REGISTRATION STARTS AUGUST 30

Proclamation by the Governor of the State of Texas

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States has enacted and the President has on the 24th of June, one thousand nine hundred and forty-eight, approved the Selective Service Act; and,

WHEREAS, the President by proper proclamation on the 20th day of July, one thousand nine hundred and forty-eight given notice that the registration of male citizens of the United States and other male persons residing in the United States who shall have attained the eighteenth anniversary of the day of their birth and who shall have not attained the twenty-sixth anniversary of the day of their birth shall take place in the several States of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. on the day or days hereinafter designated for their registration, as follows:

(a) Persons born in the year 1922 after August 30, 1922, shall be registered on Monday, the 30th day of August, 1948.

(b) Persons born in the year 1923 shall be registered on Tuesday, the 31st day of August, 1948, or on Wednesday, the 1st day of September, 1948.

(c) Persons born in the year 1924 shall be registered on Thursday the 2nd day of September, 1948, or on Friday, the 3rd day of September, 1948.

(d) Persons born in the year 1925 shall be registered on Saturday, the 4th day of September, 1948, or on Tuesday, the 7th day of September, 1948.

(e) Persons born in the year 1926 shall be registered on Wednesday, the 8th day of September, 1948, or on Thursday, the 9th day of September, 1948.

(f) Persons born in the year 1927 shall be registered on Friday, the 10th day of September, 1948, or on Saturday, the 11th day of September, 1948.

(g) Persons born in the year 1928 shall be registered on Monday, the 13th day of September, 1948, or on Tuesday, the 14th day of September, 1948.

(h) Persons born in the year 1929 shall be registered on Wednesday, the 15th day of September, 1948, or on Thursday, the 16th day of September, 1948.

(i) Persons born in the year 1930 shall be registered on Friday, the 17th day of September, 1948, or on Saturday, the 18th day of September, 1948.

(j) Persons who were born on or after September 19, 1930, shall be registered on the day they attain the eighteenth anniversary of their birth, or within five days thereafter; and,

WHEREAS, the President has by the aforesaid proclamation, directed that every male citizen of the United States and every other male person residing in the United States, who is within any of the several States of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Territory of Alaska, the Territory of Hawaii, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands and who shall have attained the eighteenth birthday of the day of his birth and who shall have not attained the twenty-sixth anniversary of the day of his birth on the day or any of the days fixed herein for his registration is required to and shall on that day or any of those days present himself for and submit to registration before a duly designated registration official or selective service local board having jurisdiction in the area in which he has his permanent home or in which he may happen to be on that day or any of those days, excepting commissioned officers, warrant officers, pay clerks, enlisted men, and aviation cadets of the Regular Army the Navy, the Air Force, the Marine Corps, the Coast Guard, the Coast and Geodetic Survey, and the Public Health Service; cadets, United States Military Academy; midshipmen, United States Navy; cadets, United States Coast Guard Academy; members of the reserve components of the armed forces, the Coast Guard, and the Public Health Service, while on active du-

ty; and foreign diplomatic representatives, technical attaches of foreign embassies and legations, consuls general, consuls, vice consuls, and other consular agents of foreign countries who are not citizens of the United States, and members of their families, and persons in other categories to be specified by the President, residing in the United States, and who have not declared their intention to become citizens of the United States. The above excepted classes of persons shall not be required to register and shall be relieved from liability of training and service under the Selective Service Act of 1948;

A person subject to registration may register after the day or days fixed for registration in case he is prevented from registering on that day or any of those days by circumstances beyond his control or because he is not present in any of the several states of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Territory of Alaska, the Territory of Hawaii, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands, on that day or any of those days. If he is not in any of the several States of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Territory of Alaska, the Territory of Hawaii, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands, on the day or any of those days fixed for registration but subsequently enters any of the several States of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Territory of Alaska, the Territory of Hawaii, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands, he shall within five days after such entrance present himself for and submit to registration before a duly designated registration official or selective service board. If he is in any of the several States of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Territory of Alaska, the Territory of Hawaii, Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands, on the day or any of the days fixed for registration but because of circumstances beyond his control is unable to present himself for and submit to registration on that day or any of those days he shall do so as soon as possible after the cause for such inability ceases to exist. Every person subject to registration is required to familiarize himself with the rules and regulations governing registration and to comply therewith and every person shall be deemed to have notice of the requirements of the Selective Service Act of 1948, as is provided by the law; and,

