PANTHERS WIN BI-DISTRICT

Play Wink In San Angelo Friday

GAME AT A GLANCE

Meridian Gorman First Downs Yards Rushing 282 Yards Passing 2 of 5 Passes Comp. 4 of 11 Interceptions **Fumbles Lost** 2 for 32 Punts. Avg. 4 for 30 2 for 20 Penalties 6 for 50

The Gorman Panthers surprised the Meridian Yellowjackets and a lot of other sports folks on Saturday nite when they held off a last minute desperation drive by the Yellowjackets to protect a 28 to 22 lead and capture the Bi-District Title and the right to advance to the Quarterfinal Game this Friday night against the Wink Wildcats at 8 p. m. in San Angelo.

The Panther defense did what they had to in the closing minute and that was to stop a potent Meridian offense on a 4th down and with just 43 ticks left on the clock. They turned the ball over to the offense and let them kill the time on the clock to preserve the win. Enough cannot be said for the defense, and for sure enough cannot be said for the outstanding performance of Jimmy Johnson who rushed for 318 yards of Gorman's 345 yard total on 28 carries. He had some beautiful blocks up front, but he also did a tremendous amount of yard gaining on his own. He will be the first to tell you that he could not run the good runs without the fine blocks from the men up front and surely they know that's true. It was just a marvelous effort from

ALL the Panther players. The Panther dream continued to snooze along in the Bi-District Game as the Big Red took the opening kickoff on their own 25 and scored in just 2 plays. Scotty Mauney hit for 3 yards and then lightning struck fast as Jimmy took the handoff and broke free and raced 72 yards for the score as the Yellowjackets stood stunned with just 45 seconds off the clock. The try for two points failed

and Gorman led 6-0. The lead was short lived, however, as the Jackets took the ball on their own 36 and marched the distance in 13 plays with Chatfield getting the final yard for the score with 6:01 left in the period. Ricky Koonsman kicked the PAT and Meridian led 7-6.

Following a change of possessions, Gorman took the ball on their own 7 and drove the distance in 11 plays with Jeff Seaton getting the final 2 yards on a QB sneak play with 7:53 left in the half. The drive featured 42, 11 and 11 by Jimmy. Again the try for two points failed and Gorman led 12-7.

The Panthers added an-

other score before halftime as they took the ball on their own 43 and shocked the Jackets again as Jimmy took the handoff and got into the open and raced the 43 yards for the TD with 1:57 left in the half. A pass from Seaton to Dane Gressett added the two pointer and Gorman took a 20 to 7 lead into the dressing room at intermission. The Yellowjackets ran onto the field after the half and really woke up all the Panthers and their fans as they took the kickoff on their own 35 and moved the distance on a long drive taking 13 plays and ended with Chatfield getting the final yard with just 6:25 left in the quarter. Koonsman kicked the PAT and the score stood at 20 to 14.

However, the Panthers again showed their offensive power and took the ball on their own 34 and scored in just two plays with Johnson shocking the Jackets on a beautiful 60 yard scamper with 9:34 left in the game. Johnson added the two pointer on a run and Gorman went out in front 28 to 14.

The lead was threatened. however, when the Panthers turned the ball over to Meridian after failing to make a first down at a critical time and the Jackets started a drive with just over a minute

And that's just what the Big Red offense did and gave Gorman the win sending the Panther fans into bedlam and the Meridian fans into shock.
