

ACCIDENTS IN GORMAN AREA

The Gorman Police Department reports that as of August 10, 1982, there have been fourteen automobile accidents within the City Limits this year, resulting in three injuries. This compares with nineteen accidents with four injuries during the same period in 1981.

Excessive speed continues to be the primary cause of accidents, followed closely by failure to observe traffic control devices, such as stop signs. In an effort to reduce accidents, the police department will increase the amount of time spent on traffic control, running radar and issuing citations to speed limit violators, and will strictly enforce stop sign laws. Please remember...those signs say "STOP", not "Slow down to see if another car is coming".

Speed control efforts will be concentrated temporarily on FM 8 (Desdemona Highway) in the residential area between Highway 6 and Thompson's Grocery at the Kokomo Highway. Although the posted speed limit in this area is 45 miles per hour, the police department is requesting that speeds be kept much lower, due to the number of children playing near the roadway and the limited visibility caused by the hill at Rogan Street. This area was the scene of an auto-pedestrian accident last month, and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has been requested to conduct a survey to consider lowering the speed limit to 35 miles per hour. Your cooperation in reducing speed in this area will help to convince the Highway Department that the limit should be reduced for safety of our children. Speed enforcement will also be intensified in the school zones, since school starts next week. Please remember to watch out for our little citizens, because they sometimes forget to watch out for us.

The Gorman Public School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students in K thru 4 th. may buy lunch for 80 cents, 5 th. thru 12 th. may buy lunch for 85 cents. K thru 4 th. breakfast for 55 cents, 5 th. thru 12 th. breakfast for 60 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at .35 for lunch and .25 for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain complete information on household members and income cannot be used by the school. If information is missing, your child will be denied the meal benefits. Call your school if you need help with the form.

ELECTIONS UPDATE

All Texans not currently registered to vote must do so by October 3, 1982, in order to vote in the November 2nd general election. To be eligible to vote, potential voters must be a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the election, a resident of the county or political subdivision conducting the election, and registered to vote. Young Texans may register to vote if they are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but may not vote until they reach 18 years of age. To register to vote, Texans should complete a postage-paid voter registration application and mail it or present the card in person to the voter registrar in their county.

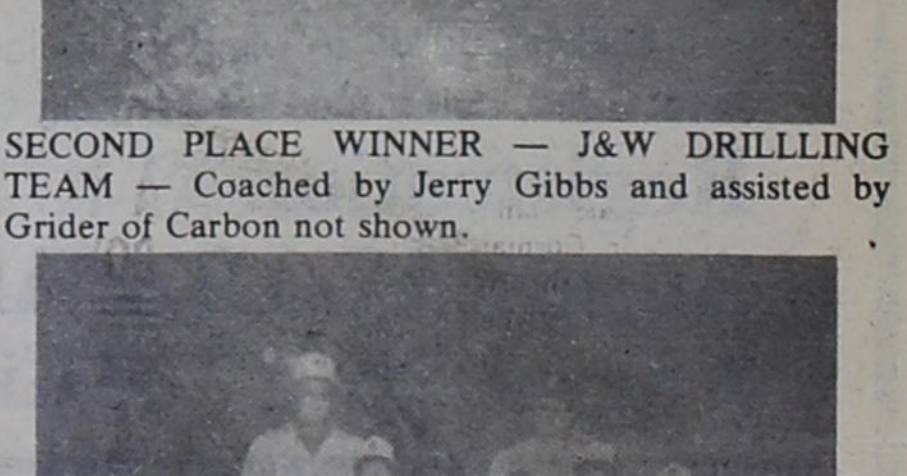

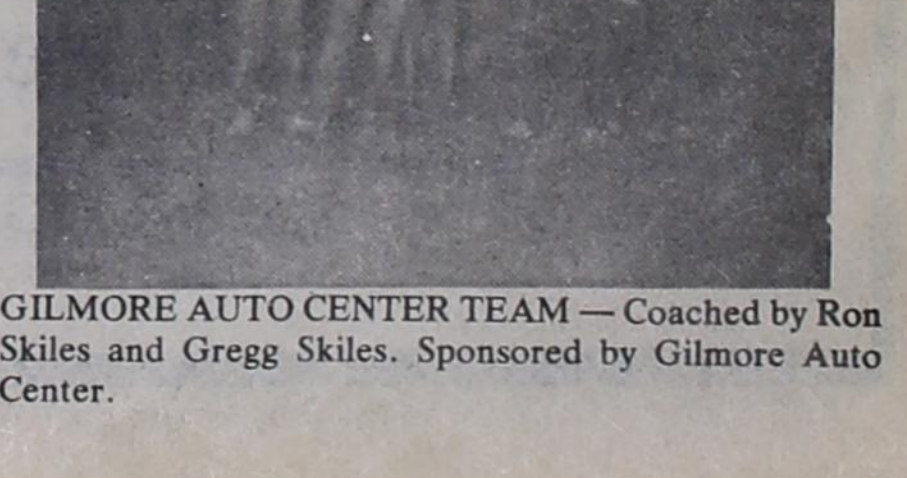
