Not only that, you'll save on your electric bill as well. For example, a high-efficiency 3-ton unit will save you up to \$160 a year.

This equipment costs more initially, but the bonus from Texas Electric plus the savings on your electric bill will make up the difference in just a few years.

If enough people buy high-

efficiency equipment, summer peak load growth will be slowed — and so will the need to build new generating plants. In the long run, this will help hold down everyone's electric bill.

Before you replace your old air conditioner, ask your dealer about central air conditioners, heat pumps, and window units that qualify for this program.