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has called upon me, as Governor of the State of Texas, to perform certain duties in the execution of the Selective Service Act within this State:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BEAUFORD H. JESTER, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby proclaim and give notice that every male citizen of this State and every other male person residing within this State within the designated age limits and subject to registration in accordance with the Act and the President's Proclamation shall present himself for and submit to registration between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. on the day or any of the days fixed for his registration before a duly designated official or selective service local board having jurisdiction in the area in which he has his permanent home or in which he may happen to be on that day or any of those days. I also urge all employers and State and local agencies to give those under their charge sufficient opportunity to register in accordance with this Proclamation.

The Congress of the United States has by statute and the President of the United States by proper proclamation decreed that, by means of a Selective Service System, administered by local citizens in the interest of all, the United States shall prepare itself to insure the security of this Nation by the achievement and maintenance of an adequate armed force.

Therefore, on the days designated by our President let every loyal Texan and true American, within the specified ages, present himself at the appointed place for registration and imbue himself with

OIL NEWS and PERSONNEL In and Around GORMAN

Mellard and Hunter have fished out the bailer and are now swabbing and testing to see just what they really have on their No. 1 George Blackwell. There has been some show of oil but it is undetermined as to how much, of what quality, etc.

The two dry holes reported Tuesday will not make too much noise when we tell you that while they were disappointing those of us who were interested in their particular area, there were a half of dozen or more wells being acidized and turned into producers-- some light while some were capable of making much more than the allowable for this area. Among this number we soft pedaled yesterday in the loud voiced mouthing we did about the drys were: Coast Oil No. 1 Geo. Bell; No. 1 Rushing; Commercial Production No. 1 J. A. Hirst; the Boyd, out from De Leon; Burt's No. 2 Rawls; -- and they were not all, however we do not have hope on some of the others which are in the process of being completed. In every case, it seems when we bring in some two or three dry holes and get the spirits of the people down, if we just scan the whole field we find two or three times as many producers as dry holes.

Commercial Production No. 1 J. A. Hirst on August 20th, decided it would not be a dry hole any longer. It had been abandoned with only a slight showing of oil enough however, to have caused some little argument in the Roy Gaines outfit before it was decided to plug the well. Still not satisfied, a few days ago, Mr. Gaines and some others were going over the picture of the well again and decided to give it a treatment. This they did, and after waiting on cement the allotted time and perforating--scarcely had they moved the machine back from perforating -- the thing blew in shooting about 15 feet into the air. It flowed all night and was still flowing the next day when Halliburton had to be called in to kill the well before they could get the oil into the pipes. Estimates by old hands in the oil game say it could easily flow 3000 BLS per day if allowed to run wide open.

Gathering Company for Magnolia were in town this week laying pipe from the Stuart well on the Murphy well to their main lines. Up to now this area has been worked largely by Premier.

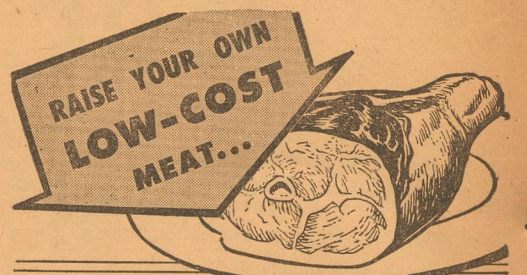
METHODIST NEWS

Judge Dabney carried his home county of Eastland by a substantial majority, although Judge Gray, the third man in the race, also was living in Eastland and holding court, where he received a nice vote.

Cotton Quarantine

Due to the pink bollworm quarantine Eastland County cotton cannot be ginned in either Callahan, Stephens, or Palo Pinto Counties, but may be ginned in either Erath or Comanche Counties, according to recent word received in the County Agent's office here.

