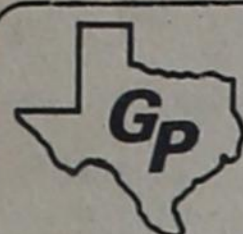

PANTHERS WIN BI-DISTRICT

Play Wink In San Angelo Friday

The Gorman Panthers surprised the Meridian Yellowjackets and a lot of other sports folks on Saturday night when they held off a last minute desperation drive by the Yellowjackets to protect a 28 to 22 lead and capture the Bi-District Title and the right to advance to the Quarterfinal Game this Friday night against the Wink Wildcats at 8 p. m. in San Angelo.

The Panther defense did what they had to in the closing minute and that was to stop a potent Meridian offense on a 4th down and with just 43 ticks left on the clock. They turned the ball over to the offense and let them kill the time on the clock to preserve the win. Enough cannot be said for the defense, and for sure enough cannot be said for the outstanding performance of Jimmy Johnson who rushed for 318 yards of Gorman's 345 yard total on 28 carries. He had some beautiful blocks up front, but he also did a tremendous amount of yard gaining on his own. He will be the first to tell you that he could not run the good runs without the fine blocks from the men up front and surely they know that's true. It was just a marvelous effort from ALL the Panther players.

The Panther dream continued to snooze along in the Bi-District Game as the Big Red took the opening kickoff on their own 25 and scored in just 2 plays. Scotty Mauney hit for 3 yards and then lightning struck fast as Jimmy took the handoff and broke free and raced 72 yards for the score as the Yellowjackets stood stunned with just 45 seconds off the clock. The try for two points failed and Gorman led 6-0.

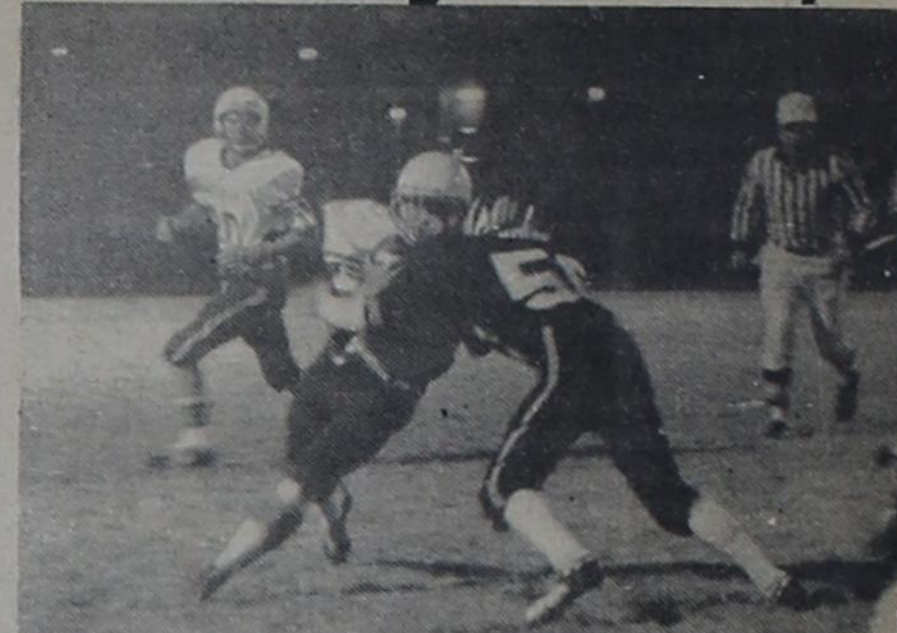
The lead was short lived, however, as the Jackets took the ball on their own 36 and marched the distance in 13 plays with Chatfield getting the final yard for the score with 6:01 left in the period. Ricky Koonsman kicked the PAT and Meridian led 7-6.

Following a change of possessions, Gorman took the ball on their own 7 and drove the distance in 11 plays with Jeff Seaton getting the final 2 yards on a QB sneak play with 7:53 left in the half. The drive featured 42, 11 and 11 by Jimmy. Again the try for two points failed and Gorman led 12-7.

The Panthers added another score before halftime as they took the ball on their own 43 and shocked the Jackets again as Jimmy took the handoff and got into the open and raced the 43 yards for the TD with 1:57 left in the half. A pass from Seaton to Dane Gressett added the two pointer and Gorman took a 20 to 7 lead into the dressing room at intermission. The Yellowjackets ran onto the field after the half and really woke up all the Panthers and their fans as they took the kickoff on their own 35 and moved the distance on a long drive taking 13 plays and ended with Chatfield getting the final yard with just 6:25 left in the quarter. Koonsman kicked the PAT and the score stood at 20 to 14.

