City Chit Chat

The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on January 8, 1981 with all Commissioners except Mr. Higginbotham present. Others present at the meeting were Mrs. Brinegar, Mr. Funderburg, Mrs. Ingram, and Mr. Ake.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mr. Funderburg reported for the Police Department for the last month. Showing that they had issued 24 traffic citations that consisted of several types of violations. They had made several arrests, three for DWI, 2 for public intoxication, one assault, and one for possession of Controlled Substance. They had made thirteen investigations for various complaints. They provided two funeral escorts and assisted two stranded motorists. They had assisted the County Sheriff's office on one call.

I would like to express the appreciation of the Commission for the work that the Police Department is doing. We are aware of the fact that

there are complaints from time to time, but it is our feeling that as long as we all obey the law, we will have very little room for complaint for these men who are out there to provide for our safety.

Mrs. Ingram reported for the City Court. She reported that there were 51 complaints filed during December. 42 fines were collected in the amount of \$1,082.00. Nine cases were dismissed and there are 17 cases pending at the close of December. The Christmas and New Year's weekends were a very busy time for all of our law enforcement people.

Mrs. Brinegar gave us a financial statement for the month of December which showed that we had a cash balance of \$6,204.06 in the bank and a balance of \$20,025.51 in the savings account which consists of two \$10,000.00 money market certificates. This may seem like a good balance, and it is, but remember that about 65% of the taxes are in and revenue will not be as great

for the remainder of the year.

All that I can tell you about the request for the Block Grant is that the application has been filed with all agencies and that Mr. Gary Smith from WCTCOG told me that from what they had seen and information that they gave in the application looked very good, but we will not know for some time what action the Federal Agency will take on the request.

We spent quite some time with Mr. Ake, the representative for Lone Star Gas Company discussing the proposed new rate for Gorman. We had prepared materials to present to him that would compare the present total bills with bill using the same amounts of gas under the proposed rates. Mr. Smith proposed rates. Mr. Ake had worked up two residence and three commercial bills to show these comparisons. We questioned him on several of the figures that he presented in the request. He was very nice in discussing these points with us and agreed that they were valid points for discussion. He agreed that we would give some further information to the press about the rate increase explaining that with the Gas Cost Adjustment that the new bill might cause bills to increase more than the 17.6% that has been shown in the announcement for the proposed change.

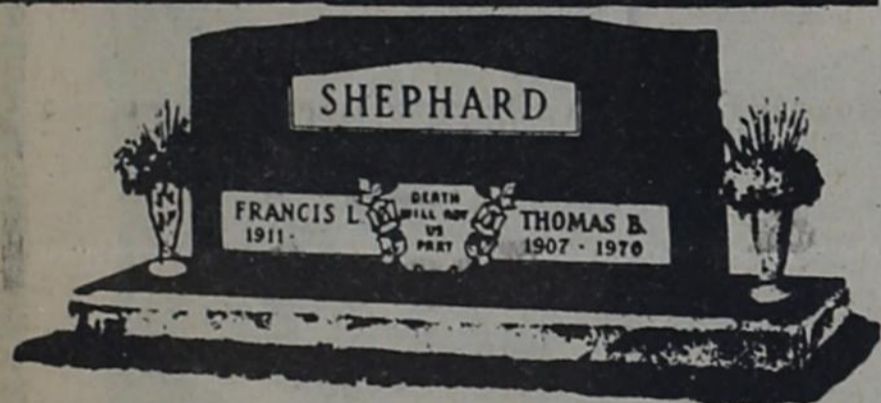

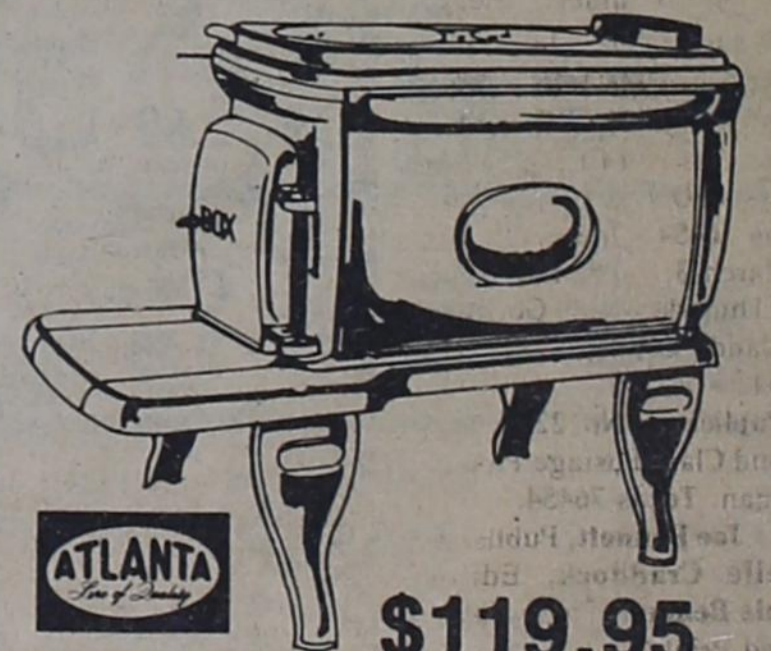
