If you share our concern for the welfare of our children and for our community, please contact one or more of these persons, and they will tell you how you can help.

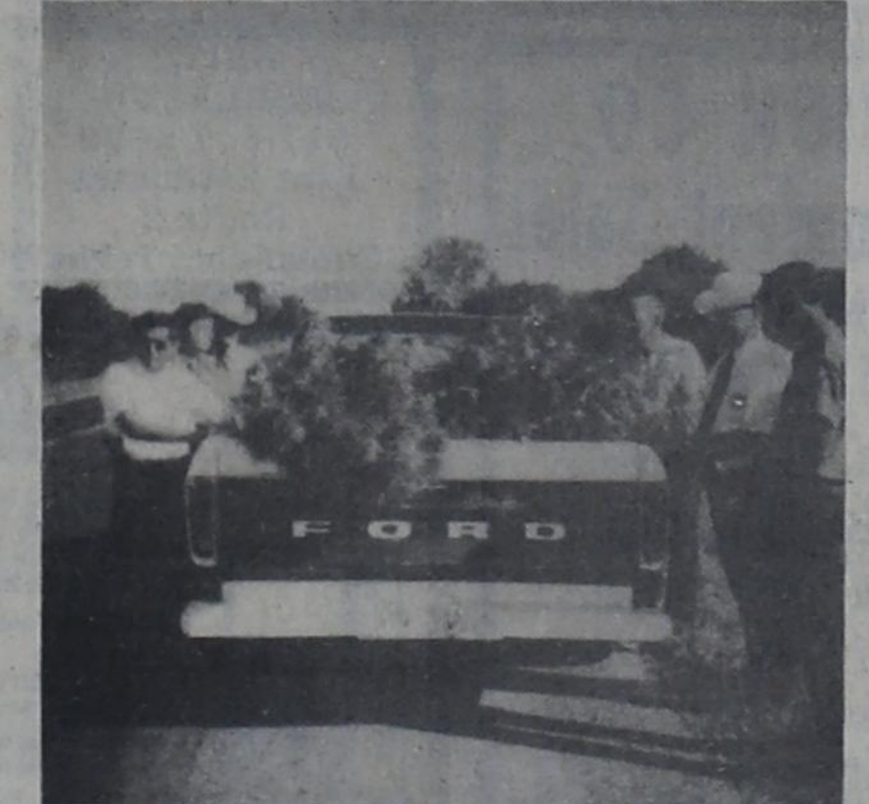

The plants, 8 to 9 feet tall, filled the back of a pickup truck after being pulled up, and had an estimated street value of over \$11,000.00.

