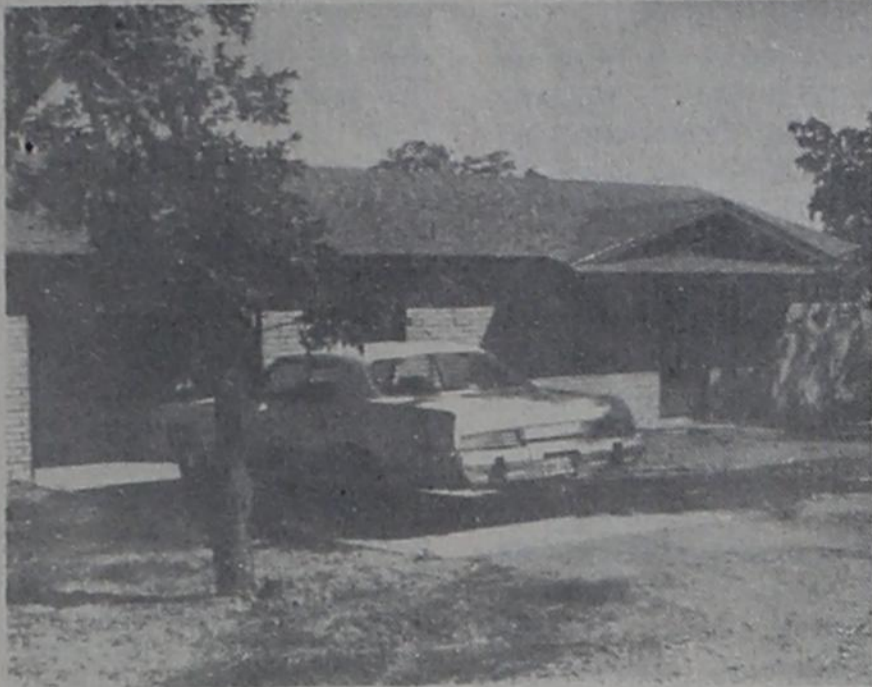

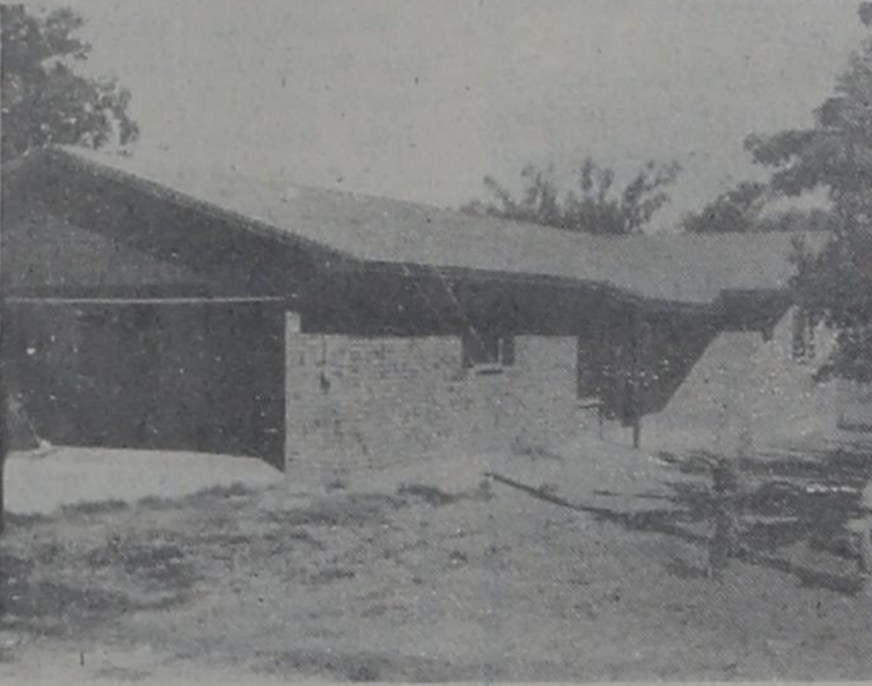

Reappraisal Crew Still In Gorman

The Task of re-evaluation of the taxable property within Eastland County has been going on for several weeks now. Work has recently started in the Gorman area and will probably take several more days to complete. The work is being done by field crews of the valuation firm of McMorries and Company. These crews have already completed work in the Rising Star and Carbon areas.

Work is presently being done in Cisco and Gorman with another crew due to start this week in the Eastland area. The Gorman area is being worked at the present time by a city and a rural crew.

When the property owner is visited by the appraisers, he will first be furnished with their identification before they start any type of measurement or classification work. If for some reason the property owner is not at home or unavailable, the identification will be left and the measurements will then be taken. Representatives of the firm stress the fact that it is not necessary for them to enter the residence in order to do their work.

