

Panthers Cage Tigers; Play In Brownwood Friday

The Gorman Panthers made it a clean sweep in the East Zone of District 7-A on Friday night by defeating the Blanket Tigers by the score of 37 to 6 to go undefeated in zone play. This puts the Big Red in the District Title Game with the Miles Bulldogs on Friday night at Gordon Woods Stadium in Brownwood at 8 p. m. The 8 p. m. time will allow fans more time to get to the game after work.

The Bulldogs are also undefeated in their West Zone race and will be a strong playoff team for the Panthers for the District Title and the right to represent District 7-A in the Bi-District playoff. The Bulldogs defeated Eden last Friday night to decide the West Zone Champion.

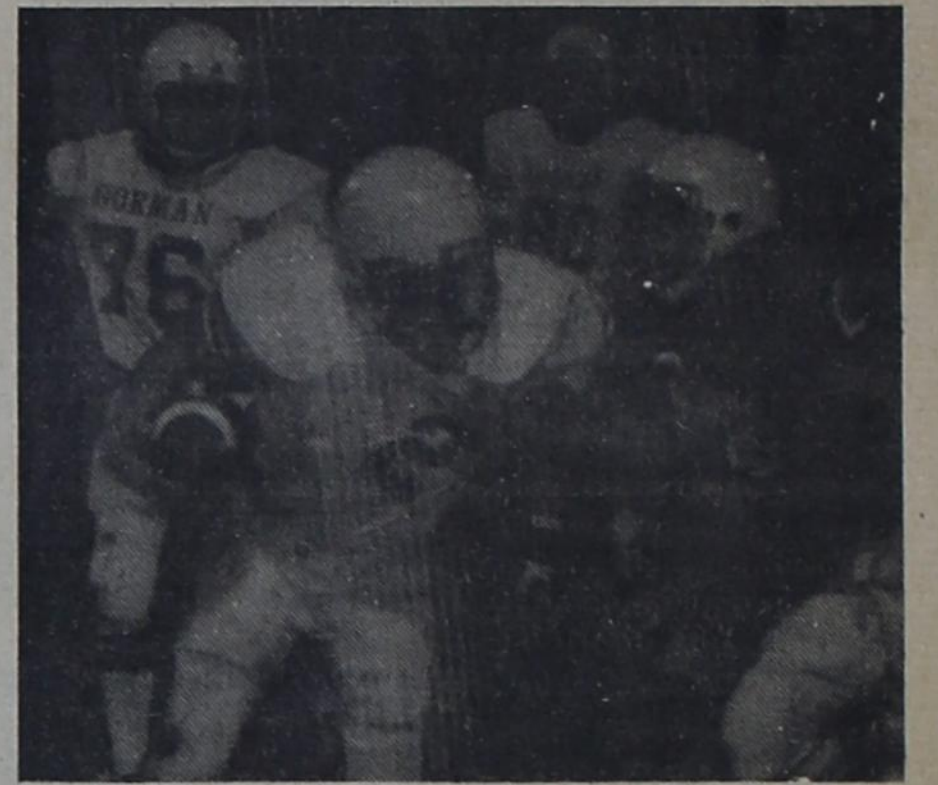
Gorman will be the visiting team on Friday night and will set on the East side of the stadium. The best way to get to the Gordon Woods Stadium is to go out on the Brady highway and watch for the sign directing you to the stadium.

This game is expected to be one of the finest games in the entire area this week and the Panther defense will be tested to capacity as the Bulldogs have an outstanding offensive team and a tough defensive group as evidenced by the scores against them this season. We feel the experience the Panthers have had in playoff games will be an asset to the Big Red and we think the Panthers will really be up for this one because if they lose this one the season will end. The winner of this game will play Meridian.

