Following is the menu for the Gorman School Lunchroom for the week of March 15-19:

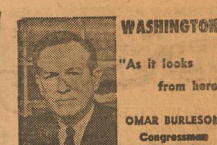
Monday — Fish sticks, black-eyed peas, cheese pineapple salad and raisin crunch.

"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IN JULY 1968, PRESIDENT NIXON, running for office, asserted that what we need is an "intelligently balanced economy." At that time he said, "We have not yet taken the first step toward such balance -- toward regaining control of Federal deficit spending and the ever-increasing high Federal debt."

WHILE CAMPAIGNING THIS WAS a major theme of the President's campaign. He castigated the Johnson administration for failing to cut deficit spending, which he said was one of the chief causes of inflation. "Budget deficits," he said "lie at the heart of our troubles." On a number of occasions he said that, if elected, "any massive step-up in Federal spending programs would be opposed." "To continue large Federal spending," he said "creates deficits, a prescription for further inflation." He went on to say "I believe it is also a prescription for economic disaster."

IN THESE WORDS THE PRESIDENT was the strongest advocate of spending restraints and for the free enterprise system.

IN OCTOBER OF 1968, THE PRESIDENT was campaigning on the theme that wage and price controls should not be applied as a means of controlling inflation. The record indicates he said at that time, "in order to control wages and prices, it would be necessary to embark on a road from which it is very hard to escape without major damage to the freedom of all."

AT ALONG ABOUT THE SAME TIME, Mr. Nixon was adhering to the conservative doctrine when he took a "dim view" of any welfare plan that might in any way involve a guaranteed annual income. He said that any such idea would create a double wrong. He said the first wrong was that it would not end poverty and, secondly, while it might be a substitute for welfare, it would have a detrimental effect on the productive capacity of the American people.

NOW IN 1970 AND 1971, THE ADMINISTRATION'S PROPOSAL for a Family Assistance Plan has the principle element of a guaranteed annual income, discussed in this column on February 12, 1970. No matter how it may be coated over with rhetoric, it is still a guaranteed annual income and, if passed by the Congress, will be increased as time goes on. A political climate would be created for this to happen.

PERHAPS IN SOME DESPERATION, the Administration is edging toward wage and price controls, the merits of which are beside the point. The point is he said two years ago that to do so could cause "major damage to the freedom of all."

FEDERAL SPENDING CONTINUES to go up. Inflation is not checked and we are offered a budget of deficits and false hopes for revenue.

THE BUDGET IS A RECORD BREAKER. It calls for a spending level of more than \$229 Billion, the largest in our Nation's history. It forecasts a deficit of \$11.6 Billion, the biggest planned discrepancy between revenue and outlays in time of peace. Chances are it may be twice as much or more than this estimate.

A NEW MARK IN HISTORY IS MADE when welfare costs exceed that of National defense. As recommended, welfare is to be 41.2 percent of the total budget, while National defense runs 33.8 percent.

EXPENDITURES ARE ON THE OPTIMISTIC SIDE. A year ago the budget was supposed to result in a \$1.4 Billion surplus. This is turning out to be more near a \$18.6 Billion deficit. The deficit, at its least, is based on "full employment revenues" heretofore discussed, which is defined as the revenues we would have if the economy operates at full employment. In other words, it is like the old gag, "If we had some ham, we could have some ham and eggs — if we had some eggs."

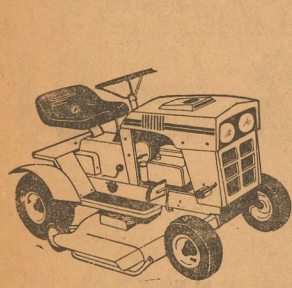
