**TESCO Reports New Date For Nuclear Plant Opening**

Texas Electric announced today, as a result of an annual review of the company's construction program, that the estimated completion dates of the Comanche Peak nuclear plant near Glen Rose have been revised to 1984 for Unit 1 and 1985 for Unit 2. The estimated cost of the plant also has been changed to \$3.4 billion.

The new cost estimate is an increase from the \$1.235 billion estimate made in 1980, said TESCO President Bill Marquardt.

"Even though the cost estimate has increased substantially since announced in the early 1970s, the electricity produced by this plant will continue to be substantially less than electricity produced by either oil

**SAN ANGELO** - Carolyn Gilbert of Brownwood, whose career with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service spans more than a dozen years - the last five with the Texas 4-H Center staff at Brownwood - will become district extension director for the West Central District, effective Nov. 21.

Ms. Gilbert will fill the vacancy created recently by the resignation of Mrs. Mary E. Watson. She will be headquartered at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center near San Angelo.

In announcing the appointment, Daniel C. Pfannstiel, extension director, said Miss Gilbert will coordinate educational activities of all county extension agents in the nine-county area for which she is responsible and will direct home economics programming throughout the district.

The counties to be supervised by Miss Gilbert are Concho, Gillespie, Irion, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Schleicher and Tom Green.

A native of Gorman, Miss Gilbert holds a bachelor of science degree from Abilene Christian University and a master of education degree from Tarleton State University.



The Gorman Panthers had one of their dreams come true on Friday night when they clinched the District 7-A Title for the East Zone with a convincing 35 to 10 victory over the Goldthwaite Eagles. The Panthers still have one game remaining with Blanket in district, but whatever the outcome of this game the Panthers will represent the Zone in the district playoff to see who represents our district in the Bi-District Playoff. At this time the opponent is not known in the West Zone, but the decision will come on Friday night when Eden and Miles meet to decide the champion.

The Panthers can claim an undisputed title this Friday night when they play the Blanket Tigers at Blanket, and they will be heavily favored in this game. We feel they will win this game and therefore have a clear title to the East Zone Championship.

Jimmy Johnson led the Panthers with 176 yards on 24 carries. Jacky Johnson was a bright spot for the Panthers with 91 yards on 14 trips. Scotty Mauney had 22 on 7. Seaton got 12 on 3 keepers and Eddie Pettit had 6 yards on 1 carry.

The game was played on even terms in the first half with the Eagles having the best of the statistics and also a 3 to 0 margin on the scoreboard when Tim Coronado hit a field goal of 22 yards after the Big Red defense had stopped the Eagles at the 12 midway through the first half.

However, after the intermission the Panthers came out ready to play and held the Eagles on their first possession and took over the ball on the Eagle 43 following a fumble. The Panthers scored in 7 plays with Jeff Seaton getting the final 2 yards on the quarterback sneak with 6:27 left in the third. The drive featured a beautiful 22 yard run by Jimmy Johnson to set the Panthers up with a first down at the Eagle 18. Jimmy kicked the point after and Gorman led 7-3.

The Panther defense did its job again on the following possession by the Eagles as they caused another Eagle fumble at the Eagle 19. They wasted little time in turning this opportunity into more points as they scored in just 3 plays with Jimmy Johnson going the final 12 yards on a fine run with 5:07 left in the period. Johnson's try for the point after failed and Gorman led 13 to 3.

The tough Panther defense gave the offense another opportunity on the next possession as they intercepted an Eagle pass on the Goldthwaite 32. From there the Panthers took advantage of the break and scored in 4 plays with Jimmy Johnson going the final 6 yards with 1:12 left in the period. A pass from Seaton to Dane Gressett added the two pointer and the Panthers led 21 to 3.

Scotty Mauney got 9 yards on a fine run and then lightning struck as Jacky Johnson broke it up the middle and ran through the secondary on a beautiful 36 yard scamper to shut the lid on the Eagles. The run for extra points failed and the final score read 35 to 10.

## SENATOR BOB GLASGOW ANNOUNCEMENT FOR CANDIDACY

State Senator Bob Glasgow, Democrat of Stephenville, has announced for reelection as the state senator representing the 22nd District.

"I would truly hope to have the privilege of representing District 22 again as it's state senator," stated Senator Glasgow.

The Senator stressed his conservative voting record, his ability to pass legislation and his ability to be an assertive voice for the people of his district as reasons for being re-elected.

According to the records of the Texas Legislative Council, Senator Glasgow passed a total of forty pieces of legislation during the last session. Twenty were Senate bills that he sponsored, and twenty were House bills that he carried in the Senate. The forty measures ranked the Senator fifth among the Senate in total number of bills passed. This number ranked the Senator first among freshman lawmakers in both the House and Senate.

