Facts & Fancies

The first official national amateur golf championship was played October 1-3, 1895, at the Newport Golf Club in Newport, R.I. That was four years before the first golf tee was invented by George F. Grant of Boston.



The first winner of the United States Open golf championship was Horace Rawlins in 1895. The U. S. Open and the U. S. Amateur rank foremost among the 10 national championships conducted by the United States Golf Association, the national governing body of golf.

Although the game of golf was invented in Scotland, some Scots back in 1457, afraid it might become more popular than the national sport of archery, prevailed upon Parliament to ban it. But after King James IV took up golf about 1490, the law was no longer enforced.

ACT Program Test Dates Deadlines Set

The 1981-82 school year is just beginning and juniors and seniors at Gorman High

School and other high schools across the country are facing some big de-

isions. One of those decisions is what to do after graduation

— whether to go on to school, get a job, or try to do both.

An important role in students' planning will be played by guidance counselors, parents, friends, and

the ACT Assessment Program. Designed to provide guidance information for education and career planning, this national program is recommended for use by student applicants at more than 2,700 colleges and universities.

Gorman students will have five opportunities during the 1981-82 school year to make use of the program, which consists of four tests and a two-part questionnaire. Students complete the questionnaire at home as

part of the registration process. The tests are then administered at area tests centers on any of five weekend national test dates, explained Linda Glover, Counselor.

The five 1981-82 national test dates and the corresponding registration deadlines are:

- Test Date**
- October 17, 1981
- December 12, 1981
- February 20, 1982
- April 3, 1982
- June 12, 1982
- Registration Deadline**
- September 18

November 13
January 22
March 5
May 14

On any of the above test dates, most local students will take the tests at Tarleton State University. The basic student fee for using the ACT assessment is \$8.50

It takes students about three hours to complete the ACT assessment's four exams (English, math, social studies, and natural sciences). In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a full-length test booklet has been sent to all high schools. This booklet is available to interested students through the Counselor's Office. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon request from ACT at cost.

Glover said the test scores provide an assessment of general educational development, while the questionnaire information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, as well as career and educational plans.

ACT Assessment information is also used by colleges for academic advising, admission counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. Students' ACT Assessment reports are sent only to those colleges specifically designated by the respective student.

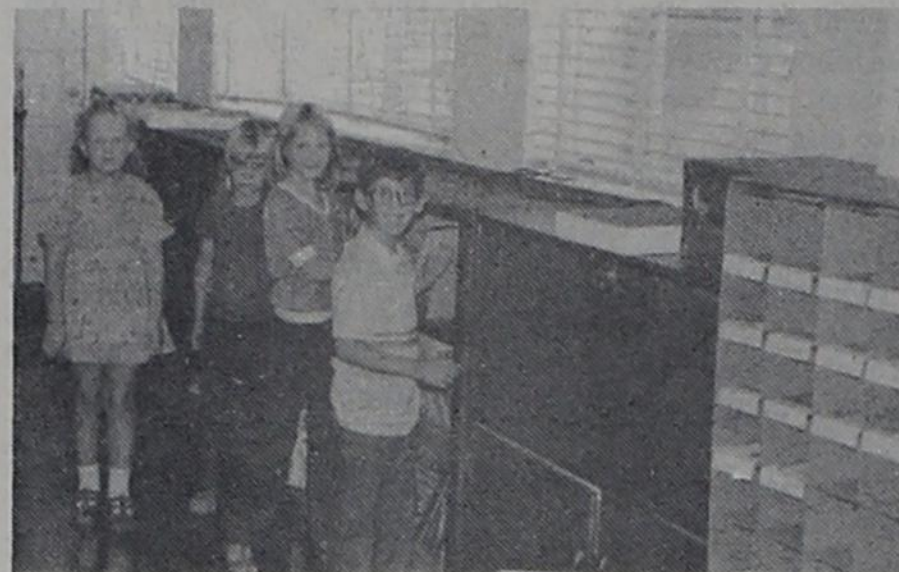

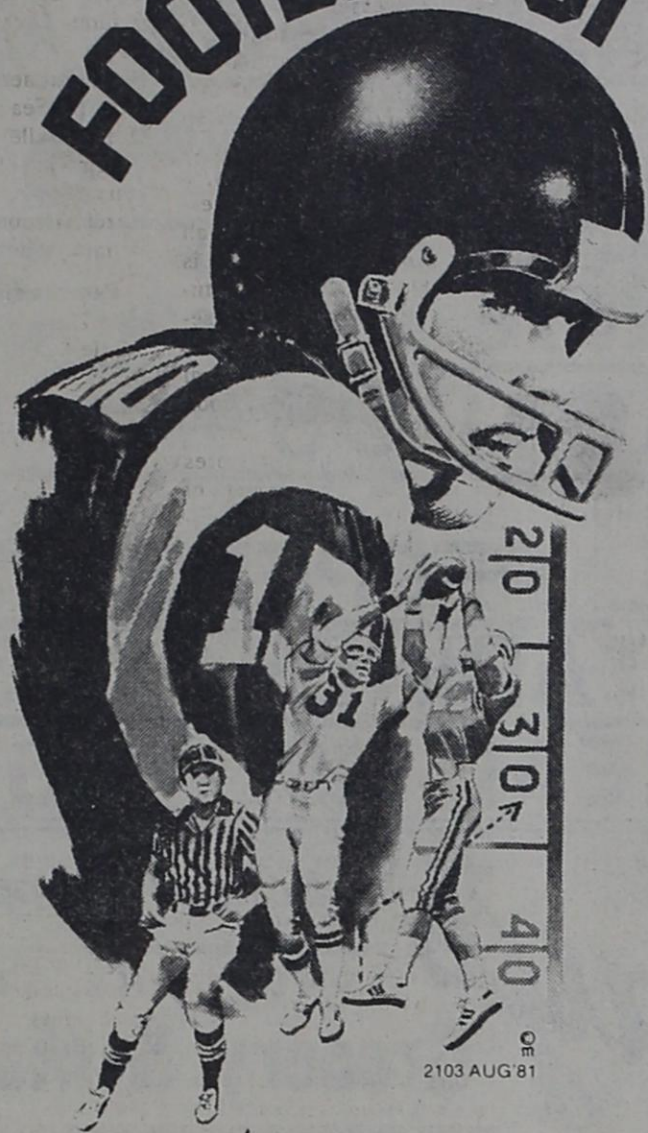
The Liberty Bell cracked in 1835 while tolling the death of Chief Justice John Marshall.
