

DR. EARL COLLISTER TO BE GUEST SPEAKER AT ANNUAL BANQUET



Plans for the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet, at which the outstanding farmer of the year award will be presented, being finalized this week by all civic and club organizations as well as all members of the Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Earl Collister will be guest speaker for the event. Dr. Collister serves as President of the International Grain, Inc. and head of all research, marketing and development work. As an agricultural researcher in Texas for the past nineteen years, Dr. Collister has directed and conducted research over a wide area of soil, water and plant science. After receiving his Bachelor of Science, Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees in plant genetics from Purdue University, Dr. Collister joined the staff of the Texas Research Foundation on April 5, 1950. While at the Foundation, he served as Chairman of the Plant Science Department and research scientist working on the development of new oil and protein crops for Texas. After completing nearly ten years of service at the Texas Research Foundation, he moved to West Texas and soon became director of the High Plains Research Foundation, which was organized by the Texas Research Foundation. Upon completing eighteen years of service with the two Foundations, he served as Executive Vice President and Chief Executive Officer of a new company named World Seeds, Inc. Dr. Collister gave the name to this company and served as the leading officer for the corporation in initiating and conducting a world-wide research and marketing program. Dr. Collister and business associates organized International Grain, Inc. upon his resignation from the Board of Directors and staff of World Seeds, Inc.

However, December 22 is listed as the official graduation date for the 659 bachelor's, 143 master's and 2 doctor's degree recipients. All students who are listed as winter graduates will be invited to join the spring graduating class in formal commencement exercises May 18 at the university.

Another change in NTSU's graduation procedures was the replacement this winter of the customary "honors" and "high honors" designations with "summa cum laude, magna cum laude and cum laude."

Official ground breaking for the new hospital was held Monday. The 39 bed hospital and clinic will be built on Roosevelt Street across from the Lawndale Home.

Construction will begin immediately by Kinser and Blair, Inc. of Gorman and expected to be completed in six months.

The ground breaking ceremony took place at 2:30 p. m. with a large number of Gorman and area residents attending.

Robert Bostick, minister of the Church of Christ, opened the ceremony with prayer and Ross Wilson gave a statement of purpose and praise to the Rodgers family and to the people of the area and to James Holquist, administrator of Blackwell Hospital and to Congressman Omar Burlison for all his help and assistance. Also recognized was Dr. A. E. Pino. Other members of the Hospital Board recognized were Mrs. Berenice Jeffs, E. G. Henderson, James Miears and Donnie Mauney.





PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. "(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."



Know Your School

By Charlie L. Garrett, Supt.

The financial structure of a school system is a complicated structure. Most schools in Texas operate under the Minimum Foundation Program. This is a program that was begun in 1948, known then as the Gilmer-Akin Law. It provided for a minimum salary for professional personnel in schools and devised a formula by which the state would provide money to the school districts to implement the Minimum Foundation Program. The formula in general provided that the State will pay 80 percent of the cost while the local school district pays 20 percent of the cost.

The actual percentage that each school pays is determined by an Economic Index for the county in which the school is located. The three general factors used in determining the county index are: County Assessed Valuation, Scholastic Population, and Total Income. These three items are weighed with Total Income carrying a 72 percent factor. The Total Income from a county includes the following items: value added by manufacturing, value of minerals produced, and payrolls from retail, wholesale, and service establishments. After the County Index is determined, the district's part of the county's total is determined by the percent that lies in the district. Currently, Gorman is paying about 15 percent of the cost of operating the Minimum Foundation Program.

Gorman's Local Fund Assignment is 262 percent of what it was in 1961-62. In 1961-62 the LFA was \$9,508 as compared to \$24,952 for the current year. The amount for the current year is up \$6,603 or 36 percent as compared to the previous year. There will be another increase for next year and for all years to follow. It appears now that the increase for next year will be about \$2,500 to \$3,000. This amount of increase for the next year is figured on the current formula, which may be changed by the Legislature. If a change is made in the formula, it is very likely that the amount will be much more than the above figure. In addition to costs covered by the Minimum Fund Program, the local district must pay any additional costs and salaries not covered by the program.

This year we hope to collect about \$64,000 in local taxes of which \$11,000 must go into Interest and Sinking Fund to pay bonds and interest. This leaves about \$53,000 with which to meet LFA, pay insurance, maintain buildings and grounds, pay utilities, buy supplies, teaching materials, library and audio-visual
