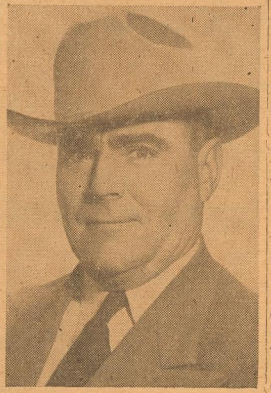

Peanut Prospects Look Good For '48

Peanut crops look good, according to reports received from important peanut producing sections by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Prod. and Marketing Administration.

Although worms were attacking foliage, adequate control measures combined with good rains over the Southeastern section to supply a cheerful outlook for peanut producers.

Peanut offerings in general were limited, with two few offerings in the Southwest to establish a market.

Market was firm for Southeastern runners and Spanish, and in the Virginia-Carolina section was about steady for Fancy, and firm for Extra Large, Medium and No. 1 grades.

Growing crops in South Texas look even better than at this time last season. No old supplies were available with new crop harvesting expected to start in two or three weeks.

Demand for peanut oil and meal was slow with the market weaker for oil and slightly weaker for meal in the Southwestern section.

"CLASS OF '48

This Agriculture Class is just better than one year old but we believe it is one that is due some recognition. It is not the only class of its kind but one that believes we have accomplished as much as any other in the short time we have been in operation. In the G I Bill of Rights we were eligible to pursue any course we so desired according to our time spent in the service.

The first and most important lesson we are taught is to save the soil, both in fields and pastures. Studying crop rotation, erosion, both wind and rain, strip cropping, turning back the most sloping land to pastures. This latter was hard to do because of the high prices of the commodities we were producing on this land. These pastures have paid off though due to the incline of beef and pork.

In carrying out these practices this class has bought and paid for a grain drill.

In the travels of this class through this country and foreign countries, we have all come to the same conclusion - the people are just as strong and healthy as their land is rich and fertile.

We are fortunate in having teachers and instructors from our leading agricultural colleges. We are taught problems in the class room and work them out in actual practice in the field.

I have been asked by our teacher Kirk Parker, to extend an invitation to every citizen in this county to meet with us on school nights and also go with us on our field demonstrations. School nights are Monday and Tuesday from 8 P. M. to 10 P. M.

If this article meets with approval, I would like to tell more of the projects we have and are going to carry out; such as, breeding of better dairy and beef cattle, poultry that pays off, crops and the soils they are adapted to.

Yes, we would sure appreciate the visits of the bankers, doctors, lawyers, and merchants, because we feel our problems are your problems - after all, living begins with the land.

ANNOUNCEMENT FROM THE RECRUITING STATION AT EASTLAND

Young men between the ages of 18 and 19 will be accepted for enlistment in the Regular Army and Regular Air Force after July 21st for a one-year tour of duty it was announced today by S-Sgt. James O. Hendrick of the Eastland Army and Air Force Recruiting Station.

Each recruiting station is being allotted a quota to be filled and the quotas for the Air Force will be very small. For the first few months it is anticipated that a relatively few men will be enlisted under this provision of the newly enacted Selective Service law.

Any interested person 18 years of age and who has not reached his 19th birthday should apply at once to the Recruiting Station located at 311 West Main Street in Eastland for complete details on application, training, and the fulfillment of future military obligations.

Young men 19 through 25 years of age may now enlist in the Regular Army for a period of 21 months. This information has been released by the Department of the Army through the Eastland Army and Air Force Recruiting Station.

This enlistment term is in addition to other Regular Army opportunities which will remain in effect. Principal among these is the enlistment for three or more years with choice of branch of service and overseas theaters where applicable, and the enlistment of high school graduates for specific Army technical and trade school education.

Burke and Royalty have made two new locations on their 20 acre lease out of the George Bell 60 acre tract. These are more or less forced offset wells since their tract is hedged in by the Della Graham and the Ireland Watson tracts to either side and the Dominy and Sanders to the South and the Mear's wells on the north. There doesn't seem to be much doubt but that something should be found on the George Bell 60 acres with good wells all around him.

North of Sipe Springs O. J. McCulloch is drilling at 2737 on the Moorman lease. Tuesday they were being held up by a swabbing job.

