It was really two one man shows on Friday night as the Panthers began District 6-B East play by hosting the Evant Elks and come out on top of a 28 to 10 score. On the one hand it was a one man defensive show as Steve Spivey, starting in his first game this season for the Panthers at the defensive halfback slot, really thrilled the Gorman fans by intercepting 2 passes, catching an Elk fumble in the air and returning it for a TD, and also receiving two fumbles. His performance earned him the Defensive Player of the Week Award from the Abilene Reporter News for the area.

Of course all the Panther defense did a marvelous job all night against the Elks, but Spivey was in the right place at the right time and was really ball hawking.

The other one man show was Larry Keith who led the Big Red offense with 108 yards on 18 carries for a 6 yard average. And a lot of his runs were in critical downs when the Big Red had to have yardage for first downs.

The power in his runs was a beautiful sight to see as he broke tackle after tackle to gain yardage.

The first score of the game came with 10:02 left in the second period when the Elks recovered a Panther fumble at the Gorman 19 and scored in 5 plays with Robbie Oney catching a pass for the final 8 yards for the TD. Mark Kyle kicked the PAT and Evant led 7-0.

The Panthers came back with 6:57 left in the half with

Jimmy Johnson getting the final yard for the TD to cap a 33 yard drive after Spivey had set the Big Red up with one of his pass interceptions.

The drive featured a 32 yard run by Johnson to the 1 yard line. The Panthers were penalized for motion, then after one running play, Johnson drove into the end zone for the score. He also ran for the 2 point play and the Panthers went ahead 8 to 7.

Evant came back before the half and after receiving another one of the Panthers 8 fumbles at the Gorman 31, the Elks ran six plays and got to the Gorman 14 before they had to settle for a Mark Kyle field goal of 25 yards to put the Elks ahead at the half by a 10 to 8 margin.

The last half was all Gorman as the Panthers took control of the game. The Panthers got the go-ahead score on a 25 yard fumble recovery in the air by Spivey, which he returned for a TD with 8:13 left in the period. The run for points failed and Gorman led 14 to 10.

Johnson had three players keying on him all night but still got 71 yards on 19 carries for a 3.7 average. Gressett had a minus one on 5 keeps.

The entire Panthers defense was really up for the game and did a great job. RATE FILING FOR SERVICE CHARGE AND GCA CLAUSE

Gorman, October 12, 1979 -- Lone Star Gas Company's District Manager, W. L. Simmel, today filed an application to change the service charges and revise the gas cost adjustment clause in Gorman.

Simmel emphasized the base rate being charged for gas consumed by residential and commercial customers will not be increased under the proposal.

The new service charges being requested by Lone Star are \$20 for a reconnection; \$18 per hour for appliance service; \$20 per hour for air conditioning service; \$5 for a returned check; and \$40 to disconnect and reconnect a customer's yard line for repair.

"These charges are de-

signed to recover Lone Star's expense for these services," says Simmel. "A relatively small portion of Lone Star's customers require these special services, and these charges put the cost of the work on those who use the service."

The gas cost adjustment requested in the application would allow Lone Star to recover distribution operating expense that increase with the city gate cost of gas.

The estimated total increase in annual revenue for Lone Star's Gorman distribution system under the proposed change is \$5,361, or \$2.74 percent.

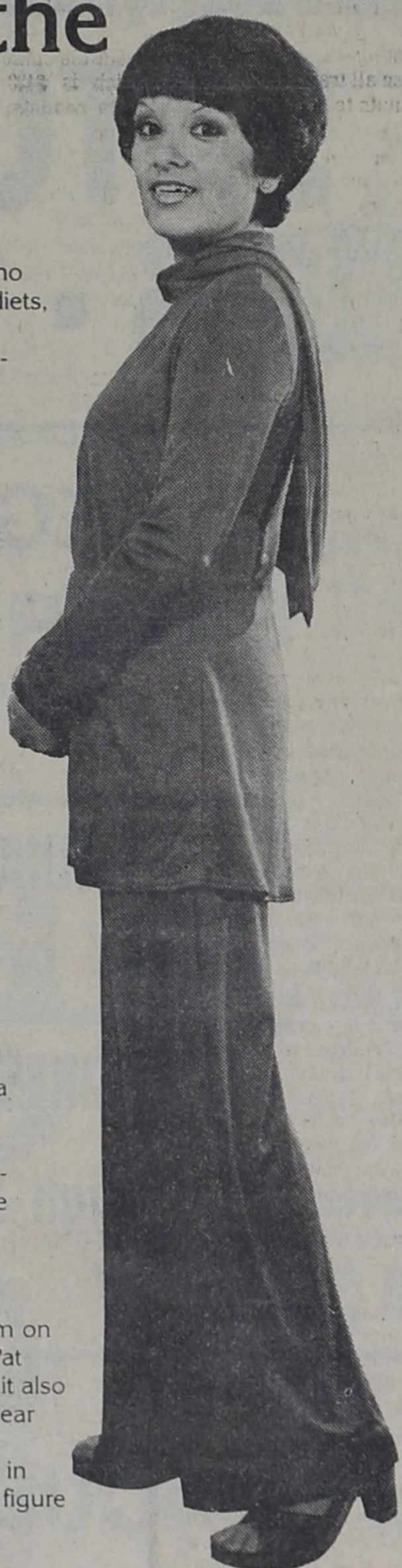

7 County Hay Producers Win Champion Ship Plaques At Fair

Dr. George Alston, Extension Service Agronomist, classified the hay based on physical and chemical (Protein) scores. Entries with the highest total scores in each division were named champion.

Troy Cross had the champion bale of coastal bermudagrass which graded 93.5. It tested 13.6% protein. K.F. Kirk had the champion perennial grass hay with a total score of 84 and 9.8% protein.

Eastland County Trailer Shortage Hampers Harvest

Peanut growers throughout Eastland County are now in the peak of harvest season. The biggest problem during last week was the shortage of trailers to haul peanuts to the dryers reports County Extension Agent De Gordon. Trailers and trucks loaded with Eastland County's number one crop were lined up at all buying stations last week. Some growers said harvesting was being slowed because all trailers were full of peanuts to be dried.

The weather has been ideal for peanut harvest; however, most agree the soil is too dry and better soil moisture would help the digging operation, reports Gordon. Many who are harvesting would have preferred to wait a little longer for more peanuts to mature, but lack of rain in September and low supply of irrigation water caused peanut maturity to stop, therefore there is no need to leave the crop any longer. The runner type peanuts require about three more weeks to mature than the Spanish varieties the agent said.

Dryland peanuts are producing very good yields. The yields are ranging from 30 to 75 bushels per acre with good grades. There are some Seg 3 peanuts showing up; but only about one percent of the crop, which is considered good. The rains gave good growing conditions through most of the season up until September. Gordon believes if the rains had continued through September, Eastland County would have had one of its largest peanut
