## Texas Wool, Mohair Crop Down, But State Still #1

AUSTIN—Although production of Texas wool and mohair was down in 1980, Texas still ranks as the nation's largest producer of these fibers, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

The annual production figures were compiled by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, a cooperative venture of the Texas and U.S. Departments of Agriculture.

Brown noted that the 1980 Texas wool clip totaled 18.3 million pounds, 4 percent less than 1979. The number of sheep and lambs clipped was 2.7 million head, down slightly from the year before.

While the average price per pound was unchanged from 1979 at 97 cents, the reduced output lowered the total value of production to \$17,751,000.


Mohair production in Texas — which produces perhaps 96 percent of all the mohair in the U.S. — declined to 8.8 million pounds, 5 percent below 1979 production. The average price per pound declined sharply to \$3.50 for the year. This lowered the value of the year's production to \$30,800,000, compared to \$47,430,000 in 1979.

Nationwide, production of wool for 1980 totaled 107 million pounds, up 1 percent from 1979 (including both shorn and pulled wool).

A total of 13.2 million head of sheep and lambs were shorn in 1980, up 1 percent from the previous year. The total value of shorn wool was \$92.9 million, up 3 percent from \$90.5 million in 1979.

the Main reason Blackwell was so famous for years was that Dr. George, Dr. Ed and Dr. Rodgers would charge less than other Doctors and Hospitals charged. They knew the people would come back again, if necessary. They knew that the satisfied patients would tell their neighbors. Then the neighbors would come to Gorman. The whole story in a nutshell. Good service and at a reasonable price.

More "Harper Valley". One night during the Summer Revival some parents would take their small children (about 1914) and put them on a palate in the back of the wagons. So those boys changed the kids around. So the next morning some parents found there girl had changed to a boy and visa versa. Some of them had different colored hair also. I was accused of that. Tho not guilty. One night they changed the right front wheel to left back, and back wheel to front. I had to plead not guilty. Tho some did not believe me.

I had been going with a girl for three years and most all in our group had married. We would go home with those couples on Sunday from Church and spent the evening with them. All

thought we would get hitched. I would spend every other Sunday with here. One Sunday, not my regular Sunday with her, I asked her about a date that night She said she had a date and did not think I wanted one. I saw another girl and made a date with with. It so happened that we sat behind them in Church. Just behind us was a couple with a two year old boy. He thought I was an angel. I was always giving him gum. He hit me on the shoulder and said he wanted to sit in my lap. I took him and he turned to the girl I was with and said she was

not my girl. It told him I had lots of girls. My friend in front of me turned pink. He then said "Have you got any boys". I said "No not yet". She turned blood red. At that moment my Dad got up to lead singing. A good thing. As that boy may have gotten in politics.

On Tuesday I received a red hot letter, telling me I could not come to see her because of the way I talked that night. I would have to wait one week longer then come to see her.

I had a few things she had given me. So I just mailed them to her and told her she

could have all the days she wanted, just send my ring back. Good by.

I told my Dad I was going to school and take exam for Teacher in May 1916. He said he figured I would marry as I had a good cotton and peanut crop. I told him that I had burned all bridges behind me. He said she was a nice Christian girl. I said Ok.

On First Friday and Saturday in May I took exam on eleven subjects. On Monday morning a neighbor boy came by and asked if I thought I passed. I told him a certain figure 6/11 %. I told him that figure came to me

that Sunday night as I slept. I would swear that is actually true. About all I knew was the alphabet began with a and ended in z. Tho I found out there is so much between them. Thanks to those little

  - Unless it's really hot, turn it off. Try opening windows and using a fan to circulate the air.
- Turn off anything that's not in use.
- Live a little warmer. The higher you set your thermostat, the more electricity you'll save.
- Use fans to keep air moving. It feels cooler.
- When the air conditioner is on, keep your cool inside. Close windows, doors, blinds, draperies and fireplace dampers.
- If you're installing or replacing an air conditioner, be sure it's energy-efficient. Use the "Energyguide" on every new unit to compare. It may cost more, but it will help you hold down your electric bills.