Eastland County ACA Committee Reviews Soil Conservation Program

The Eastland County Committee administering the County Agricultural Conservation Program, met in special session to review progress made in assisting farmers and ranchers to carry out soil and water conservation practices since the program was inaugurated in 1936.

The conference of local people heard the following combined report on permanent type conservation practices that have been completed in EASTLAND County under ACP during the 1936 through 1947:

- 1. Cropland terraced 30,000 acres
2. 200 miles of diversions constructed.
3. 2750 livestock water dams built.
4. 25 livestock water wells installed on range land.
5. 33,000 acres of pear eradicated from rangeland.
6. 6000 acres of mesquite eradicated from rangeland.
7. 1000 acres of cedar eradicated from rangeland.
8. 13,000 acres of brush eradicated from rangeland.

E. E. Blackwell, chairman of the County ACA Committee, states that increased financial assistance is needed so that the program can be used more and more to stop wind and water erosion that have taken a heavy toll in Eastland County.

of organic matter cropland after many years of continuous cropping with cotton, sorghums, corn, and peanuts.

Included in the list of needs for conservation measures in the future in this county are:

- 1. Terracing 130,000 acres of cropland.
2. Installation of 900 miles of diversion and spreader terraces or ditches.
3. 3,000 livestock water dams.
4. 300,000 acres of pear, mesquite, and cedar to be eradicated.
5. 50,000 acres of stripcropping to be established in farming plans.
6. 35,000 acres of pasture seeding, over-seeding, or sodding with mixtures of adapted grasses and legumes.
7. 137,000 acres of summer and winter growing cover crops of legumes and non-legumes for green manure or leaving on the land.
8. 50,000 acres of contour cultivation of row & small grain crops.
9. 300,000 acres of rotation grazing and pasture management.
10. 25,000 acres of legumes or mixtures of legumes and grasses for application of needed minerals, such as phosphorous and potash.

Those in attendance at the meeting discussed plans for developing a simple farm conservation program on all farms and ranches in the county. The project would be designed so that an individual farmer or rancher could discuss with a county committee his basic conservation problems and his plans for establishing a conservative system of operating his farm.

Health Notes

Heart disease continued in the top spot as the number one killer of Texans, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

Mortality rate figures show an increase of 255 deaths from the April 1946 figure of 1,099, as compared to the April, 1948 total of 1,354. This represents an increase of more than 18.5 percent for the comparative period.

"So-called functional heart disease is usually traceable to nervousness, infections from other parts of the body such as teeth and tonsils, a disturbed function of the thyroid gland, and to influenza," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

Malfunction of the heart is a correctable condition, the health officer said, insofar as the sources of infection may be located and eliminated, as in the case of bad teeth or tonsils. Insurable organic heart ailments exist only too frequent.

Strict adherence to competent medical advice will eliminate much worry about either functional or organic heart conditions, Dr. Cox said. He added that such adherence would unquestionably reduce deaths from heart disease materially.

The trustees of the Leon Common School District No. 70, desiring to protect the interests of the children of that district and the interests of future generations of children in that district, offered to lease the school ground belonging to the Leon Common School District No. 70 to McKissick, Harley Sadler and others. They refused to lease the land. Later the land was leased to S. S. Powers and C. V. Culvers who immediately applied to the Railroad Commission for a permit to drill and produce this Leon School tract, McKissick, Harley Sadler and others owning the lease on the 80 acre tract adjoining the school tract and having a producing well just over the boundary from the school tract, went before the Railroad Commission and vigorously protested the granting of a permit to S. Now comes McKissick, Harley Sadler and others, before the District Court of Comanche County and files suit against the Leon District Trustees, County Superintendent J. C. Helm, Jr., and the County Board of Comanche County in an attempt to kkeep the children of our district and future generations of children from getting the oil under their land which belongs to them by reason of a warranty deed given to former trustees to them and their successors in office for ever and ever.

