CITY CHIT CHAT

By Charlie L. Garrett, Mayor Your City Commission met on August 2 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Also all city employees were at the meeting.

After the approval of the

minutes, the proposed policy book for city employees was read to them. Some questions were asked about certain parts and some changes were noted. The Commission had met in a special session on a previous date and had adopted the proposed policies. The policies spell out the general operation of the city with the various responsibilities of the employees as well as those of the Commission. After time for the policies to be studied a while and changes made, if necessary, the booklet will be reproduced and each employee now working and any hired in the future will be given a copy. We feel that with everyone knowning what is expected and what their responsibilities are, tht we can have a better working relationship and give better service to the citizens.

Mr. Al Hays met with the Commission to explain what the City must do if we choose to continue with our request for a Federal Grant to improve the sewer system. We had made a request for the grant in February, and now if we want to continue, we must file a formal request. We are on the funding list now for \$11,000 in Federal money with a 25% match from the City for Step I of the improvement program. If we do decide to continue with the project, which would include some lift stations and new gathering lines, the Federal grant would run about \$90,000 with the City's share about \$30,000 over a three year period. We would like to have some imput from the citizens about this pro-

The Auditor's report was presented and will be reviewed and acted upon at the next meeting. After it's adoption, a summary will be printed in the Gorman Pro-

Chief Biggs reported for the police department that they had issued 20 citations during the month, had made 6 arrests, had aided the Sheriff's Department in two arrests, and had found three business places left unlocked at night, and had driven 3100 miles in patroling.

The Municipal Judge reported that she had filed 20 cases, had dismissed one and had eight pending. She had collected a total of \$459.50 in fines during July.

Robert reported that they had done work in clearing out and repairing the theater building getting it ready to start making floor plans, they have done mowing, some grading, and general repair to water and sewer lines, and

collected tons of garbage. We made a decision on how we would get the sand into the theater building and hope to get started on it soon. We also discovered tht a number of the seats had been removed from the building that we did not know about. You will remember that we agreed to sell the four seat sections for \$12.00 and the long rows for \$18.00. Some seemed to have the idea that we were giving the seats sway, which we were not. If you have picked up any of the seats and have not paid, we would appreciate it if you would go by the City Office and make payment. The money is needed

in reworking the building. We have had many request to see what we could do about the dog problem in Gorman with so much rabies being reported in the area. We have not made a decision on what we will do at this time about requiring allpets to be vacanated, even thoughsome have requested us to do so. We would like for the people to give some imput to the Commissioners as to how they feel about this matter. We are trying to make plans to show a film on rabies int the near future so that you