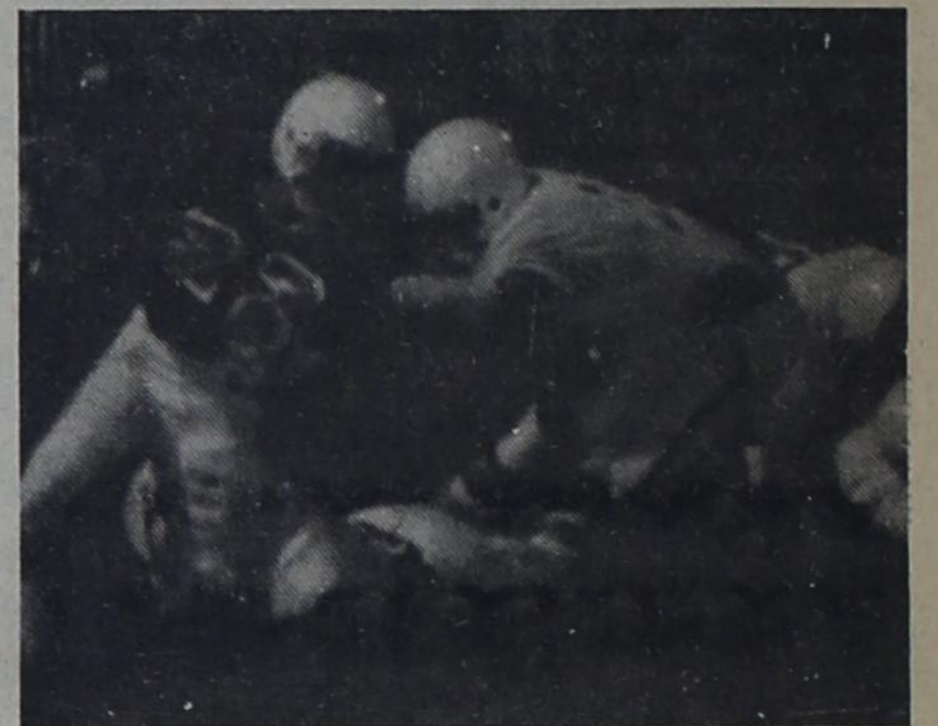
The Panthers wasted little time in exerting their intentions on Friday night as Jimmy Johnson took the opening kickoff and raced 90 yards for a touchdown with just 14 seconds gone off the clock. He hit heavy traffic at about the Gorman 40 but behind some fine blocks he broke into the clear and went the distance. Scotty Mauney added the two pointer on a run and the Panthers led 8-0.

The Big Red defense then held the Tigers on downs and on the punt Johnson took the ball about his own 17 and again got some crisp blocks and got around the corner and went all the way for the second touchdown with 8:52 left in the period. The run for two points failed and Gorman led 14-0.

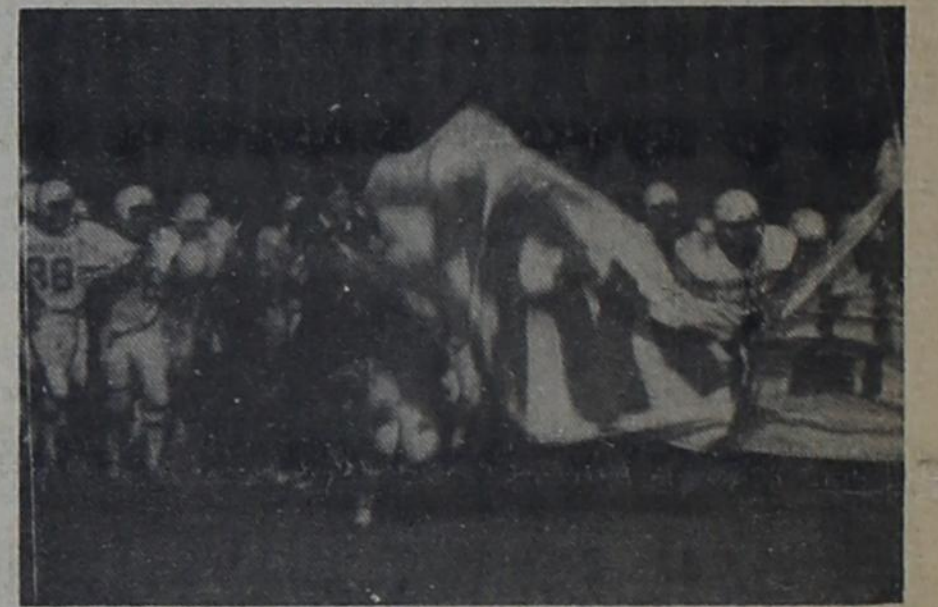
The Panthers defense again did its job and held the Tigers, forcing a punt. The Panthers returned the ball to the Tiger 41. From there the Panthers scored in 7 plays with Scotty Mauney scoring from 5 yards out on a fine run. The drive featured a 12 yard pass to Johnson and a beautiful 25 yard run by Toofer Bond. The score came with 4:21 left in the period and Dane Gressett caught a pass from Jeff Seaton for the

two pointer and the Panthers were in command with a 22-0 lead.