The work is being done throughout the County in order for the tax units of the County to fulfill the mandated requirements of the 1979 legislature. By the 1982 tax year, all taxable property must be on the tax rolls at 100% market value. In order to meet this requirement, it was necessary to undertake the mass appraisal of the entire county. The values being created at this time will not be used until the 1982 tax year and should not effect your 1981 tax statements.

If you have any questions concerning the reappraisal work being done in your area please contact the local school tax office.

Ranger Junior College Vocational Nursing Department is now taking applications for the 1981-1982 class, which begins August 31, 1981. LVN applicants will be tested August 3, 1981 at 9:00 a.m. in the LVN classroom at Ranger Junior College. A fee of \$5.00 will be charged for the test.

The LVN program is fully accredited by the Vocational Nurse Licensing Board of Texas, and is a twelve month, 52 week program with 18 weeks of classroom followed by clinical experience in Ranger General and De Leon Hospitals. During the year, several field trips are planned including a trip to San Antonio to Brook Army Burned Center and Brook Air Force Base Medical Center. Enrollment in class is limited to 15 and selection of students is based on personal interviews, personal references and results of pre-entrance exam. The Texas Consumer Association's Report from Austin

By Jim Hightower, President

When you think of oil companies, what names come to mind?

If you're like most gasoline buyers, you probably think of brand names like Exxon, Mobil and Shell, and the mere thought of their exorbitant prices and profits most likely makes you fume.

But there's more to this industry than a handful of multi-billion dollar, multi-national conglomerates trying to rip us off. Far away from the skyscraper headquarters of Big Oil, out in the far reaches of the Texas countryside, down at ground level where money is risked and crude is pumped, you'll find another breed of oil men and women. There you'll find the true competitors within this industry — thousands of wildcaters, mom & pop royalty owners and independent production companies.

These are the people who find oil for us. Sure, Exxon and the other big names take out ads telling us they're putting their profits into oil exploration, but a lot of them are like New York cowboys: all hat, no cattle.

The little "no-name" enterprises, on the other hand, do more drilling than advertising — last year, 83% of all wells in Texas were drilled by these independents.

You would think, then, that government tax policy might favor those who put their money where their mouth is — that those who plow their windfall profit back into oil exploration would get a tax break, while those who simply pocket their profits or put them into other kinds of business would have to pay more. But that's not the way it's done.

Current federal tax law requires the little-uns to pay the same as the big-uns, no matter

what they do with the excess dollars taken from us at the pumps. Big Oil takes the lion's share of excess profits in the oil industry, but they are not putting much of that extra cash into new energy development — for example, Mobil bought Montgomery Ward, Arco bought the London Observer newspaper, Exxon bought Reliance Electric motor company, Getty bought the ESPN television sports network, Occidental bought Iowa Beef Processors, Sun Oil bought Mr. Zip convenience grocery chain, and Diamond Shamrock even laid out \$600,000 to buy a 16'x16' glass-enclosed luxury box at the Dallas Cowboys football stadium. A national study just released shows that the big oil companies have spent only 28% of the increased profits they got from price decontrol to expand their oil exploration and production.

The independents, however, put nearly all of their profits back into their chief business — producing more oil. For that reason, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen has proposed legislation giving these small entrepreneurs a partial exemption from the windfall profits tax. It would apply only to the independents, and then only to the first 1,000 barrels of their daily production.

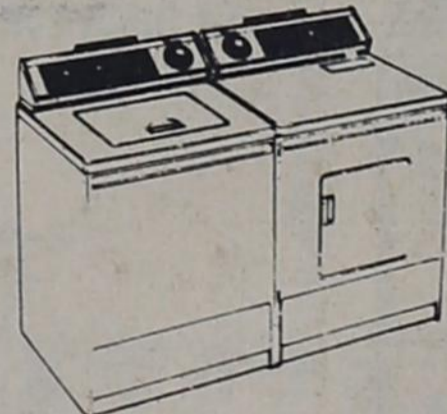
President Ronald Reagan says that he opposes Sen. Bentsen's proposed exemption, claiming that it would cost the federal treasury too much in tax revenues. Lobbyists for Big Oil also are opposed to the Bentsen bill, arguing that it discriminates unfairly against them.