Major legislation sponsored and passed by Senator Glasgow included the oral confessions bill, legislation closing a loophole in the aggravated rape law, measures to detect oil and gas thefts, a

licensed vocational nurses practices act, a measure setting standards of firemen's protective clothing and several measures involving health care.

In its issue of the best and worst legislators from the last session, Texas Business magazine called Senator Glasgow an "instant superstar". The magazine went on to say this about the Stephenville Senator:

"Glasgow, a onetime district attorney who replaced redoubtable conservative War Horse Tom Creighton, has won nothing but accolades from colleagues of all philosophical hues. While his voting record was conservative, it was his exceptional work in committee that gained widespread praise. 'He knows how to ask the right questions to dig out the facts', comments on liberal senator. 'I would not be surprised to see Bob either as a committee chairman or on the Finance Committee next time out (either would be unheard of for a second term)', adds a conservative senator."

Senator Glasgow lives in Stephenville where he was raised. He is married to the former Deanna Carr of Huckabay, and they have three

## QUALIFIED FOR 1981 WORLD SHOW

Tana Sharp and Bidgie Roane, both of Gorman, have qualified their American Quarter Horses for the 1981 World Championship Quarter Horse Show to be held in Oklahoma City, November 16-22.

Tana's Quarter Horse mare Witha Talent, and Bidgie's Quarter Horse gelding Gain's Folly, are two of 1,527 entries that are to compete at this prestigious show for an unprecedented \$215,600 in prize money.

The show is being co-sponsored by Copenhagen and Skoal and Tener's Western Outfitters of Oklahoma City. Both Tener's and Copenhagen and Skoal will add \$500 to each of the 62 scheduled classes.

Tana and Bidgie will enter their Quarter Horses in Amateur Barrel Racing in which there are 66 other entries, making a total of \$7,800 in prize money at stake, besides the World Championship in Amateur Barrel Racing. In all, there will be 62 events in which World Champions will be chosen during the ten performances.

To qualify for this Invitational Show, horses must earn a pre-determined number of points by competing at AQHA shows held between August 1, 1980 and July 31, 1981. Winnign a World Championship, the "Oscar" of the Quarter Horse industry, is considered the highlight of the show season for

While living in Stephenville, Bob Glasgow has long been active in his community. He has served as chairman of the Pecan Valley Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center that serves several counties in the north central Texas area. The senator is an active member of the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce, the Stephenville Optimist Club and is on the Board of Directors of the Tarleton State University Students Association.

In addition, the Senator is a member of the Erath County Livestock Association, Texas Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Game Wardens Associations, American Bar Association, Texas Bar Association and the Erath County Bar Association.

# Drivers Must Carry Proof

AUSTIN—Beginning January 1, 1982, Texas drivers contacted by Department of Public Safety officers during traffic stops and vehicle accident investigations will be required to furnish proof of compliance with the new compulsory liability insurance law.

Under House Bill 197, an amendment to the Safety Responsibility Act approved this year by the Texas Legislature, all drivers must carry minimum liability coverage for

medical expenses of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more persons) and property damages of \$5,000.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said troopers will accept as evidence of insurance coverage the policy for the vehicle being operated or a document issued by the insurance company.

"Such a document must contain a statement that the liability coverage for the motor vehicle is the minimum prescribed by the law," Adams said. "The document must also include the name of the insurance company, name of the insured person, policy period and policy number. This document may take the form of a letter or a card, depending upon the preference of the insuring company."

Adams pointed out that DPS troopers will be enforcing the provisions of this law along highways and rural roads.

"Local police officers and sheriff's deputies also have the authority to request this information from drivers," the DPS director said. "I am sure most law enforcement agencies in our state will also be enforcing this statute in their respective jurisdictions."

Drivers who do not maintain the specified coverage risk being fined at least \$75 for the first offense and a minimum \$200 for subsequent violations.

In addition, a conviction under this new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.

Adams also said vehicles which are to be used in the driving test by new driver license applicants must be covered by the minimum liability insurance specified by the law. Applicants will have to certify on the license application that the minimum coverage is in effect for the vehicle before they will be permitted to take the driving test.

The DPS director predicted that more Texans will obtain the required liability coverage when the new law goes into effect.

"Current figures show that approximately 74 per cent of the drivers involved in acci-

dents carry liability insurance." However, drivers of self-insured vehicles will be asked by DPS officers to produce people must secure the re-evidence of self-insurance at required coverage or face the accident scenes and traffic possibility of heavy fines and stops.

Out-of-state, government-owned and self-insured vehicles are exempt from the insurance requirements of the new law.
