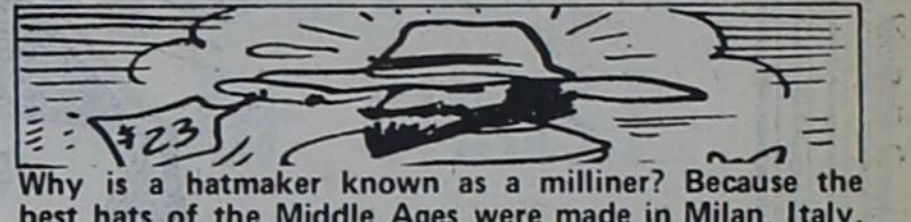

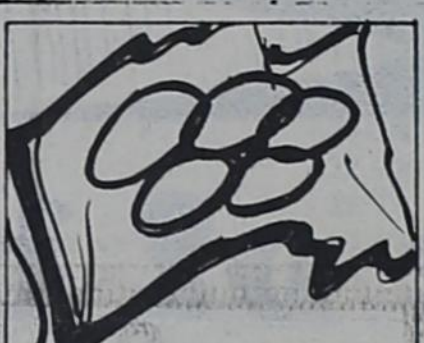

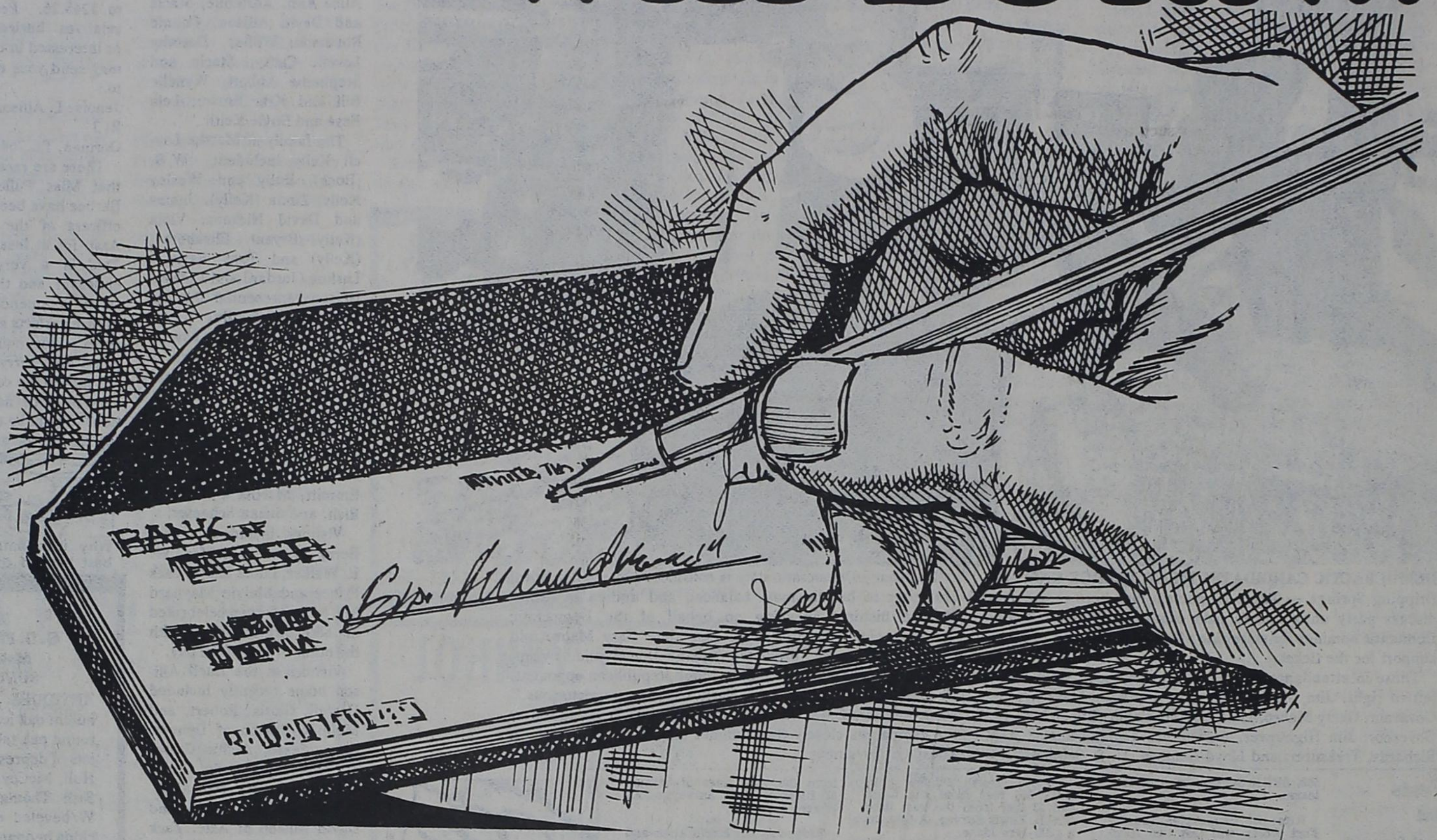

GORDON SPOT

With the abundant rains we have had in Eastland Co. in May and June, everything is green and growing fast. This includes weeds in crops and lawns.

Home lawn weed control can be very frustrating. Following a good maintenance program will help alot in building a dense turf that will discourage the invasion of weeds. On the other hand, a weak, thin turf will allow weed seed germination and establishment.

Once a weed is established, it can either be removed physically by digging or it can be removed chemically. Physical digging is fine if the weeds are few and if they do not have underground reproduction organs. The dallisgrass plant is a good example of just such a plant.

You can dig it up but the chances are it will just regrow from the underground parts that you don't get.

When considering chemical weed control, it might be well to remember that you are trying to remove an undesirable plant that is growing among desirable plants and many times it is not an easy task.

Generally, lawn weeds may be divided into two groups, those that have broad leaves such as chickweed, henbit, spurge, etc. and those that have grassy type leaves such as dallisgrass, crabgrass, goosegrass, etc.

Grassy type weeds may be controlled in bermuda grass lawns with either MSMA

Homemaking Hints

Examine the many aspects of today's new microwave-convection oven combinations on the market before making a buying decision.

Microwave-convection ovens are getting a lot of attention right now, as, ideally, they combine the speed and efficiency of microwave cooking with browning and crisping qualities of the convection oven.

HOW OVEN WORKS:

Microwave-convection ovens allow you to cook with microwaving OR convection (circulating hot air) OR a