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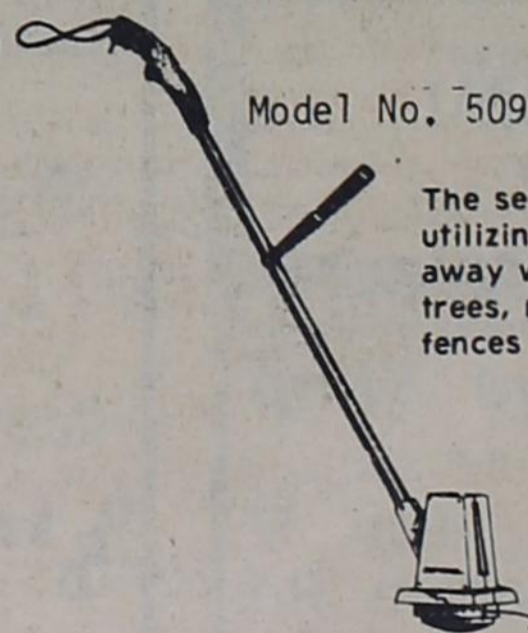

Eastland Gas Contract Signed

EASTLAND — Agreement was signed here Monday by a number gas well owners and producers who have more than 4.5 million cubic feet per day production for construction of a gas pipeline system into the Carbon-Gorman area of Eastland County by Northern Liquid Fuels Company of Omaha, Neb.

Additional producers are expected to sign at a later date, it was announced.

The line of approximately 40 miles will be between the Eastland County field and Northern Liquid's existing Lipan Plant in Hood County, it was announced by Command Energy Corp., of Fort Worth.

The Fort Worth firm has acted as spokesman for the Eastland County producers in negotiations with Northern Liquid Fuels. Command Energy is headed by Fred C. Mergner, a veteran of more than 20 years in all phases of the oil and gas industry in Texas.

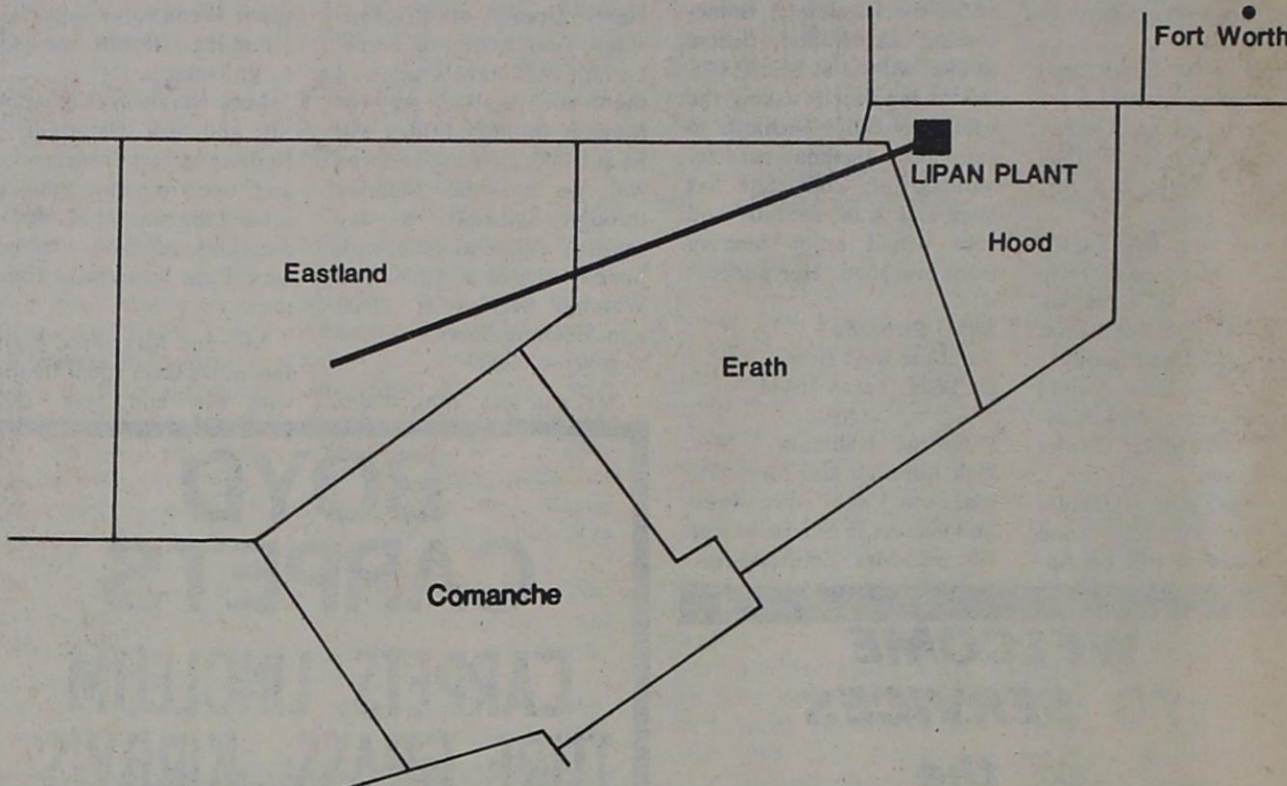
Handling negotiations for the Omaha firm is Larry Eledge out of the company's Houston office.