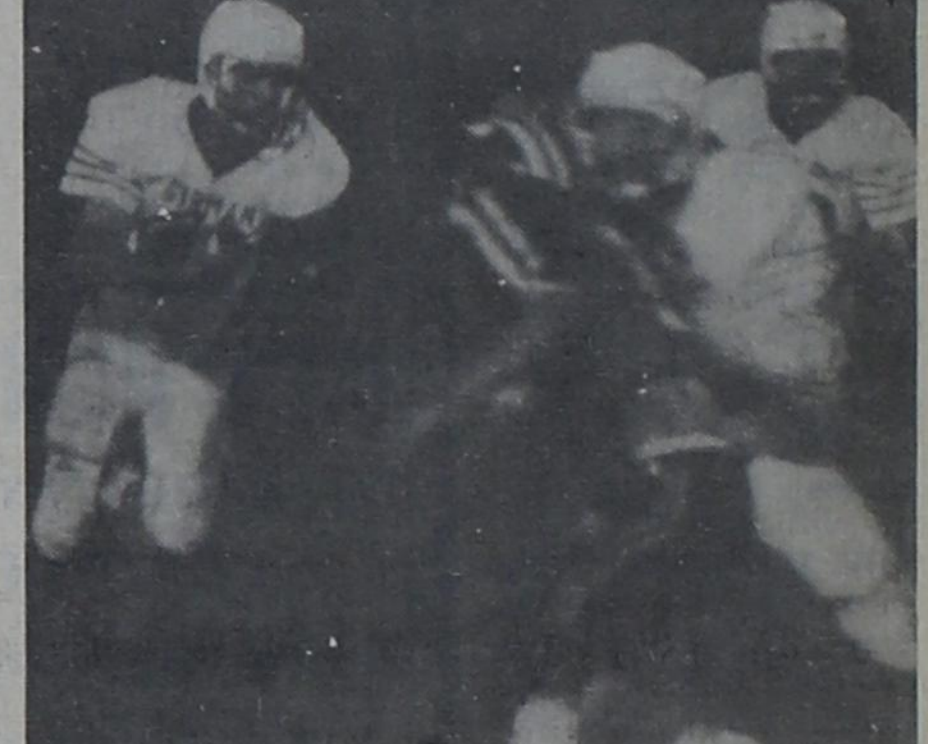

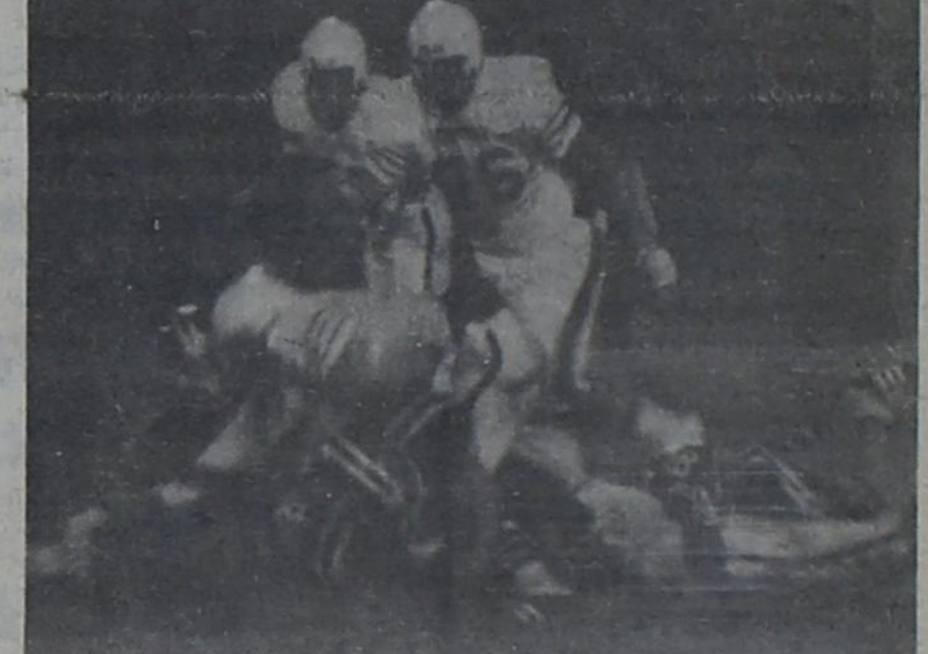

**CITY
CHIT CHAT**

The City Commission met on Thursday, September 16 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Also present was Mrs. Brinegar and Mr. Steve Thomas, Chief Appraiser for the Eastland County Appraisal Board.

The main item on the agenda was to set the tax rate for 1982. Mr. Thomas explained the options we had on setting the rate and how long it would take if we raised the rate to the point that the money we collected would exceed collectible amount of taxes for 1981 by more than 3%. Had we decided to go above 3% it would have been the last of October or the first of November before we could have mailed out tax notices.

After hearing his explanation we decided that we would stay within the 3% allowed. The actual allowance was \$0.26377, but we dropped the last two digits and by a unanimous vote set the tax rate at \$0.263. This rate will bring in only \$1587 more than collected last year, which is not as much as we figured we would need.

Since the rate we set would not bring in as much money as we will need, we voted unanimously to discontinue the early payment discount. By doing this we will collect about \$1800 if early payments had been the same as last year. This will give us a total of \$3387 more money, which amounts to an overall 6.4% more than collected last year. This will be offset; however by the fact that we dropped all automobiles not used in business or trade from the tax roll.

I will try to give an example of what the increase and the dropping of the autos from the roll will do to a tax figure taken from the air. Suppose you have a house that was evaluated at \$20,000 and a car at \$2,000, using the tax rate of \$0.256 which rate would have given us the same amount of money that was collectible last year, your tax this year would have been \$56.32. Had you paid in October and received the 3% discount, you would have a discount of \$1.69. Your payment would have been \$54.63. Paying this year only on your home or real property on the same example you will be paying only on the \$20,000 at the new rate of \$0.263 which will be \$52.60 which is a saving of \$2.03 over your net payment with the car taxed and taking the discount. You can see that we have given you a break by going this way.

REMEMBER, some taxes will decrease and some will INCREASE. It will depend on how much your market value increased over last year. We did not set the value, we only set the rate on the total roll to give us the over all 3% increase in money collectible. A large number will pay less taxes this year than they paid last year.

**TEXAS EXTENSION
HOMEMAKERS TO MEET
IN EL PASO* SEPT. 14-16**

More than 800 members of the Texas Extension Homemakers Association from throughout Texas are expected to assemble in El Paso for the annual state convention of the association, Sept. 14-16. Attending from Eastland County are: Bessie Marie McCollum, Mary Louise Hearn, Alberta Sims and Dorothy Underwood.

