NOMINATED FOR AMERICAN FARMER DEGREE

Danny Burgess of Gorman has been nominated to received the American Farmer Degree, highest degree presented by the National Future Farmest of America (FFA) Organization. Danny was nominated for the degree by the Texas FFA Association. The nomination was approved at a recent meeting of the National FFA Board of Directors in Alexandria, Virginia, virtually assuring the awarding of the degree. One of 778 FFA members nominated for the American Farmer Degree, Danny will receive the degree in a special ceremony on Thursday, November 12, pending a final vote of 121 student delegates representing nearly half a million FFA


members. Travel awards will be presented to American Farmer Degree recipients to offset their travel expenses to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City. At the convenallotments and quotas in 1982. Under the Lundine Amendment there would be complete open planting in 1982 and a single loan rate would be established on all peanuts by the Secretary of Agriculture. The action of the House of Representatives means that

the Lundine Amendment and the Mattingly Amendment passed in the Senate on September 16 will be submitted to the Senate-House Conferees from which a peanut program for the years 1982-1985 will be molded.

The Mattingly Amendment calls for poundage quota and a support rate of \$596 per ton on quota peanuts in 1982. Open planting under the Mattingly Bill would be restricted to additional peanuts grown bevond the farm base poundage on farms with no farm base poundage.

The House action is viewed with severe disappointment by peanut growers according to Ross Wilson. Manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Gorman, Texas. He said growers feel that the House vote to end allotments and quotas resulted in part from distortion of facts about a farm commodity program that has worked well for over four decades. He said peanut product manufacturers contributed substantially to defeat of the program by providing inaccurate and misleading information to House members.

Wilson said the growers will now concentrate their efforts and hope on the Senate-House Conference Committee in their attempt to secure a workable program for the years 1982-1985.


The first half moved along with neither team able to penetrate the other's defense very much. The half ended with a 0-0 score.


The Panthers and Hornets played on pretty even terms most of the last half with the Panthers moving to the Hornet 12 midway through the third period but failed to

supports for undermining. If walls or foundations have settled or cracked, uncover footings and raise, reinforce or brace any settled sections. Be extremely careful when uncoverning footings, because of the possibility of caverous washouts.

In underlyng material has been washed away, fill spaces to within 12 inches of footing with gravel or crushed rock. Fill the remianing space with concrete reinforced with steel rods. Be sure to check piers for settling or shifting.

In the event the building has shifted or the floors have settled badly, it might be necessary to install temporary bracing until extensive work can be done.

In some cases the water was high enough to damage walls. To speed up drying of flooded studding and insulation, remove all siding strips or plaster from upper and lower parts of the walls. Do not repaint walls until they are completely dry. This might take several months. Flooded insulation may be ruined and will have to be replaced.

To prevent further buckling and warping, drive nails where the floor tends to lift or bulge. After floors are competely dry, plane or sand them level. If the floors are too finished, lay a new floor over the old, or cover with carpet,