The tough Panther defense again turned the ball over to the offense when they recovered a Tiger fumble at their own 44. The Panthers scored in just 5 plays with Mauney getting the final 4 yards on a run with 7:58 left in the second period. The drive featured a 9 yard run by Scotty, a 10 yard run by Jimmy, and a 33 yard scamper by Scotty prior to his 4 yard scoring run. Jacky added the two pointer and Gorman led 30-0.

Following the halftime intermission the Panther defense again held the Tigers and the offense started a drive from the Tiger 29 where the punt return was stopped. Jimmy Johnson got the score on the 6th play of the drive on a 7 yard run. He had also had two runs of 11 yards each on the drive. The score came with 7:59 left in the third. Jimmy kicked the point after and the game was

iced away by the score of 37-0. The Panther reserves played the major portion of the last half on offense as the starters got a rest. With 2:16 left in the game the Tigers finally got on the board with a 3 yard pass to Townsend from Laughlin for the score. A pass try for two points failed and the final score read 37-6. Jacky Johnson led the way for the Panthers on the ground with 62 yards on 14 carries. Mauney had 55 on 8 totes. Jimmy Johnson had only 4 carries for the evening netting 38 yards. Toofer had a fine night getting 39 on 4 trips. Juan Pacheco got 18 on 8. Woodall had 16 on 5, and Jeff Seaton had 2 yards on 4 keeps.

U.I.L. RE-ALIGNMENT CHANGES DIS. TO 8A

The University Interscholastic League announced Monday in Austin its re-alignment of Texas high schools in 136 districts for the next two years, 1982-83 and 1983-84. The announcement came following a three-day fall executive committee meeting. Every two years the U.I.L. determines the classifications and districts for high schools, based on the average daily membership the two previous years.

De Leon will be moving to District 12-AA and will be joined by Hamilton, Hico, Dublin, Ranger, and Millsap.

A football schedule for 1982 appears in this week's paper. Practically every school in the central Texas area was affected by the changes.

District 10-AA, of which De Leon had been a part, retains Bangs, Early, and San Saba, and adds Junction, Mason, and Menard.

Cisco and Eastland move to 8-AA to join Albany, Anson, Baird, Hawley, Tuscola Jim Ned, and Winters.

Comanche, Coleman, and Brady remain in 8-AAA and Burnet, Llano, and Marble Falls have been added to this district. Sonora and Ballinger move to 6-AAA.

Selective Service Registration Continues For 18 Year Olds

Young men are required by law to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. They may register at any U.S. Post Office.

Registration is a simple process. A man fills out a registration form which asks only for his name, address, phone number, social security number, and date of birth.

The purpose of registration is to have available on a computer the names of men born in 1960, and afterward, who could be contacted quickly if there ever were a national emergency and Congress were to declare an induction.

Peacetime registration will save the United States at least 6 weeks time in mobilizing its manpower in an emergency. This is especially important with today's All Volunteer Force.

There are only 2 million men in the armed services today, but we would need many more men quickly should an emergency arise - for example, in World War II we had 10 to 16 million men bearing arms depending upon the stage of the conflict.

Registration and revitalization of the Selective Service do not signal a return to a draft. They are simply emergency preparedness issues. President Reagan is firmly committed to making the All Volunteer Force a success, supporting incentives to recruit and retain volunteers.

To date, nearly 6 million men have registered. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine and/or five years in prison.

One-Vehicle Accident Kills Gorman Man

GORMAN — Quistian Alfonso Ramirez, 34, of Gorman, an employee of Birdsong Peanut Company, was killed about 9:40 p.m. Sunday in a one-vehicle accident on the north side of Brogdon Football Field near Gorman High School, Gorman Police Chief Cecil Funderburgh said.

Ramirez was southbound on FM 8 when he apparently lost control of his pickup while making a right turn, Funderburgh said. He said the truck went into a ditch and overturned, throwing Ramirez from the vehicle. Ramirez

was taken to Blackwell Memorial Hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival, Funderburgh said. Graveside services will be at Palmar Primo Cemetery in San Luis Potosi, Mexico.

Local arrangements were made by Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Born Aug. 2, 1947, he was a Catholic.

Survivors include his wife, Lionor Briones of Mexico; five children, all of Mexico; and a brother, Anaclemo Quistian of Mexico.

