

Lucy Dubuis, Texas Electric Information Dept.: "Check your air conditioner's filter monthly to make sure it's not blocking

"Now that temperatures and electric bills are up, your air conditioner needs all the help it can get."

"Hot summer temperatures make your air. conditioner work longer and harder. That's what drives up your electric bill.

But there are some things you can do to help. Change or clean your air conditioner's filter to let air flow freely. And trim grass and weeds from around the outside unit for good air circulation.

Inside, close blinds and drapes to help keep out the heat. And try to cut down on the number of times you open doors—an open door lets hot air rush in.

Keep your thermostat set at 78° or higher. To feel cool at this temperature, use a small portable fan to circulate air in the room.

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
















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
