

Remember Gorman **HENRY CAPERS** WAS SPECIAL

There was a time in my life when Henry Capers' Picture Show in Gorman was the absolute center of the universe--at least on Saturday. For a kid, Gorman was a good place to be in the Depression years. Grown folks, had it rough because they needed money.

But a dime would buy you a show ticket and a bag of popcorn, and you could stay and see the picture at least twice if you wanted to--and we always did. My brother, Jack, and I always got out dime's worth.

Who can forget Tom Mix, Buck Jones, Hapalong Cassidy, Jonny Mack Brown, Bob Steele, Gene Autry and Frog Millhouse (Smiley Burnette), the Three Mesquiters (one of which was John Wayne), Gabby Hayes, or Max Terhune and his talking dummy Elmer? The program usually consisted of a shoot-'em-up western, a cartoon, and a "serial" which ran from chapter to chapter week to week to keep you coming back. The in inst

I remember one of those serials was so scary though that old Henry discontinued it after the third episode and replaced it with something a little more gentle for little folks. Violence was okay in those westerns, cartoons, and serials; the bad guys always got jailed or shot, and there was a sense of justice taught in it all.

But in this particular serial, "Tim Tyler's Flying Luck," Africans were being turned into zombies. After somebody was robbed of his mind and turned in a zombie, there was not return. These were just good infocent African savages being turned into zombies with a machine the evil old bad guys had invented. That was too much for Henry. He put the serial back in the film; can and returned it to Hollywood as unfit for kids to see. 5

It happened right after the hero of the serial, Tim Tyler, and his girlfriend' were shown about to be zombieized. They were already in the zombie making machine fixing to get worked over when words flashed on the screen saying WATCH NEXT WEEK FOR AN-OTHER THRILLING EPI-SODE." to viion

Somehow, in a lot of us old kids' minds, Tim Tyler must still be a zombie marching around in the jungle of the Depression years. We never found out what happened to him because next week we just abruptly started Episode No. 1 of a new serial.

Henry Capers was a super guy, as just about everybody who ever met him knows. W who ever met him knows. We lived on a farm next to Mrs. Capers' mother, near Bass Lake. Henry and Mrs. Capers lived at Bass Lake,

The economics of the Depression moved my family to Brownwood in 1939, and I have been in some of this country's fanciest movie palaces since. But no place of entertainment will ever seem quite so special as the Picture Show in Gorman run by that greatest of entrepreneurs, Henry Capers. His place was special. So was Henry.

He gave folks in Gorman some wholesome places to enjoye during the tedium of the Depression's bad times. And the price was always
