Gorman ISD Applies For Full Day Pre-Kindergarten Funding

Gorman ISD is applying for State Funding for a Full Day Pre-Kindergarten Class. 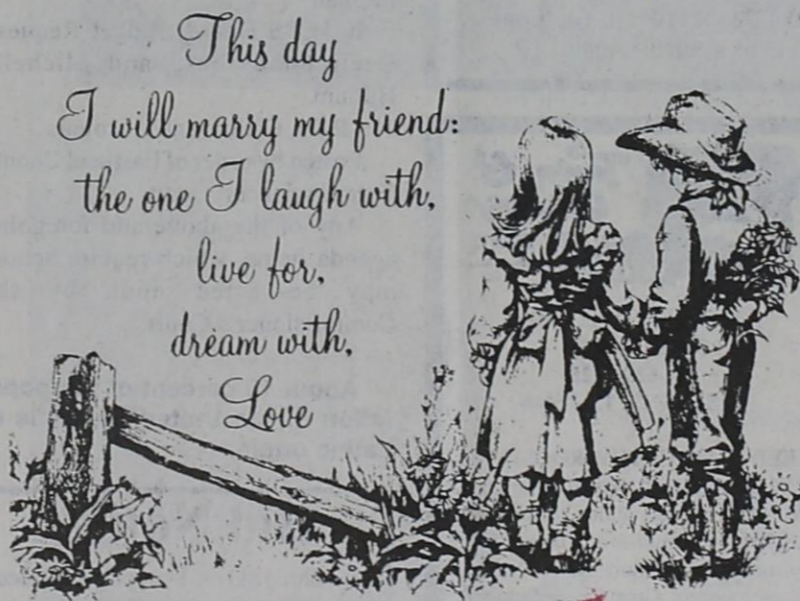

Gorman ISD Safety Programs Recognized

Gorman ISD, represented by Mr. Gene Shackelford, Superintendent, was recognized by the Texas Educational Insurance Association for success in implementing safety programs geared toward preventing injuries in the workplace. The award was presented at the recent Annual Appreciation Luncheon in Austin, Texas. Gorman ISD, one of more than 340 participating schools, has saved \$117,254 since joining the program in September-92. Designed and administered by Claims Administrative Services, Inc. (CAS), the program specializes in safety procedures designed to prevent and reduce workplace injuries. Claims Administrative Services, Inc. provides more than 30% of Texas school districts with workers' compensation insurance and have amassed a combined savings of over \$49 million. Every year, since startup in 1991, savings to districts have totaled over \$129 million dollars with reductions of claims reduced 5%, and on the job injuries down no less than 28% over the previous year.

Gorman ISD received the Diamond award for savings to the district of \$25,337 and 10% or less, of the funds reserved for possible claims expenses during the 1998/1999 year. Wesley Slade, Senior Vice President of CAS, describing the program explained, "Taxpayers will be gratified to know results of participating in the CAS safety program, reduction of injuries and money saved, have raised the bar for all Texas schools for reduction of work related injuries. At CAS, our number one priority is providing the safest possible workplace for district employees while keeping costs at a minimum."

Extolling the advantages of district participation, Barry Jones explained, "Our insurance programs were created to offer the safest working conditions and the greatest potential for savings for Texas school districts, thus saving tax dollars while providing safer work environment for employees. Regular visits from our team of safety professionals assist each district in implementing strict safety policies and procedures."

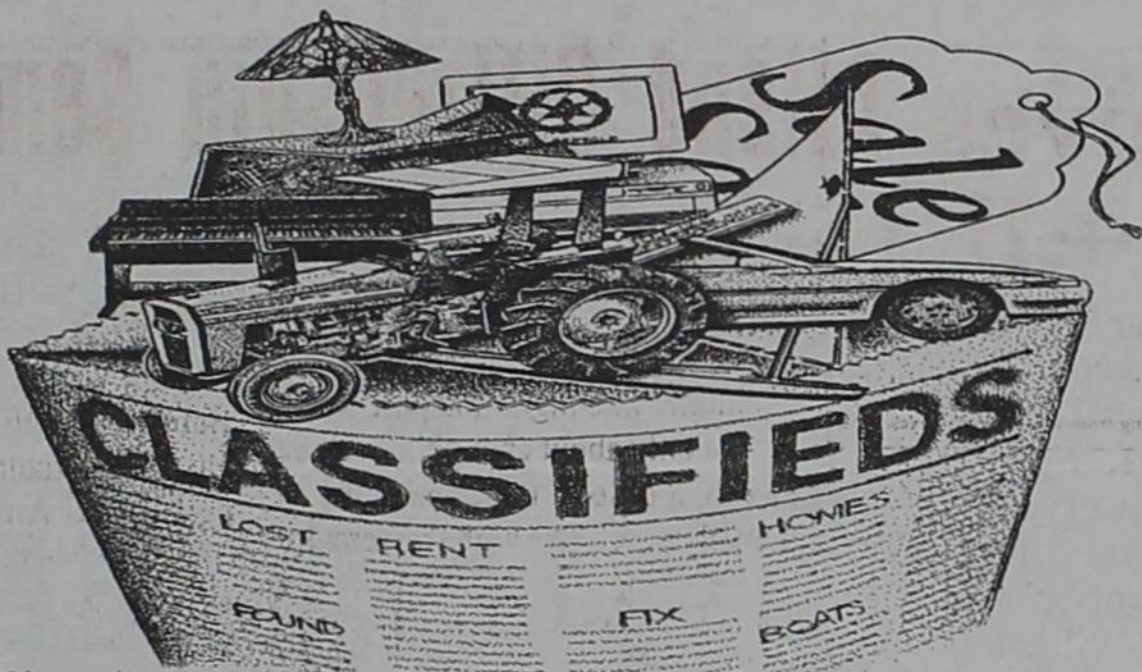

DEFINITIONS

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)
The highest permissible level of a contaminant in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)
The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected health risk. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Treatment Technique (TT)
A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Action Level (AL)
The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

NTU - Nephelometric Turbidity Units

MFL - million fibers per liter (a measure of asbestos)

pCi/l - picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppm - parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)