However, the Panthers again showed their offensive power and took the ball on their own 34 and scored in just two plays with Johnson shocking the Jackets on a beautiful 60 yard scamper with 9:34 left in the game. Johnson added the two pointer on a run and Gorman went out in front 28 to 14.

The lead was threatened, however, when the Panthers turned the ball over to Meridian after failing to make a first down at a critical time and the Jackets started a drive with just over a minute

and a half left. The Panther defense did a good job and had the Jackets held but they were tagged with an inadvertent face mask penalty that gave them the first down on the third down penalty and moved to the Gorman 20 with a fourth down and 2 and here is where the Panthers really showed their stuff as they held a big 215 (at least) fullback (Chatfield just inches short on the fourth down burst up the middle and gave the Panther offense the job of killing the clock and assuring the victory for the Bi-District crown. And that's just what the Big Red offense did and gave Gorman the win sending the Panther fans into bedlam and the Meridian fans into shock.

So I guess you could say that the Big Red defense gets the big pat on the back this week as they really rose to the occasion when the chips were down and the game depended on their holding Chatfield on fourth down and 2.

Jimmy Johnson had a marvelous night accounting for 318 of Gorman's 345 yard total on the ground and Seaton was 2 of 5 passing with 2 completions for 11 yards counting the two point try. Scotty Mauney got 18 on

7 tries and Jacky Johnson had but 4 yards on 4 carries. Seaton had 3 yards on 5 keeps but lost 5 on one bad handoff try.

The Panthers have fooled all the pollsters so far as they continue their quest for the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow and will meet the Wink Wildcats at 8 p. m. in San Angelo on Friday night in the Quarterfinal Game to see who will advance to the Semi-Finals next week.

The Big Red needs all the backing we can give them as they meet the No. 1 rated team in this game Friday night. And we feel that the Panthers will have a very, very large crowd to follow them to San Angelo and boost them to yet another victory toward their dream.

Sweet dreams Panthers... and Get 'Em Big Red!

The game will be played at Bobcat Stadium in San Angelo. There will be maps showing the location of the stadium distributed around Gorman probably by Wednesday. Admission will be \$4 and \$2 again this week and advance tickets will be on sale at the bank and school.

Remember game time will be 8 p. m. and Gorman will again be the visitors.

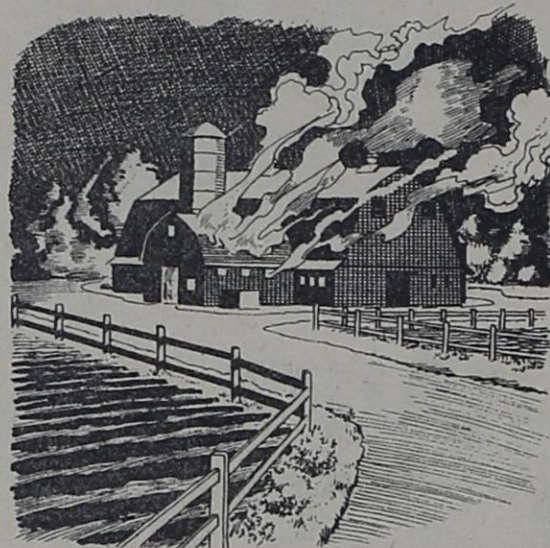

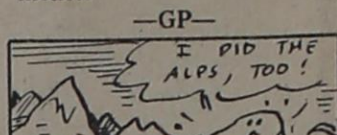

BROWN ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR SECOND TERM

AUSTIN — Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown announced his candidacy for a second term in ceremonies at the State Capitol November 17. He stressed his record in office and his 32 years of service to farmers, ranchers, and consumers of Texas.

"I do not offer pie-in-the-sky promises; I'm working to keep meat and potates

on the table." Brown said in presenting the accomplishments of his first term. "Today's economic conditions call for sensible answers from leaders who know agriculture."

"By acting decisively, we have kept the Mediterranean fruit fly out of Texas. California has spent \$100 million because of delayed action, but we won the battle with common sense," he said. "As president of the southern commissioners of agriculture, I could unify the 15 states for a successful effort."

"We've been able to provide superior service in administering 60 laws for consumer protection, marketing, and agricultural support programs for about \$1 per capita," Brown said. "With frugal management in my term we have returned to the State \$1.4 million in contingency funds that could not
