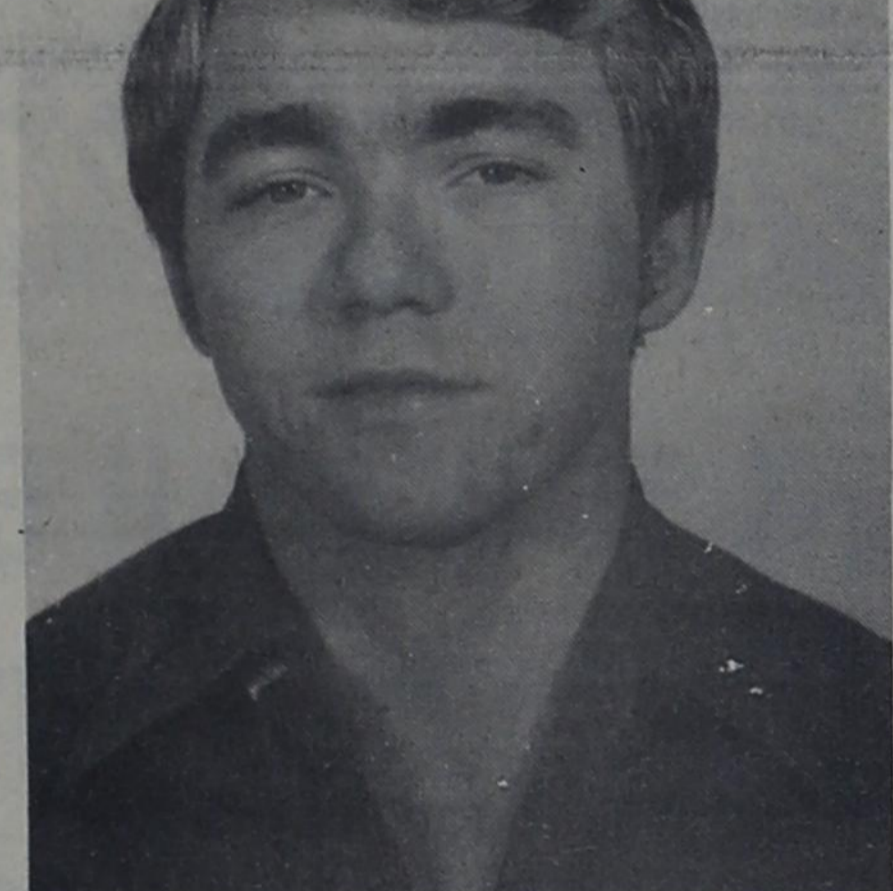
