George J. Warren, a Gorman native, was named Outstanding Farmer of the Year at the Gorman Chamber of Commerce Banquet Friday night. He is a previous winner of the Peanut Pacesetter Award. Warren, 34, started his farming career while still in high school here and presently farms 240 acres of peanuts. He is married to the former Frances Robertson and they have five children. Warren attended Tarleton State College one year and is a former member of the School Tax Equalization Board and the Farmers Union.

Dr. J. B. Morton, head of the Agriculture Department at Tarleton State College, was guest speaker and his address and demonstration of how a farmer can lose his shirt was one of the most entertaining speakers we have heard in a long time.

"The net income is likely to be smaller because of the production costs."

Concerning livestock Dr. Morton said that "livestock product prices have strengthened recently but will likely continue at levels below relatively favorable first half of 1970."

He also predicted that livestock producers will curb their output in response to the unfavorable return of livestock price increases later this year.

Dr. Morton also said that whether or not farm income improves depends on three things:

1. The ability of the general economy to surmount its problems.
2. The continuation of favorable marketing trends in agriculture.
3. The ability to adjust outputs and use resources correctly under new government programs.

Dr. Morton said that peanut production increased 14 percent in 1970 over 1969 and peanut consumption is staying with the population increase.

He predicted that in 1972 peanut prices will increase and allotments will decrease.

Besides honoring the outstanding farmer, the Chamber of Commerce this year also honored the high schools top academic students. Given certificates for having the highest grade average were Vicki Simmons, freshman; George Ann Bettis, sophomore; Marilyn Thompson, junior; and Rodney Duke, senior.

Receiving monetary prizes for best table decorations were Lions Club, first place with chemical exhibit; Woman's Study Club, second, with a feed production theme; and Young Homemakers Club, third, with poultry and fruit theme.

A most entertaining program was provided by the Eastland Baptist Church Choir. Their 30 minute program of gospel songs was much too short for the enthusiastic audience. Harold Shelton of Cisco, harmonica player, was coaxed into rendering a special number later in the program. 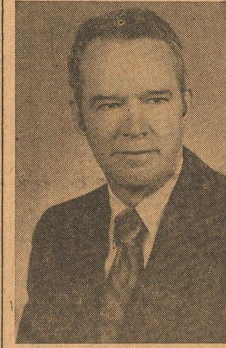

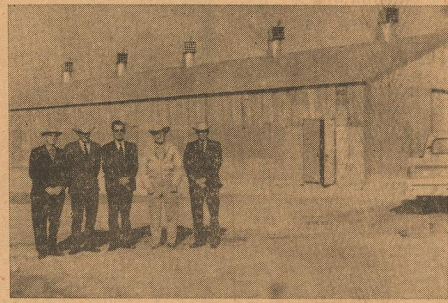
We thank each and every one of you - and, it will be a long time before we will tend to forget the importance of our friends, especially those in our hometown. God will bless each.

EASTLAND SHOW BARN SLATED FOR DEDICATION DURING SHOW



Livestock at the Eastland County Livestock Show will have new facilities this year through the efforts of these men, left to right; Sam Kimmell, building committee chairman; Henry Fry; Tip Arthur; Jack Cozart; and Douglas Fry, committeemen. The building donated by Lone Star Gas Company, was moved from Pueblo Plant north of Cisco to the county show grounds.

The dedication of a new livestock exhibit barn will be one of the events of the annual Eastland County Livestock Show on March 18-20. The new barn is the result of Sam Kimmell's idea plus over \$6,000 in donations and hundreds of man hours of labor.

The formal dedication will be made at 1:00 p. m. Friday, March 19. Murray Cox, well known farm reporter for station WFAA in Dallas, will dedicate the building. Harry Holt, farm reporter for station KRBC in Abilene, will introduce Cox. Grover Hallmark of Eastland will be master of ceremonies. The public is invited for the dedication.

It all started in 1967 when Kimmell, a rancher at Cisco, was president of the County Livestock Raisers Association. He approached Archie Robertson of the Lone Star Gas Company in Ranger and told him of the need for another building for the youth livestock show. Some months later Lone Star Gas Company representatives informed Kimmell that a building might be available at the Pueblo Plant where L. M. Cauley was manager. A request was made and in September 1969 Bill Brayman, Lone Star Gas Regional Manager, presented an all-steel building to a committee representing three county organizations. The three organizations were the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, the

Eastland County Sheriff's Posse, and the County Farm Bureau.

At this point a major problem was confronted by the committee. How could the 112 by 32 feet structure be moved from its location at the company's Pueblo Plant, north of Cisco to the livestock show grounds? At first it was thought that volunteer workers might move the building. After some thought this idea was abandoned and it was decided that professionals would have to be hired to move the building. Many said it couldn't be done. However, Kimmell and the committee headed by Tip Arthur was determined that the building would be moved. A contract was made with the Plains Steel Building Company of Abilene to move the building.

People and businesses from all parts of the county contributed over \$6,000 to pay the cost of relocating and equipping the building. The County Commissioners' Court gave their full support to the effort. People from each community donated time and labor to get the barn ready for the 1971 stock show. Kimmell said it was truly a county-wide effort. All expenses of relocating the building have been paid. The committee has turned the building over to the Livestock Raisers Association to be used in connection with the livestock show and other youth-oriented activities.

THE SIZE OF FLOWERS

The tiny duckweed's blossom can be seen only under a microscope because it is only 1/63 of an inch in diameter, while the victorian water lily, a native of the Amazon River, has a lovely blossom that measures eleven or twelve inches across.

The leaves of this water lily grow to be six feet across, and some can hold a weight up to 200 pounds. One victoria pad could hold 7,000,000 duckweeds.

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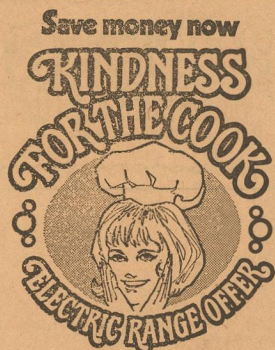

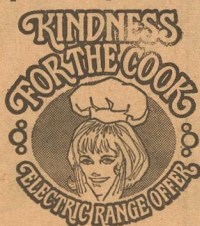