J. I. Cowger, District Quarantine Leader, Abilene, has informed J. M. Cooper, County Agriculture Agent that all Eastland County cotton must be ginned at plants with approved sterilizing equipment in order to meet quarantine regulations.

Although Eastland County produces very little cotton, growers are being asked not to violate any of the quarantine regulations, some of which are subject to severe penalties, it was said.

The two gins in the county are located at Gorman and at Ranger. The gin at Gorman is already placing in the seed sterilizer.

The seed sterilizer will be equipped to treat the seed as it is being ginned without loss of time to the producer. The seed is heated to 150 degrees for at least 30 seconds. This does not affect the germination of the seed.

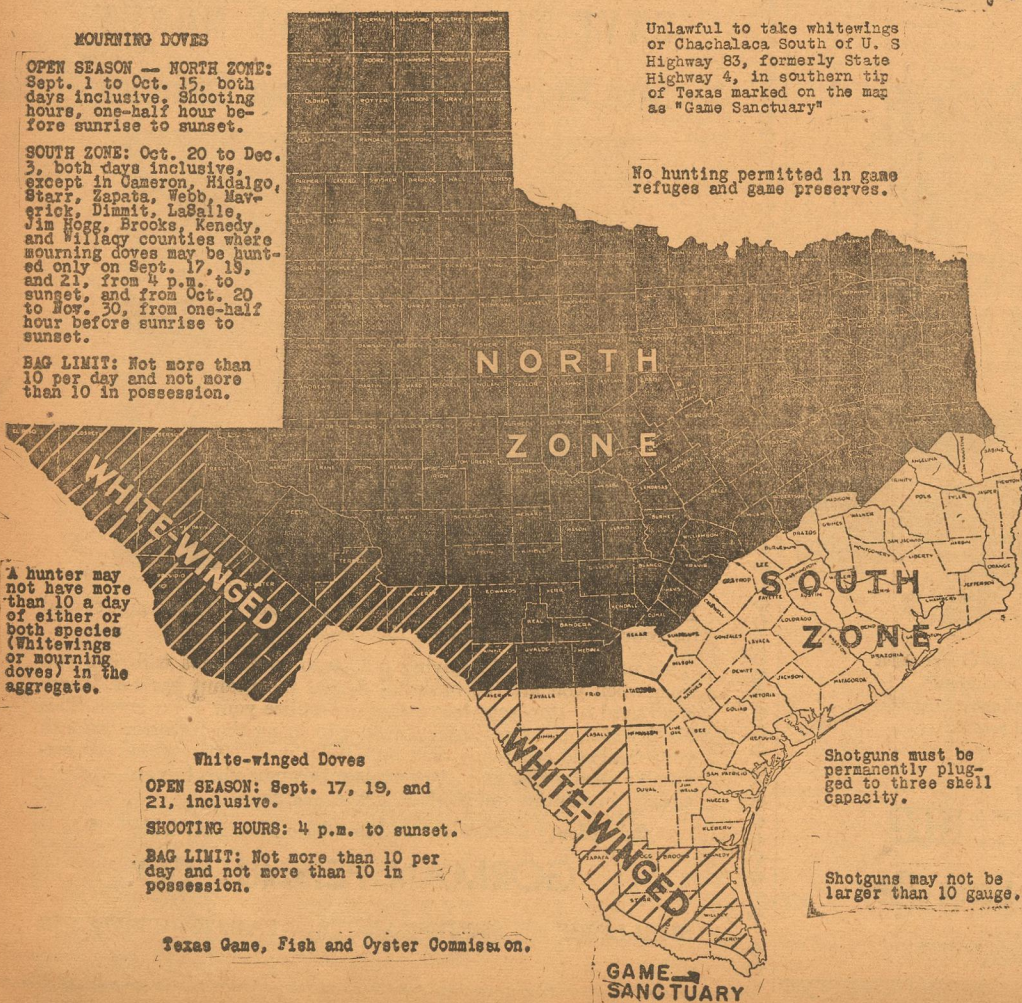

No hunting permitted in game refuges and game preserves.