"This will be the 56th annual meeting of the homemakers organization, and a blue ribbon program has been prepared," announces Mrs. Billie H. McCraw, pre-

sident of the 22,680-member group. McCraw is from Raymondville.

Conference sessions will be at the Convention Center. Registration will begin at 1 p.m. Sept. 14 and continue through that evening. Special activities for that afternoon and again the afternoon of Sept. 16 will be bus tours to Mexico, with emphasis on several historic cathedrals and a visit to a federally-sponsored shopping center in Juarez.

Among key speakers will be the Rev. Donald Anderson of San Antonio, who will discuss "A Total View of a Healthy American Family,"

**ENGINEERING SERVICES
CONTRACT FOR
RAILROAD
REHABILITATION**

The Railroad Commission has executed a contract with Harland Bartholomew and Associates, Inc. for engineering services in connection with the rehabilitation of 24.1 miles of railroad between Dublin and Gorman.

Bartholomew and Associates will prepare detailed engineering specifications and budget estimates for rehabilitation of the Texas Central Railroad, a short-line rail transportation company, to improve track and bridges.

Under the terms of a grant agreement with the Federal Railroad Administration, the federal government will pay 80 percent of the contract and the state, through the Railroad Commission, will pay 20 percent.

In Phase I, Bartholomew and Associates will inspect the existing Texas Central line, define contract con-

ditions and Kathryn Blissard, a Houston television personality, whose subject will be "How Important are You?"

The course will also include a feasibility study of computers by farmers and ranchers.

Tuition for the course will be \$75 and enrollment will be limited. The computer classes will be held in the workshop theatre of the Clyde H. Wells Fine Arts Center starting at 9 a.m. each day. 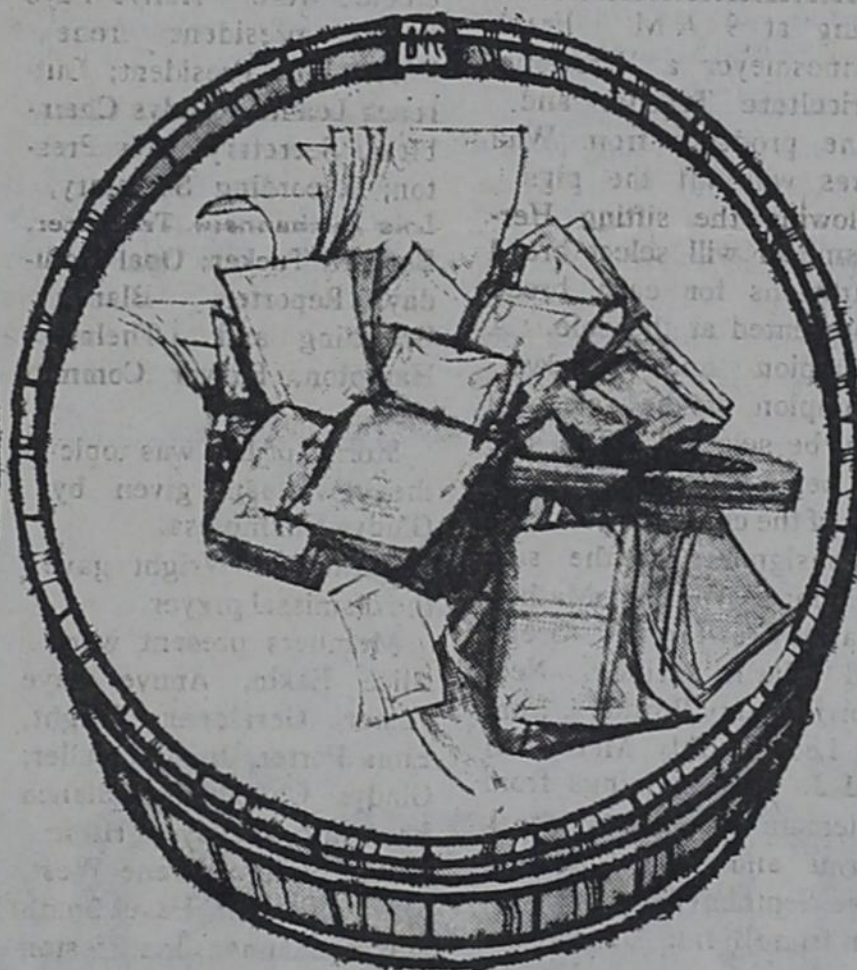
