City Plans for the Rural Resource Team

The City of Gorman is hosting a Rural Resource Team visit during the week of April 25-27. The community sponsors of this event are the Gorman Economic Development Corporation, the Gorman Chamber of Commerce and the City of Gorman.

The Resource Team is being invited into our community to perform several tasks. 1) They will be developing an objective community assessment based on community input, 2) They will be holding Listening Sessions for the community-at-large, 3) They will conduct a Resource Team Town Meeting, 4) They will compile a Resource Team Report for the community, complete with Resource Team Members & #8217; personal recommendations, and 5) They will provide Post-visit support and follow-up.

The Resource Team is made up of a panel of knowledgeable individuals from outside the community who are actively involved in some area of rural community development. These members are Ronnie Boston from North Texas Resource Conservation & Development, Dr. Joe McFarland, the resident Director of Research with Texas A&M (Stephenville), Faith Ballard, supervisor of consumer and Family affairs with Extension Agency, Tom Mann from the West Central Texas Council of Government, Patricia Butler with USDA Rural Development, and Ed Ellis from HUD Community Builders Program.

These Resource Team members volunteer their time and services as a member of this group in order to make the visit possible for small rural cities to afford such an elaborate evaluation. The cost of such a visit would be in excess of \$15,000-\$20,000 if the City of Gorman were to hire a consultant firm for this type of in-depth evaluation. In consideration for this, the City is responsible for arranging food and lodging for the members and extending a great effort to get the community to attend the Listening Sessions.

The community is invited to attend these Listening Sessions, which are held all day on Wednesday and on Thursday morning and early afternoon. There are the three questions that all who will attend will be asked to answer:

- 1) What are the major problems and challenges in our community?
 - 2) What are the major strengths and assets of our community?
 - 3) What projects would you like to see accomplished in your community in the next two, five, ten and twenty years?
- On Thursday night the Resource team will hold a Town Meeting. During the Town Meeting the Listening

Session responses are read, a preview of the recommendations of the Resource Team will be given and there will be a time for questions and answers.

In an effort to encourage as much community participation as possible, community sectors have been established. *However, it is very important for all to know that everyone is invited to these Listening Sessions. You do NOT have to have a personal invitation or have previously attended any of the town meetings to come. JUST COME!*

"Community Waters" Theme of 2000

Soil and Water Stewardship Week

Keeping community waters clean and plentiful is a common goal all Americans should embrace, according to organizers of the 2000 SOIL AND WATER STEWARDSHIP WEEK, set for April 30 to May 7. The focus of this year's national observance is on the total watershed management approach to natural resource conservation.

A watershed is defined as an area of land that sheds water into a common water body, such as a river or lake. There are thousands of identified watersheds in America. Since we all live in a watershed, what we do in our own backyard has important consequences to everyone else who lives downstream from us.

