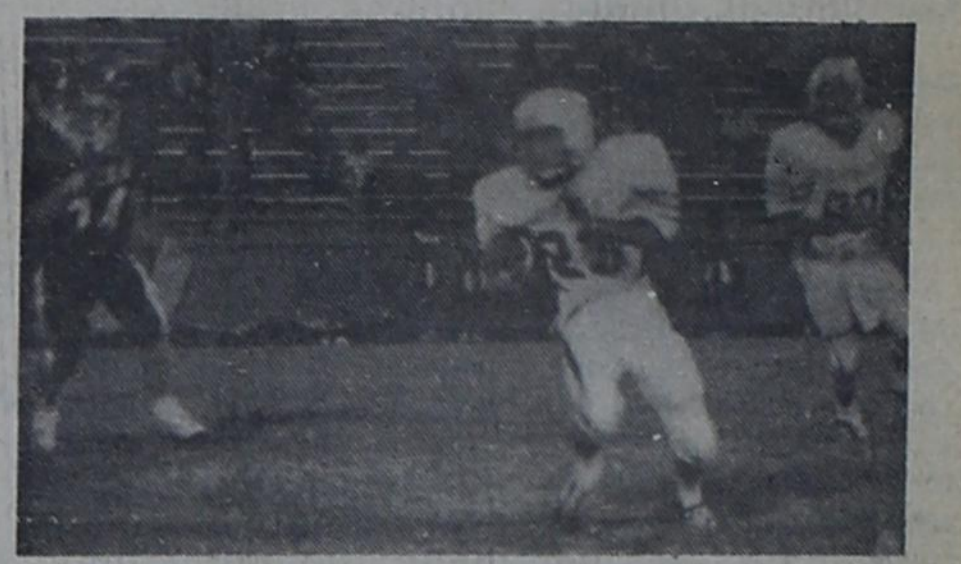

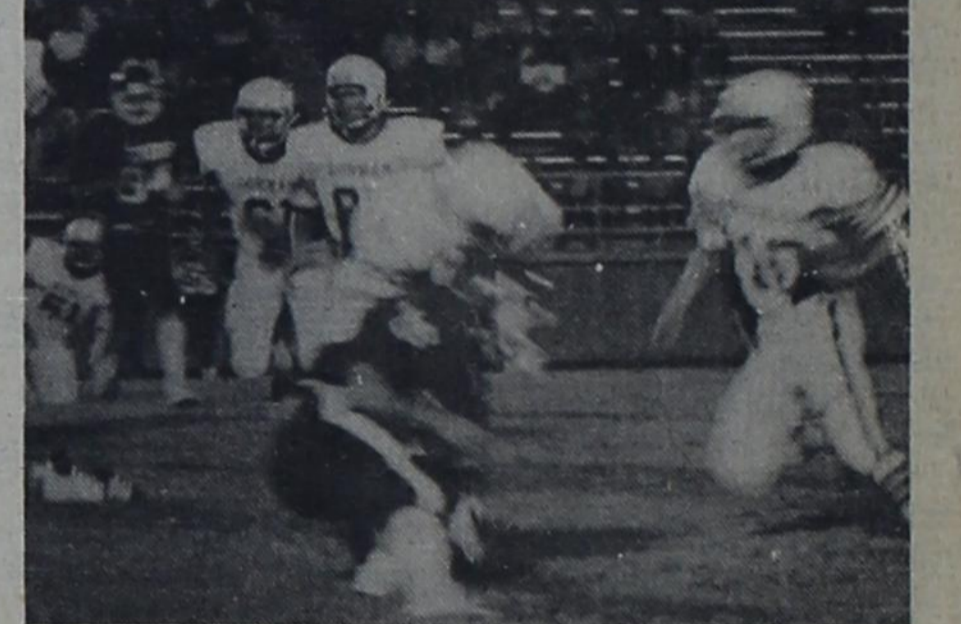

The Panther offense cranked up in high style on Friday night at Tiger Stadium in Glen Rose and when the first half had come to an end the Big Red had a 31 to 0 lead. In the second half Jimmy Johnson took the kickoff and rambled for 80 yards and then added the extra point to up the final total to 38 to 8. This was to be the only time Jimmy would carry the ball in the second half except for one play when he was to quick kick and didn't get the handoff right.

The Big Red defense did a super job against the Tigers allowing only 41 total yards rushing and 63 in the air, and one pass play alone netted 51 yards. The defense saw a lot of substitutions, especially during the second half, as was the case with the Panther offense.

The Panthers wasted little time getting on the scoreboard as they took their first possession on the Tiger 31 after the Tiger punter fumbled the snap. The Panthers scored in just 3 plays with Jimmy Johnson getting the final 3 yards with 9:26 left in the first period. The run for points failed and Gorman led 6-0.

