TESCO Banquet Held

Texas Electric employees can take pride in the fact that historically the company has been able to provide reliable service at reasonable prices. Texas Electric President Bill Marquardt said.

TESCO has been able to maintain its high standard of service despite obstacles imposed by the federal government, he said.

"In fact," Marquardt added, "instead of getting discouraged we've taken it as a challenge. And we're meeting it, too."

Speaking at the company's annual Quarter Century Club banquet on Monday night, Marquardt praised the employees for contributing their "time, efforts, and good work beyond the call of duty."

The banquet at the American Legion Hall in Graham, Texas was held in honor of 3 Eastland area employees recognized for completing 25 years of service with the company.

In his address, Marquardt pointed to "government rules, regulations, and restrictions" as the blockades that are "keeping us from solving the energy problem."

"They're killing us and our customers on price, too," he said. The Bureaucrats are about the biggest reason we've needed recent rate increases.

"If we didn't have massive federal over-regulation, and runaway inflation fueled by federal policies, we wouldn't have needed the rate increases we've been asking for. And I bet you, we wouldn't have had the long lines at the gas stations last summer either."

"A lot of the time, the things government dictates cost a whole lot more than they're worth," Marquardt noted. "And often they don't reflect what the people really want."

He went on to commend employees for overcoming these and other obstacles with the dedication and teamwork they have exhibited in sometimes unwarding situations. To illustrate, he referred to linemen who, when outages occur, immediately being restoring service, even in the most inclement weather.

They were the first to score and made extra points and then Eddie Pettit broke to make a TD but failing to make extra points in the last few seconds of the game. Earlier, he had a 25 yard TD which was called back because of a clipping penalty. Eddie Pettit had many carries for 86 yards. Jeff Seaton had 32 yards, Jacky Johnson had 43 yards, Mary Swanner had 10 yards and Johnny Trevino had 9 yards.

The Panthers evened up their season record at 2-2 Friday night when they traveled to Albany to take on the Lions of Class A. The Panthers really showed their poise as they overcame some bad calls to win the battle by a 16 to 14 margin.

The first Lion score came following a Panther aerial being intercepted and re-

turned to the Gorman 23 yard line. From there Julian Jones called his own number on a delay quarterback keeper and went the distance on the first play to make the score 6-0. Gossett kicked the PAT and Albany led 7-0 with 8:53 left in the first quarter.

Gorman came back with 3:39 left in the 2nd quarter when they recovered a fumble on the Lions 16. Jimmy Johnson scored the TD from 2 yards out and then added the 2 point conversion to put Gorman ahead 8-7. The half ended with the same score.

The Panthers came back in the final quarter and moved 98 yards in 7 plays with Johnson eating up the last 80 yards on a beautiful run behind some great blocks to put the Big Red ahead 14 to 7. Johnson also got the 2 point conversion to make the score read 16-7 with 11:20 left in the fourth period.

The Lions scored again with 6:05 left in the game going 52 yards in 3 plays with the help of a 15 yard call against the Panthers. Julian Jones ran in from 2 yards out to make the score 16 to 13. Gossett added the PAT and

Gorman still held a 2 point edge.

Gorman got another drive started but failed to score, giving the ball up at the Lion 7 yard line with only a couple of minutes left on the clock. The Panther defense did a good job in holding the Lions and the game ended with the Panthers winning 16 to 14.

Johnson again led the Panthers on the ground with 143 yards on 28 carries for a 5 yard average. A real bright spot in the game was the running of David Pettit who ran for 47 yards on 6 carries for an 8 yard average and he got the yardage at critical times in the game to keep drives alive. Larry Keith had 39 yards on 13 trips. Dane Gressett had 3 yards on two keeps and Toofer Bond got 2 yards on 4 tries.

The Panther defense again shown bright as they made play after play to stop the Lions at critical points in the game. We thought the outside players on defense were much improved and the only times they really allowed much yardage was on the 23 yard run for the Lion score and on a screen pass play when the Lions got outside the Panther containment for a long gainer. Andy, Kip, Harvey, Bob, Curtis, Ricky, Jimmy, Larry, Steve, Danny and Riley all did a great job to preserve the victory for Gorman.

The Panthers play at home this week when they host the Perrin Pirates on Friday night at 8:00. This will be parents night and the Big Red should really be up for this one. Parents are asked to be at the field by 7:30 for introductions and pre-game activities.

We look for the Panthers to really impress their parents on Friday night with a big win in preparation for starting the District 6-B East competition next week when they host the always tough Evant Elks.