(Monosodium methanearsonate) or DSMA (disodium methanearsonate). Several applications may be necessary and the bermuda may turn yellow, but it should recover. Grassy type weeds cannot be selectively controlled in a St. Augustine lawn. They may be removed by spot treating just the individual weed with either of the above chemicals or with glyphosate (trade name- Roundup or Kleenup).

Broadleaf weeds are usually controlled with products containing 2,4-D MCPP and dicamba. These chemicals are not safe for every lawn or for every situation. The only way to be sure is to check the label on the container. Be sure the chemical will control the weed you are after, is safe to use on the type of lawn you have and will not injure nearby ornamental plants.

For best results, apply the herbicide only when the weeds are actively growing. The hardest time to kill a weed is when it is hot and dry and the weed is under moisture stress. Try to pick a cooler day with little wind movement and when soil moisture levels are fairly high.

Always follow the directions on the label.

These ovens have both power levels and temperature settings.

Some will heat up to 450 degrees F., while others will heat no higher than 300 degrees F.

Convection cooking allows food to be cooked at lower temperatures than you would normally need for conventional cooking.

CHECK FOR ROOMINESS:

Combination ovens look very much like microwave ovens, except they're larger and they must be vented for release of hot air. This requires substantial counter space.

USDA ADJUSTS INCOME GUIDELINES FOR SCHOOL MEAL BENEFITS

The maximum income a family can earn and still have their children qualify for free or reduced price school meals will go up 10 percent on July 1.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary Jarratt said the change is a result of the annual cost-of-living adjustment made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to help people keep up with inflation.

