Cartoonist Gordon Bankston of Odessa, Texas has joined the West Texas Rehabilitation Center's Joint Venture for Crippled Children ranks by creating a cartoon for the fund raising event based on his popular syndicated cartoon series called the "Oil Patch".

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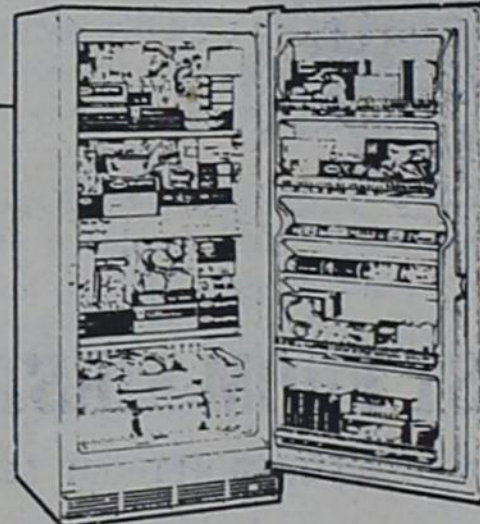
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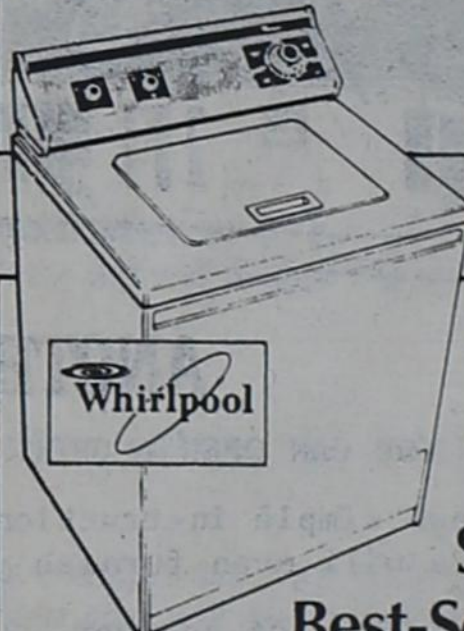

REFUNDS

A total refund will be made if the course is cancelled. Ninety percent refund will be made prior to the first class meeting. Ten percent refund will be made prior to the second class meeting. All refunds will be made within twelve days. There will be no refunds after the second class meeting. All refund requests are to be made either in person or in writing in Room 107, Davis Hall, Tarleton State University Office of Continuing Education.

DISCOUNT

All senior citizens over the age of 65 or older will receive a ten percent discount on all courses. Tarleton students that are currently enrolled as full-time students are eligible to receive a ten percent discount as well.

TOLE PAINTING

The art of painting on wood, tin, or glass, using patterns and step by step instructions. Some additional supplies will be needed during the course.

INTERPERSONAL COMMUNICATION

A comprehensive introduction to communication. Learn to understand yourself, others, use non-verbal communication, behavior patterns, and coping with conflict.

CONSUMER BUYING OF MEAT PRODUCTS

In this course, learn utilization and preservation of meats. Pick up tips on consumption relationships to the cardiovascular system. Buying and selecting of retail cuts, tenderness, and price relationship. Gain knowledge of the true difference between prime and good. Learn ways to prepare game meats and make homemade sausages.

INTERIOR DESIGN I

This course takes a student through the history of housing styles and furniture to designated techniques. Study elements and principles of design, including color, structure, furnishing, kitchen, bath and other techniques which give your home a truly unique look.

INTERIOR DESIGN II

Requires Interior Design I. A more in-depth study, but brings in wall arrangements, utilizing a three-room apartment.

CANINE OBEDIENCE

Learn commands to give to your dog (heel, sit, etc.). All will be done with dog on leash. No dogs under 6 months. No dogs under ten pounds. All dogs must have all immunizations current and be free from fleas and ticks. All dog owners should be 10 years or older. Owners are responsible for dog's behavior at all times.

NURSING LEADERSHIP

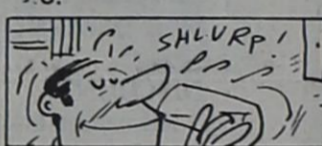