The people of Gorman and surrounding country should know that this is the type of candidate now running for State Senator in this district and claiming to be for the school children, the school teachers and the old folks. He is opposing Pat Bullock, your present Senator who is asking for a second full term. Pat Bullock has sponsored every educational bill for the advancement of education in Texas since he became a member of the Senate. 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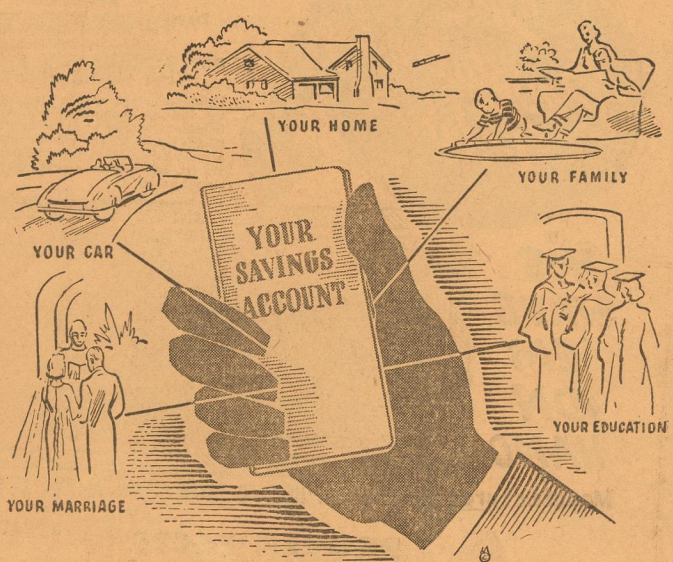
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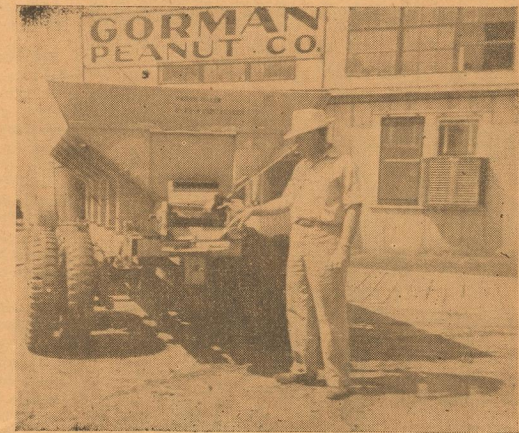

Hart, opponent of Judge Rawlins, was one of the attorneys for the labor unions in their unsuccessful and ill-advised attempt to enjoin the State Officials from enforcing the Texas law regulating labor unions, which was passed with the view of protecting public interest.

★ The Appellate Court, in upholding the law forbidding the unions from collecting work permit fees from non-union employees, reorganized the policy expressed by the Legislature in the preamble to the Act: "The right to work is the right to live."

★ Judge John Rawlins is under no obligation to either labor or capital. He is now completing 20 years of service as a State Trial Judge. He is a family man, a World War veteran, and a church worker. He has the endorsement of the Dallas Bar Association and is interested only in administering the law fairly and impartially in the interest of the public at large. He is a graduate of Texas University and Texas Christian University.

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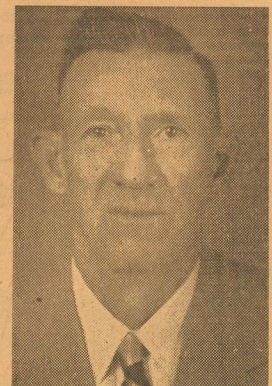

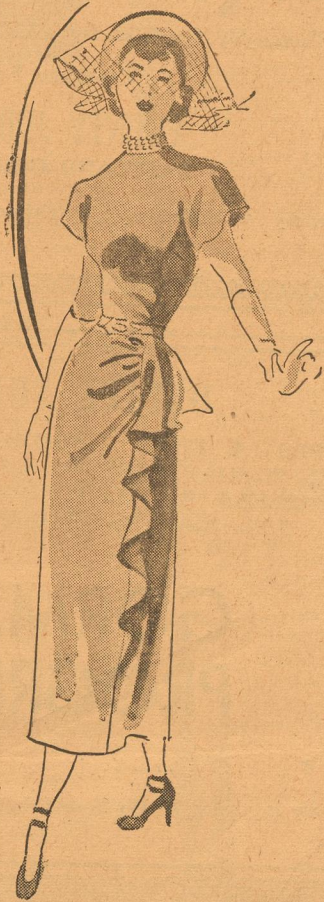
