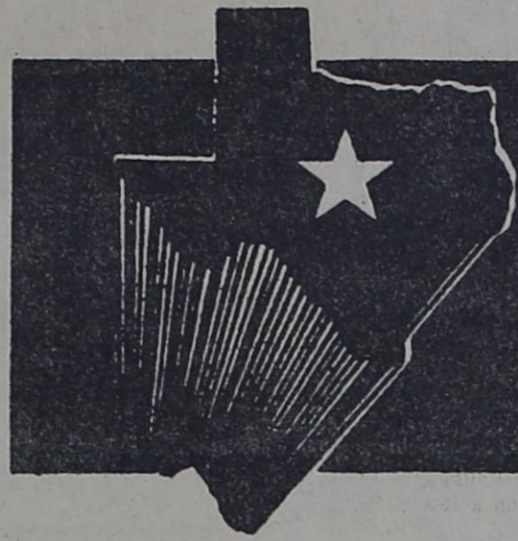
The Rev. Darrell Dossey, pastor of the First Baptist Church officiated. Burial was in Oaklawn Cemetery.
