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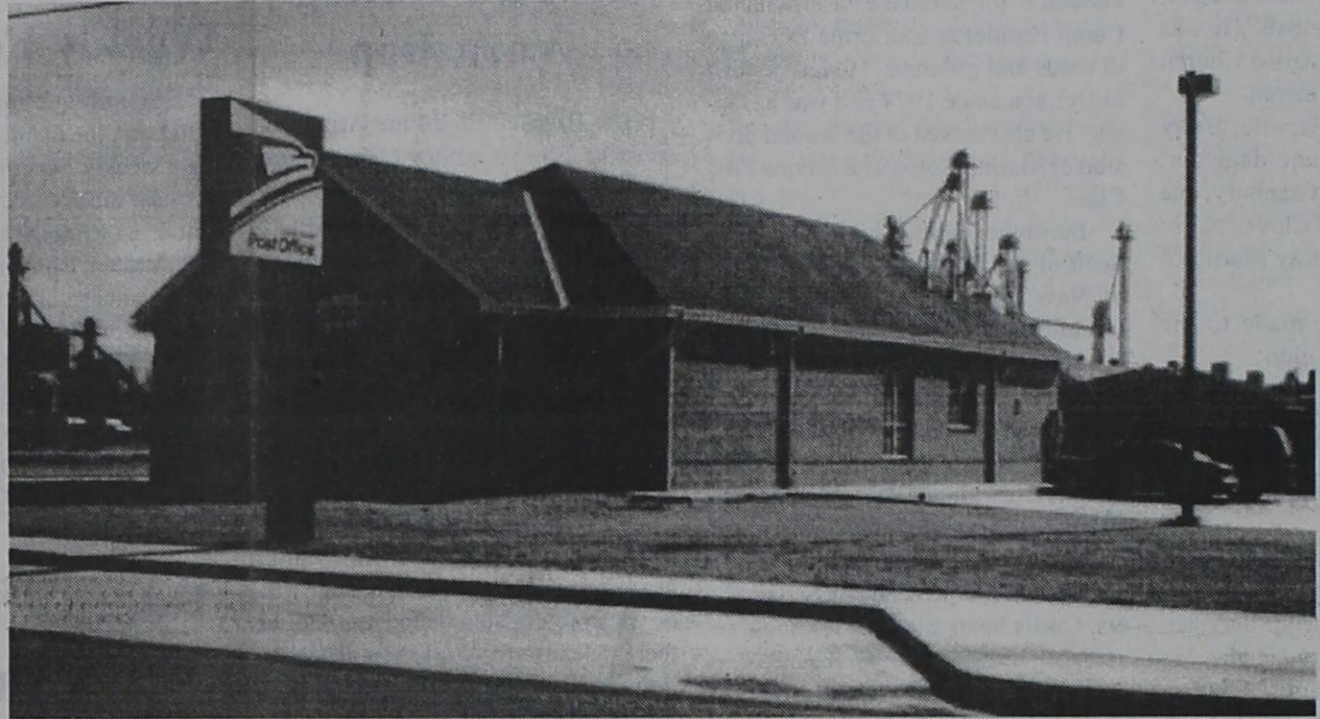

Gorman Post Office Moved Into New Facility Wednesday



The Gorman Post Office moved into their new facility, at 112 N. Kent Street, on Wednesday afternoon, January 26, 2000. The Post Office began the days business in the old location, closed for approximately 1 hour at lunch, and reopened in the new facility to finish the days business. Customers who receive their mail through delivery in a Post Office Box, will need to exchange their present keys for new keys at the new office. Keys will be exchanged one for one, up to three keys. If you do not now have any keys for your Post Office Box, you will need to purchase new keys for use at the new office. You will need to have a key to remove your mail from your Post Office boxes. Hours of service will not change at the new office, 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday thru Friday. The new facility features a drive up collection box, located in the one-way alley entrance to the Post Office. This collection box is located there to allow customers to deposit mail from their vehicles, from the drivers side. The new office also has more Post Office Boxes available for rent by our customers. The box service lobby has a new feature, Parcel Lockers, for added customer convenience. When we have a parcel for you, that is too large for your Post Office box, we will place a Parcel Locker key in your P.O. Box. Use the key to remove your parcel from the locker at your convenience. No more waiting in line, or waiting until the window is open. All employees of the Gorman Post Office look forward to serving everyone at the new facility.

Gorman Boys Powerlifting Team Competes in Hico

The power lifting teams of Gorman continues their successful first year of competition this past weekend as the boys competed in Hico. Last week the girls kicked off the season with fine performances in Breckenridge. Four of the six boys that competed brought home trophies while the other two just missed. The results are as follows:

Brian Hunt finished 3rd out of 4 in 275 lb class with a 970 total. Brian squated 360, benched 225, and dead lifted 385. Should go well over 1,000 lbs. at next meet.

Randall de la Torre finished 4th out of 16 in Class of 242 lb. lifters. He totaled 1,130 lbs.; 450 squat, 220 bench and 460 deadlift. Should rank high in regional standings.

Josh Johnson and Jose Raygoza both tied for 5th out of 15 lifters in the 198 lb. class. Both had identical lifts of 385 squat, 204 bench, and 385 deadlift for a 975 total. Both are expected to go well over 1,000 lbs. at next meet.

Cory Strieff finished 6th out of 34 in the 148 lb. class. Cory was just 15 pounds away from bring home a trophy. He had a 825 total, 325 squat, 185 bench, and 335 dead-

Burn Ban Back Into Effect

At 10:00 a.m., January 24th, Eastland County Commissioners' Court declares that a state of emergency exists in Eastland County due to the extreme potential for large and destructive wildfires.

Eastland County Commissioners' Court issued an emergency order effective immediately, which prohibits any open burning in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County except the burning of combustible material in approved enclosures, which as trash barrels and charcoal grills which are designed to contain all flames and embers. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) harvesting of agriculture crops.

Due to dry conditions, and lack of significant rainfall, all persons are advised that any open burning is extremely likely to cause very dangerous wildfire, posing risks to lives and property.

Local fire department officials, the National Weather Service and Texas Forest Service personnel advise that there is no present forecast for improving conditions.

The order signed by members of Eastland County Commissioners' Court provides that repeated or flagrant violations of the order shall constitute a misdemeanor, and that any peace officer of the State of Texas may enforce the order in the venue of the Eastland County Court.

Gorman Cagers Drop Games To Baird and Cross Plains

The Gorman cage teams were defeated by the Baird teams on Tuesday, the 18th with both girls and boys falling behind in the first and second periods and couldn't make up the difference in the game.

The Baird girls jumped out to a 12-5 lead in the first quarter and added 13 in the second to have a 25 to 11 lead at halftime. Baird added 17 in each of the third and fourth periods for a 59 to 22 victory.

Rodriguez led the Lady Panthers with 12 points. Goode had 4, Sanchez 3, and Warren 3. This made the Gorman record 7-12 and 1-2.