The Big Red came back on their next possession, took the ball on their own 15 and moved 85 yards in 10 plays with Johnson going the final 3 yards with 4:28 left in the period. A pass try for points failed and the score rose to 12-0.

The Panthers added another score with 8:35 left in the second period, going 73 yards in 4 plays with Johnson rambling for the final 52 yards on a beautiful run behind some very fine blocking from the front line. A pass try for points failed and the score stood at 18-0.

After holding the Tigers on the next possession, Scotty Mauney took the punt on his own 45 and on an marvelous runback that brought the fans to their feet, he raced the distance (55 yards) for the score with 6:22 left in the first half. Jimmy Johnson kicked the extra point and Gorman led 25-0.

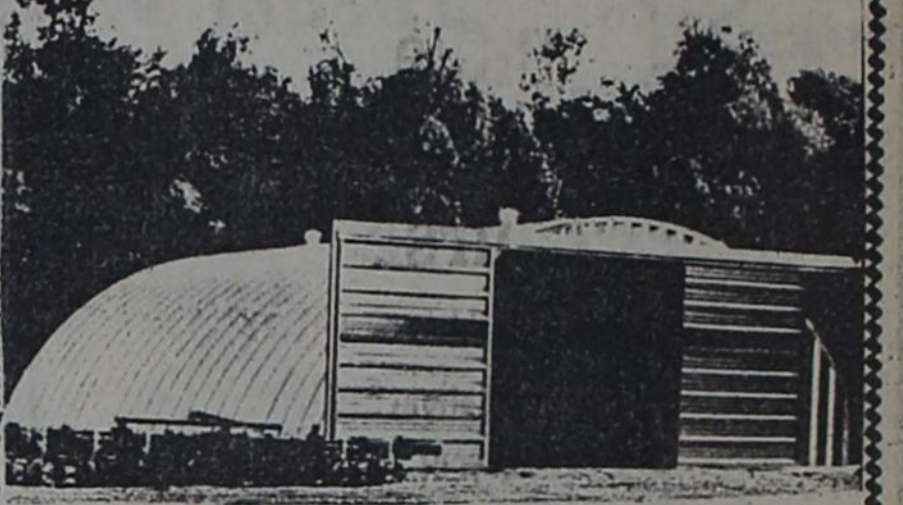

# CITY CHIT CHAT

The City Commission met three times during the month of September with two regular meetings and one called meeting for the hiring of personnel. At the two regular meetings the bills for August

were approved and other regular monthly business was transacted.

At the meeting on September 17 Hershell Cordell met to discuss the possibility of closing two streets crossing land that was in the process of being bought. The Commission instructed him to contact the parties that could be affected and get back to

the Commission at a later date. Also on this same date Mr. Vernon Warren and Mr. Bill Garrett met with the Commission expressing a possible desire to purchase eight acres of City owned land north of town. They were told that the deed would be checked and that they would be informed as to the proper that the City must take in order to sell the property.

At the meeting on September 3 the Commission discussed the location of various buildings or other structures that had been placed in alleys or streets within the City and are

making a study of getting easements signed by any person or persons who have such property in alleys or streets. These structures pose a problem to the City if water lines or sewer lines should need repair beneath such structures.

Tax statements will be mailed out shortly and there may be some confusion over the printout on the back of your statement. There you will find a statement telling you what penalty and interest that you would be required to pay on delinquent taxes. In the Special Called Sessions of the Legislature,

He asked me if I was in the Balloon Squadron. He said he was on the ground by the truck when this happened. I told him we were just north of that Branch and they were on the south side. He wanted to know how I knew all details about those men, etc. I told him I read it in the "Stars and Stripes".

Fort Sill is in Comanche Co. Oklahoma. There were four German families that had come from Germany and settled there. They would not sell their wheat, as it would help feed U.S. Armed Forces. So a bunch of men went with wagons to each

