MEMORIES
 Hi! to all on this Saturday Juneteenth Day. The 117th anniversary of the day the Slaves were freed in Texas. I want to tell you a true story that happened. Onnie (my wife) had been in hospital at Eastland about 10 weeks at that time a Black L.V.N. had been very kind and attentive to her. She told Onnie she had a 7 year old daughter. Onnie told her she had a large beautiful doll made from a black stocking. Dressed with the finest clothes she had ever bought and there was a change of three clothes. All made for a perfect fit. She would like to give them to her. Tho she did not want any one working at hospital to see it. I gathered them up and carried them to the hospital the next day. The lady went into bathroom to see the doll etc. She came out smiling and told Onnie her daughter would be so proud of the doll and the beautiful clothes. Onnie was a perfect seamstress and enjoyed her work. What a coincidense, when Lola had that kidney operation in West Texas Med. Center and was in Intensive Care Unit, a black R.N. was in charge on day shift. You could visit ten minutes, very

little talking. I went in room. Lola was asleep. The lady brought me a chair and told me to wait until she awoke after a few minutes she awoke and I talked a little and left out. Thanking the lady. When they decided to let her go to a private room, I went up to that R.N. and told her I wanted to shake her hand. She told me to lean over and she hugged me and kissed me on the cheek, with

tears in her eyes she said "I know you meant that from the bottom of your Soul". I told her "I believed in giving praise where praise is due. I wish the best for her always". She was grey headed and I am sure a lot of people passed her up; because she was black. Tho in times like that there is no color line with me. I notice where the Steel Mills have asked their Employees to not ask for a raise this year. They say "No"? We must get a raise again. They draw a mere \$22 per hour. Just \$176.00 per day. They claim they cannot get

by on such measly wages. Do you wonder why. Foreign Mills can ship steel here cheaper? That is just like the car industry. They have forced prices of U.S. cars so high that people buy cars from over seas. They cut their own throat. Some are raving because the Federal Budget is cutting down on Medicare and Medicine. The reason is that the program is being abused so much when it is unnecessary here and other places. This weather reminds me of the "Dust Bowl" days of the Depression. I lived on black land and it did not blow. I

remember especially one day about 2 p.m. our chickens or most of them went to roost. That was sure dark for at least two hours. That red dust turned the top of ground red. We are still lucky here that those destructure hails and heavy floods have missed us so far. That is something to be thankful for. Tho some have lost some peanuts and others are just waiting to plant and time is passing by very fast. Tho you are being subsidized more this year. The Dairy Industry is costing many, many millions in subsidy. Also Tabacco is being subsidized. Increase tax on Tabacco products. Also alcohols need to be doubled. That would cut the Federal Deficit. Our sympathy goes out to the Kennedy family in your bereavement. This is Monday First day of Summer Oh! those happy teen age times. Yesterday was Father's Day. Dad told you one time. That was enough. When my children was growing up. The same with them. It worked.

20 ways to help hold down your electric bill.

A checklist to help you save energy and money at home.

- Energy Conservation Practices**
- Electricity is costing more this summer mainly because the fuel to make it is costing more. The following low- or no-cost home conservation practices can help you save energy and money.
 - Do not use air conditioner unless absolutely necessary.
 - Keep your thermostat set no lower than 80° in the summer. Use ceiling or oscillating fans to circulate the air.
 - Check your air conditioner filters each month to see if they need cleaning or changing. And make sure that the outside unit is free of grass, leaves and trash.
 - When leaving home, turn off air conditioning. If away for two days or more, turn off water heater.
 - If you have a dishwasher, set water heater to 140°; otherwise, set temperature to 120° or lower.
 - Use scrap insulation to plug air leaks in attic, around fireplace dampers and window air conditioners.
 - Repair water leaks in pipes and faucets, and seal air duct leaks.
 - Use drapes, blinds, shades, awnings or plants to block sunlight.
 - Try to minimize traffic through outside doors.
 - Economize in the kitchen. Plan meals so several dishes can be cooked in the oven at the same time.
 - Save when you do laundry. Wash and dry only full loads of clothes.

- Energy Conservation Measures**
- These home installations and modifications require an investment, but may return their cost to you in the form of savings on utility bills.
- Caulk and weatherstrip around doors and windows to reduce air leaks.
 - Add insulation to ceilings, walls and floors.
 - Insulate ducts, especially in the attic.
 - Insulate hot water pipes in attic.
 - Install insulation blankets on water heaters, especially in garage or basement.
 - Investigate cost-effectiveness of storm doors and windows.
 - Add solar-reflecting materials to doors and windows on east/west exposures.
 - Install a clock thermostat to automatically set air conditioner and heating unit to desired temperature. Even when you're away from home, the clock thermostat can control your air conditioner for more economical operation.
 - Investigate replacing your central air conditioner, especially if unit is more than five years old, with a new unit that has a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Rating (SEER) of at least 8.5.