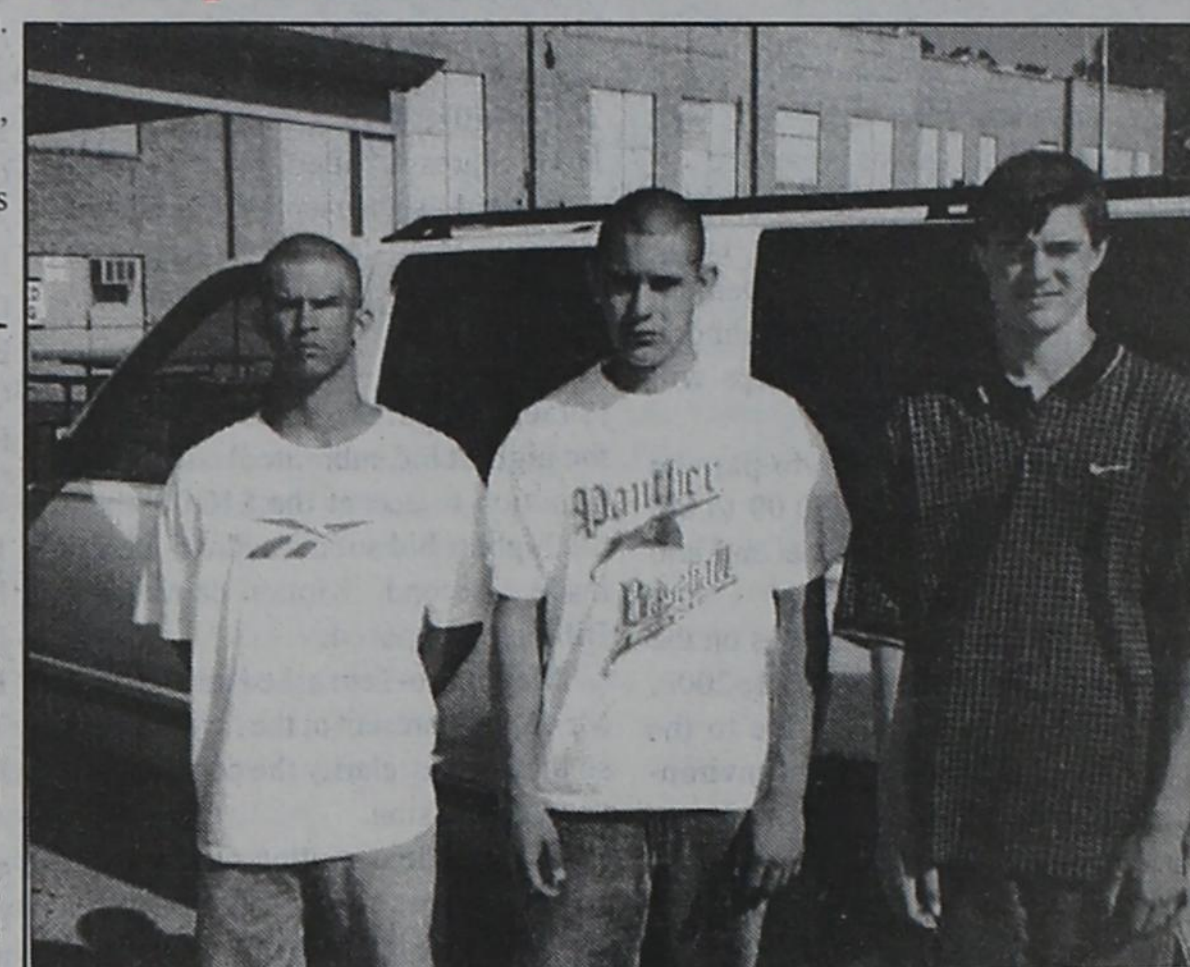
"Developing a positive stewardship attitude is important as we work together to maintain an adequate supply of clean water," said Norman Moore, chairman of the Upper Leon soil and Water Conservation District, local sponsor of this year's Soil and Water Stewardship Week. "Our local conservation district would like to help take the leadership to bring all interested group and individuals together to discuss how to improve the health of our own watershed," he said.

The abundance of good, clean water in our communities is not guaranteed as some kind of right. Rather, it is a resource that must be earned and re-earned as time passes and conditions change. While overall per capita consumption of water has decreased in the last decade, water conservation efforts should never be abandoned. Modern conservation efforts are now focused on ways to keep our natural water supply system clean, helping to keep down costs in water treatment facilities. For example, farmers are now installing grassed waterways and filter strips along the edges of the fields and streams to prevent soil and nutrients from being washed into major streams. Similar good management practices are being installed around construction sites and large building and parking lots in suburban and urban areas.

The technology is available to ensure a clean water supply. The real challenge, according to Moore, is to develop the collective community and political will to get the job done.

Mayor Pro-Tem called the meeting to order at 5:27 p.m.

"Speaking the Truth in Love"

(Eph. 4:15)

Biblical truths brought to you by the Church of Christ in Gorman

Jesus "still has" ALL authority over His church. Not "had" or "will have," but currently "has" ALL authority over His church. In Matthew 28:18 Jesus said that He had been given ALL authority both in Heaven and on earth and He never relinquished His authority to anyone. We have already seen that the authority of Jesus is found in His word and no man or group of men can, with Jesus' approval, assume Jesus' authority. And yet men have done this throughout the centuries!

Jesus is "right now" reigning as King over His kingdom, which is the church (Mark 9:1; Acts 1:1-8; 2:1-47). Jesus is "right now" in Heaven on His throne (Acts 2:30-33) ruling at the right hand of God, the Father (1 Pet. 3:22). How do we know that Jesus is still reigning as King? The Bible says that, "...he must reign, till he had put all enemies under his feet. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death (1 Cor. 15:25-26). We know that Jesus is still reigning because people are still dying. Jesus has all authority over His church because of what He did for His church. He was the One who founded it (1 Cor. 3:11), who built it (Matt. 16:18) and who purchased it (Acts 20:28). Jesus has all authority over His church because of what He is to His church. He is the only authorized Head of it (Eph. 1:22-23), Teacher of it (Matt. 11:28-30), Savior of it (Eph. 5:23), Door into it (John 10:1, 7-9) and Access to God for the church (John 14:6). Jesus has all authority over His church because of what He will do with His church. Next week want to develop these points as we continue with the authority of Jesus Christ.