"We will have 16 wells ourselves in this contract," a Command Energy spokesman said. There are many other existing shut-in gas wells in the area which are due to be included in the contract for the movement of gas when the

pipeline is completed. Northern Liquid Fuels is a subsidiary of Internorth. In addition to the 10-inch and 16-inch segments of the main line, the contract calls for Northern Liquid Fuels to also construct the laterals into each of the well sites, it was reported.

Command Energy, which was instrumental in bringing about negotiations for a pipeline to gather gas from the area, is a Texas corporation chartered in August 1979. It is engaged in drilling and producing oil and gas in the Fort Worth Basin. It has producers in Eastland, Erath, Callahan and Comanche County.

Present drilling program of the company calls for putting down 54 more wells during the rest of 1981 and the first quarter of 1982, the spokesman said.

Bumper Peach Crop Fills Texas' Markets

AUSTIN—A peach bumper crop, estimated at 140 percent above 1980's production, is causing a glut of peaches on the Texas market. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

Brown is appealing to Texas consumers and retailers to help ease the surplus, which is being further aggravated by out-of-state producers dumping their product on the market at bare cost of production.

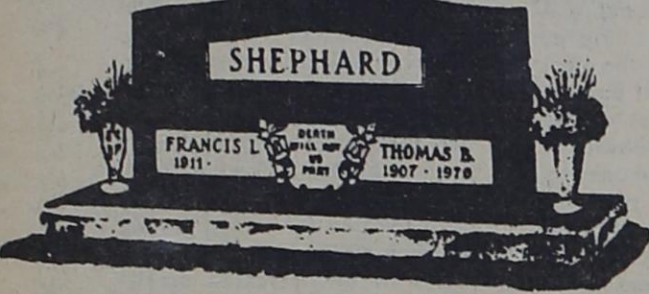
"Apparently, every peach tree in the nation has a bumper crop on it, and they're all coming off the trees at the same time," said Brown. "I urge Texas consumers to eat them, can them, preserve them, freeze them, but just buy them," he said, adding that Texas peaches are "miles fresher" than those shipped in from out of state, and offer the consumer better flavor, texture and overall quality.

"Several Texas peach growers have contacted our marketing division asking us to help move this huge Texas crop, and we are doing everything possible to assist them," said Brown.

Brown said that tremendous quantities of peaches from California, Georgia and South Carolina are being offered for sale in the state at lower prices than Texas producers can afford to sell their peaches. "The out-of-state producers are absorbing all transportation and processing costs just to get rid of their peaches," Brown said.

Texas peach production for the 1981 season is projected at 625,000 bushels, 140 percent above the 1980 crop, and 30 percent above 1979. Nationwide, production should hit 13,678,000 bushels, up from 12,271,000 bushels last year.

Some 33 varieties of peaches are grown in Texas.

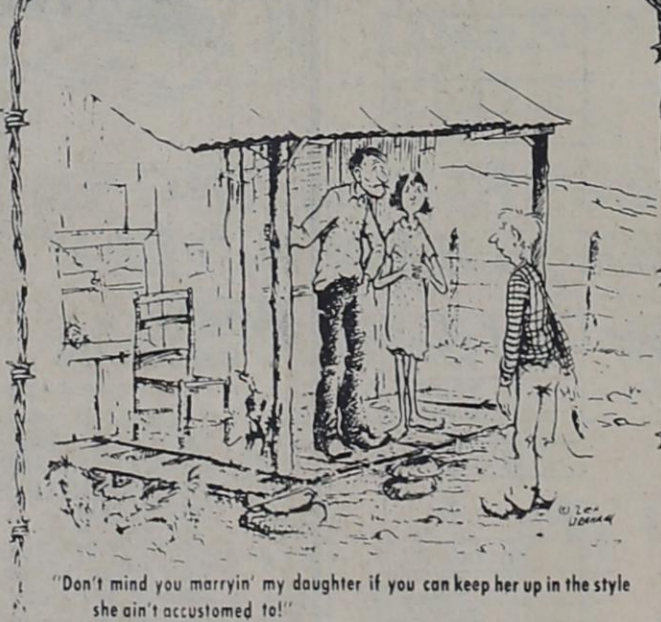

You may not feel quite comfortable at first when you set your thermostat at 80° or higher, but most people adjust very quickly to living warmer. At the same time, if you dress cooler and use a fan, you may not even notice the difference. But it will help hold down your electric bill.
