He is a member of the Texas Baptist Christian Education coordinating board. He is a member of the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce and has been a member of the Lions Club since 1950.

Rev. Jim Andrews graduated from Midwestern University in Wichita Falls in 1974. He has a Bachelor of Music Education Degree. He was a band director for 6 years before accepting the call into the ministry three years ago. He attended Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth for 1 1/2 years. He served as Minister of Youth and Education at First Baptist Church in Eastland, during that time. He came to Kokomo Baptist Church as pastor about 2 months ago. Gas Strikes Gauged In Eastland County

Two gas discovery wells have been completed in Eastland County. Ball Producing Co. No. 2-B Osborne, producing from the Caddo, is located five miles north of Gorman.

Wellsite is 467 feet from the north and 2,650 feet from the east lines of Section 12, Block 1, H&TC Survey, A-801. Absolute, open flow was 2,541,500 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 2,841-52 feet.

The pay was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 5,000 gallons of water and 20,000 pounds of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 2,980 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,425 feet.

Other well is Nationwide Oil & Gas Corp. No. 1 William H. Wagley, located six miles south of Eastland.

Location is 1,673 feet from the north and 487 feet from the west lines of Section 40, Block 2, H&TC Survey, A-902.

Drillsite is 2,173 feet from the south and 467 feet from the east lines of Section 14, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

The well was completed on May 18, 1978, by the same firm from perforations at 3,968-94 feet. Old total depth is 3,740 feet.

Spring Means Outdoor Fun, But Watch For Fire Ants

AUSTIN--The latest beautiful spring weather is bringing more children outdoors to play, but Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown warns parents to be cautious as the imported fire ants have spread into many new areas of the state and their venom can be fatal to some persons.

Brown cautioned everyone to "be careful and watch young children closely during the warm months."

Researchers at Texas A&M University found that 41 persons in a random sample in Bryan-College Station could

die quickly if bitten. One percent of the sample were found to be highly allergic to the imported fire ant venom.

Brown advised that homeowners who have imported fire ants on their property to use approved control chemicals. "MC-96, Amdro, and Dursban are relatively safe chemicals if they are used as prescribed on the label. These chemicals have been approved for use by the Environmental Protection Agency.

"For several years, the imported fire ant was considered only a farm problem, but now people are

finding mounds in city parks, school yards, and in their own lawns. The infestation has spread from the Gulf Coast into Central Texas and the Edwards Plateau. We are having reports from newly infested areas every day.

"I hope that people won't treat the imported fire ant lightly. We know more about this pest now than ever before. He's a tough customer to control and his bite is painful and dangerous," Brown said.