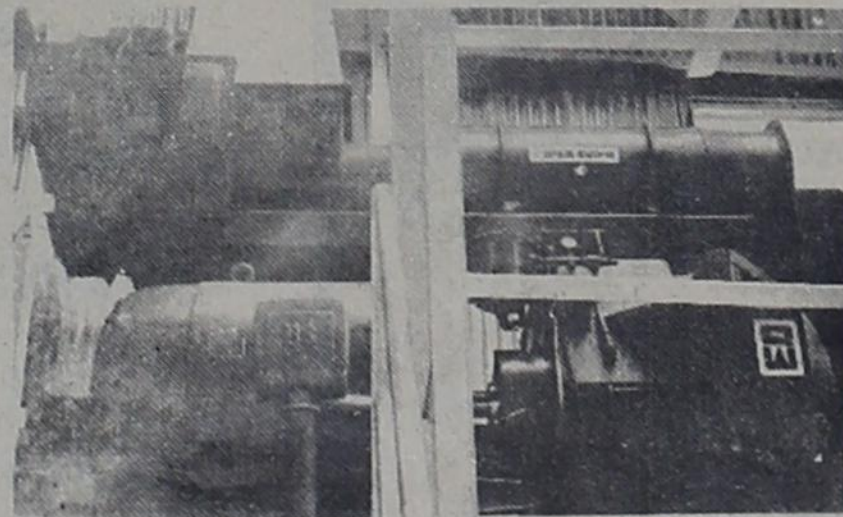

**TWENTY-TWO ACCIDENTS REPORTED AS OF SEPTEMBER 25**

This compares with sixteen accidents during the same period last year, an increase of 37%. Your police department would like to remind you that school is in session, and youngsters sometimes forget to look out for us, so we must look out for them. Please be extremely cautious when approaching the school area, or any area where children are playing. With the harvest season upon us, we also have an increase in truck traffic, as well as slow-moving farm machinery on the roads. That extra moment that it takes to STOP, LOOK, and LISTEN would be worthwhile if it will hold our accidents below the 1980 record. 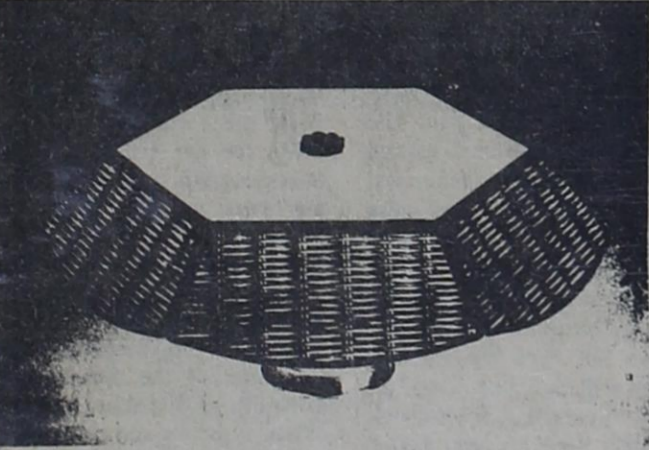
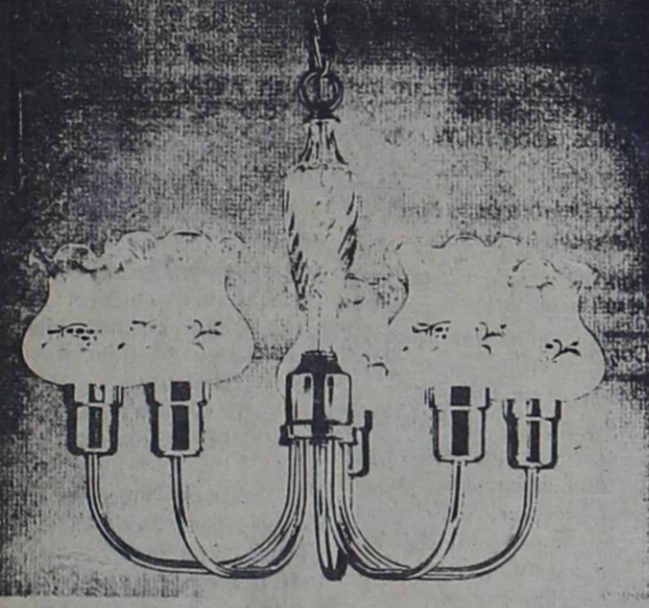

The county honorees are: Mrs. Pebble Hargus Boles, Eastland, owner of the Hargus Ranch, and Doyle Samuel Johnson, Desdemona, owner of the Johnson

Ranch. The Program recognizes families who have maintained continuous agricultural production on the same land for 100 years or more, Brown said.

Instituted in 1974, the program has now registered 1,454 farms and ranches. These are the first honorees in the program from Eastland County.

"A short history of the farm or ranch is printed in an annual Family Land Heritage Registry," Brown said. "It has proved to be very useful to genealogists and historians. The books are in high

school, public, and college libraries in the counties which have honorees."

County Judges and county historical commission chairpersons have been very helpful in registering families, Brown said.

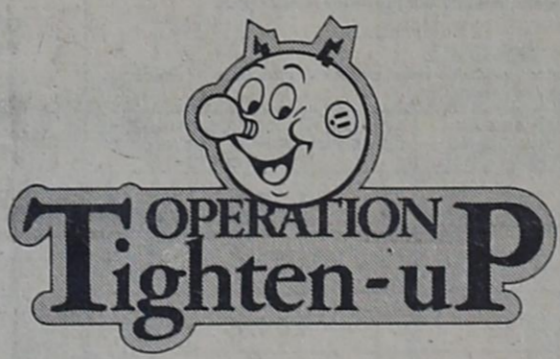
