Care Flite Helicopter Lands At Gorman



Care Flight, a new helicopter ambulance program serving a 150 mile radius of Fort Worth-Dallas, began operations on October 1. The program is expected to serve approximately 100 counties in northern Texas and southern Oklahoma.

Care Flite is based at Harris Hospital - Methodist Hospitals in Fort Worth and Dallas. The program is operated by North Central Texas Services, a non-profit corporation formed to provide the service.

Care Flite will prove to be truly a life saving program because the transportation to appropriate medical facilities can mean the difference between life and death.

Care Flite patients will be transported to the hospital of their choice or the most appropriate medical facility offering an approved landing site and the needed specialized medical personnel.

Patients may be referred to the service by a physician or law enforcement officer. Care Flite crews include a pilot, flight nurse and in many cases a physician.

Care Flite's Long Ranger II helicopter ambulance cruises at 140 MPH, and has a range of approximately 350 miles.

Care Flite helicopters accommodate two patients, a medical team, a special critical care equipment and supplies such as monitor and defibrillation equipment, neonatal isolettes, intravenous fluid supplies, oxygen and emergency medications.

A team of specially trained and experienced physicians, nurses, pilots, and dispat-

chers ensure precise coordination of medical care for each Care Flite mission.

Registered nurses, skilled in emergency care procedures, administer on-the-scene and in-flight treatment for conditions such as cardiac noenatal, pulmonary, orthopedic, obstretical/gynecological and trauma emergencies.

A sophisticated communications center provides a continuous link between dispatchers and law enforcement agencies, fire departments, emergency ambulance service, physicians and hospitals.

Ground-to-air and air-to-ground capabilities allow direct communications between the in-flight nurse and the receiving physician or hospital enabling close coordination of treatment enroute. The communication among the dispatcher, hospital, and helicopter permit scheduling of ground ambulances if needed on landing. Care Flite helicopter ambulances are based at Mehodist Central Hospital in Dallas and Harris Hospital - Methodist in Fort Worth.

The Blackwell Memorial Hospital in Gorman has a helicopter landing space within yards of the hospital.

Making the flight to Gorman were Patsy Garner, Assistant Staff writer at Harris Hospital, Linda Rose, RN, Chief Flight nurse and Larry Stone, Pilot. Making the trip with the crew was Dr. Stephen Weinberg, who does surgery at Blackwell Memorial Hospital.

The Panthers avenged a loss in last season's District Title game by soundly defeating the Robert Lee Steers this past Friday night by a score of 32 to 12 for the right to represent District 6-B in the Bi-District Playoffs.

The Panthers will meet the Windthorst Trojans, winners of 5-B over Gorem by a score of 28-14, this Friday evening in Mineral Wells Miller Stadium at 7:30 p. m. for the Bi-District Title.

The best way to go direct

to the stadium is go to Desdemona, get on Hwy. 16 and go north to Hwy. 180, then turn east to go to Mineral Wells. The stadium is on the right side (south) of the street going in. Its just past the drive-in theater. If you wish, you can go to IH 20 then go east to the Mineral Wells exit and go into Mineral Wells, then turn west on 180 (West Hubbard) and it is about 2 miles to the stadium. There are some good places to eat in Mineral Wells, most of which are on the east side of town. Gorman will be the visitors in this game and will set on the west side. Most all parking is behind the stand on the home (east) side. This is a very nice stadium and a nice site for the playoffs.

The Panthers were awesome to say the least on Friday night in Abilene as they stopped the Steers on their first possession with a

fine pass interception by Steve Spivey to set the Panthers up at the Steer 42. From there the Big Red scored in 9 plays with Jimmy Johnson going the final 11 yards for the TD with 5:45 left in the period. The pass try for points failed and Gorman led 6-0.

The next Panther score came following a Steer fumble recovery by Harvey Bryan at the Robert Lee 38. It took only one play to score as Johnson broke off his right side, evaded two tackles near the line of scrimmage and raced the distance for the score with 2:45 left in the period. The try for points failed and Gorman led 12-0.

The teams played on even terms with neither team scoring before half-time.

Then with 7:15 left in the fourth period, the Big Red offense cranked up a 33 yard drive in 5 plays with Johnson

getting the final 20 yards on a beautiful run behind some great blocks. Larry Keith ran for the 2 point conversion and Gorman led 20 to 0.

Then came the Steers first score of the night. They took the kickoff on their own 36 and went the distance for the TD in 9 plays, mostly via the pass. Darren Williams got the final 1 yard with 3:15 left in the game. The kick was blocked and the score was 20 to 6.

The Panthers then answered with another TD of their own. Following an on-side kick try by the Steers, the Big Red took the ball on the Gorman 48 and scored in only 3 plays. The drive featured an amazing 38 yard run by Johnson to the Steer 6. From there Steve Spivey took the handoff, went to his fourth period, the Big Red offense cranked up a 33 yard drive in 5 plays with Johnson