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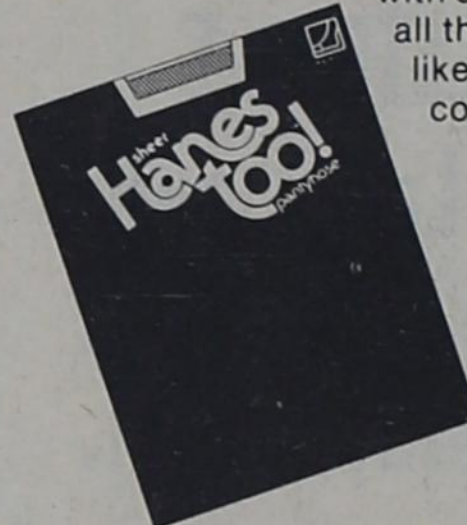

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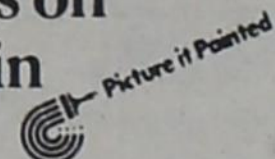

year that all have experienced in raising a crop.

Wednesday is Armistice Day. Gee! How well I remember that at 11 a.m. all the yelling and whooping at The Guard House. There was just a street (in the army the space between the buildings were called streets) we thought it was a prison break. They were yelling "We will be home for Christmas."

They kept on discharging men. I asked why I was not Discharged. They told me I was a volunteer and the others were Draftees.

I finally came home on May 22, 1919. George Hallmark came in on same train. What a coincidence. We are the only War I Vets living in Gorman. He served in the 36th Division over seas. I served in the 45th Kansas - Missouri Division. Did not go over Seas. Due to being sick and marked U.S. Duty only.

When 22 of us Texans went to Ft. Sill, Field Bakery, tents just staked on ground, tallow candles, Kitchen not screened. Toilets just holes dug in ground. 67 men of 7th Calvary were made into Bakers. Most of them had been in over 20 years. Top Sgt. 32 years, was a Buck Private when War began. Most of them were from other countries. One man had deserted French Foreign Legion. That was the same Co. that Custer belonged to. They all wanted excitement.

They had been in Mexico after Villa. They had an Indian Scout.

The post Bakery and other buildings for 14 F.A. were built while Taft was President. I saw and heard him speak at Ft. Sill. He was some larger than Clyde Pulley is. They called him "Bean Belly". He just weighed 350 pounds. We finished baking tho did not clean up. We had to go about 1/4 mile to mess Hall. The Sgt. announced everything closed til 5 a.m. next morning. You are all off.

When those guys were yelling so a Guard came up

with Two prisoners in hobbles, ball and chain. They walked about like a girl with a hobble shirt, real short steps.

Our deepest sympathy goes out to the Belyeu family in the death of Leui Belyeu. He was one of my pupils of Lone Star. I remember he had beautiful blonde hair and he was proud of it. He was a good pupil in school, never causing any trouble. May you look to the Master of All in you bereavement.

Poor little Sweeden had to bow to the Russians in that final decision. What a Shame. Remember when

F.D.K. became president, he had U.S. to recognize Russia. Also at Yelta in War II him and Stalin made English and U.S. Forces pull back so that Russia could take most of Germany and he knew what Russia captured they always kept it.

What a mistake after the A bomb on Japan and they gave up.

Then Russia blocked the road to Berlin. Truman should have said to Russia "you have 24 hours to start moving to your borders before the war". That would have saved so much sorrow and trouble.

We certainly want to thank the Carbon 4-H Club for those wonderful Halloween Cookies. They were so delicious. We love you for your kind thoughtfulness of us.



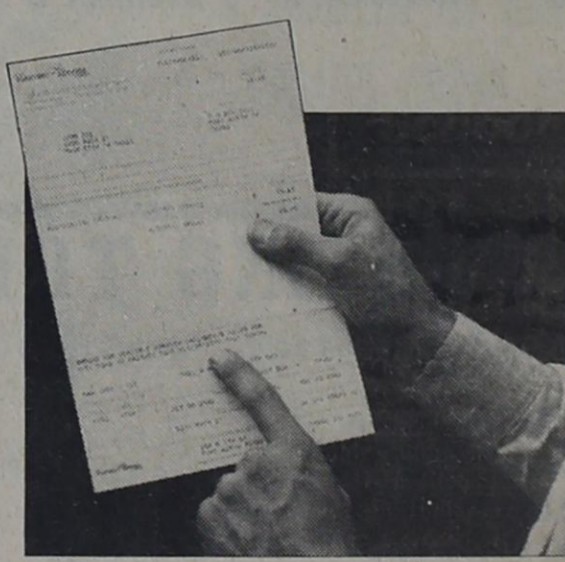