But what about you today? Have you obeyed God's Plan of Salvation? Have you obeyed the Gospel (2 Thess. 1:7-9)? Jesus said one must HEAR the word of God (John 5:24) and BELIEVE that Jesus is the Son of God (John 8:24). One must REPENT (Luke 13:3) and CONFESS that Jesus is the Son of God (Matt. 10:32-33). One must then submit to New Testament WATER BAPTISM for the washing of ones past sins by the blood of Christ (Mark 16:16; Acts 22:16; Rev. 1:5-6). The Rural Community Schools Rebuilding Program will provide rural school with access to as much as \$1.2 billion in financing to repair school buildings, acquire new equipment, develop course materials and train teachers and other school personnel. Par-

icipating lenders can offer interest-free loans in return for federal tax credits. USDA will guarantee up to 90 percent of the amount a school borrows from a private lender.

"Many Rural communities face steep challenges in keeping their school facilities and programs competitive," said Rominger. "The funding provided by this new partnership will help rural schools improve educational opportunities for this new century."

The Schools Rebuilding program will host workshops in rural communities to train community leaders in developing plans to obtain financing. In its first year, the Program will be implemented on a pilot basis in Mississippi, North Carolina, North Dakota, and Texas.

The program is a joint effort between USDA's Rural Housing Service and Organizations concerned about Rural Education, a coalition of businesses and not-for-profit organizations. It includes the American Association of School Administrators, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, Bell Atlantic, U.S. West Communications, the National Education Association, and the National Farmer's Union.



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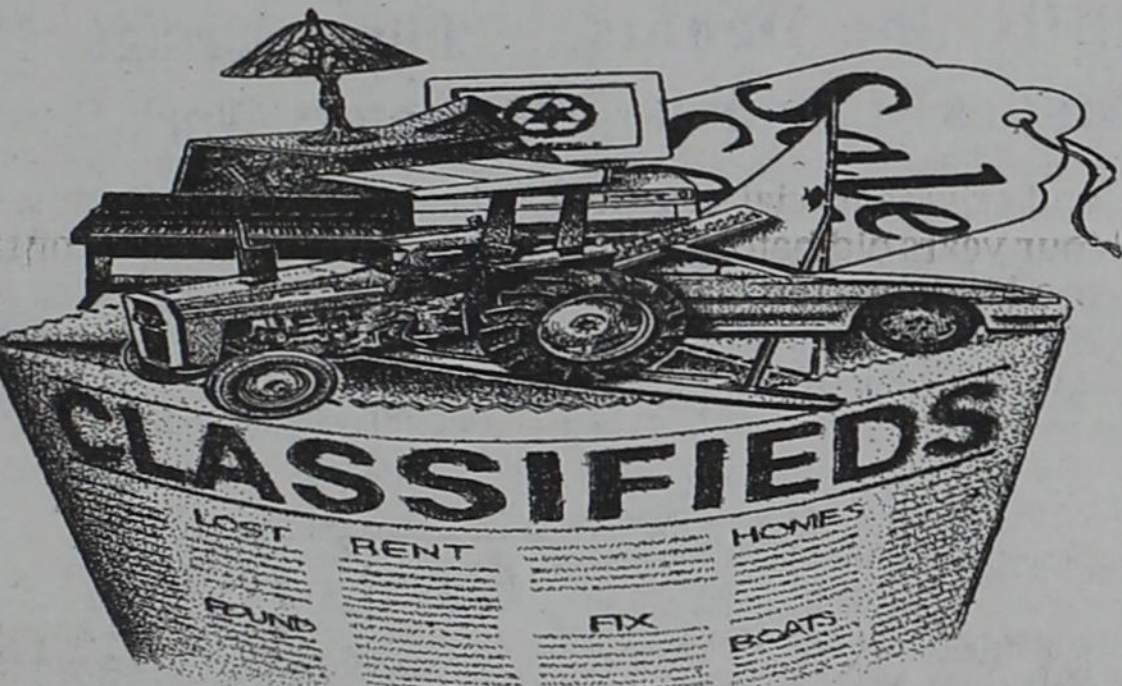