Under the adjustment, the income limit for free meal eligibility, which is set by Congress at 130 percent of the federal poverty line, will go from \$10,990 to \$12,090 for a family of four.

Railroad Commission GORMAN PROGRESS, JULY 8, 1982

To Proceed With UPS Hearing

The Railroad Commission this week directed its Transportation Division to begin hearings on the application of United Parcel Service for authority to transport packages from point to point within Texas. Specific dates for the hearings have not yet been set.

The Commission took no action on several motions filed at a pre-hearing conference February 25, and restated in oral arguments before the Commission May 3, by truck and bus companies which are protesting

the UPS application. One of the motions concerned whether or not the Commission has the authority to grant the certificate UPS requests. Protesting companies also asked the Commission to rule on the admissibility of some types of evidence that may be presented at the hearing and whether or not testimony of witnesses must be written and filed in advance of their appearance.

The Commission's Transportation Division had originally planned to begin the UPS hearings May 11. They were postponed after parties in the case asked to present oral arguments to the Railroad Commissioners on the prehearings motions.

United Parcel Service will be the first to present evidence when the hearings start. Earlier, UPS told the Commission it would need eight weeks to present the testimony of some 300 witnesses.

The first two weeks of testimony will be given in Austin by UPS personnel and public witnesses who live in the area. The hearings will then move to Dallas where the remaining testimony on behalf of the UPS application will be heard. UPS said that Dallas transportation facilities and accommodations make it the most convenient location for many of the witnesses scheduled to testify. Truck and bus companies who oppose the UPS application will present their evidence following UPS.

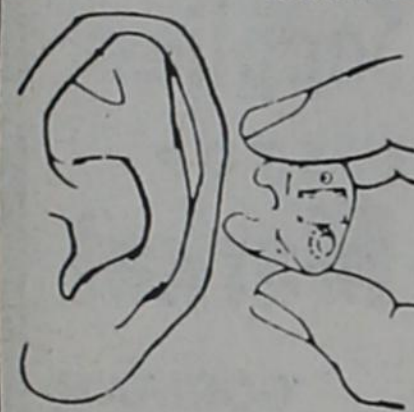

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective July 27, 1982, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

Notice to El Paso Area Customers

Effective January 1, 1982, Southwestern Bell adopted the Mountain States tariffs in effect for El Paso County. Southwestern Bell proposes to merge the separate El Paso tariffs with its tariffs applicable to the rest of Texas. The resulting new rate schedule is on file with the PUC and the El Paso area municipalities served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection at our El Paso business office.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide interexchange private line and foreign exchange service in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell's tariffs. While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in long distance rates, any change in those rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies.

"MEMORIES"

Hi! Happy Birthday, 206th of these United States and we hope and pray for many more to come. What a shame and disgrace for so many that are in College and refusing to Register for the Draft. In my opinion they should be expelled from school immediately. We should not be forced to pay taxes for their education.

Last Thursday night the nurse on duty came to my room and awoke me and told me the County Judge Scott Bailey wanted to see me. He had a certificate to give me from the county honoring all living WWI vets. He had a list of 22 still living in the county.

This brings back to memory the close of school at Triumph in May, 1917. It so happened that Carl Butler, Coin White and I were all three there that night from

schools that we had just finished teaching. We had attended school as youngsters together. The teacher there wanted each of us to say a few words. The draft was what they talked about.

This was in May and they were to register June 5, 1917. (Onnie was to be there that night, so I waited outside in the dark. Her sister, Dessie, was about same size, 115 pounds. She was the mother of Lester the Radio Man on Flat Top that sent Doolittle to bomb Tokyo. I caught her arm and told her I had promised to see her some 6 months ago. She said something. I turned her loose just like a hot potato. Changed partners after a big laugh).

Coin and Carl's dad had land and money. So they had gone to college. Dad was a renter and or the saying

goes, as poor as jobs turkey. So I had to get my certification the hard way.

They claimed that 17 was all that would have to go from Eastland Co. When I arose to say my few words, I said, "I will challenge you two, we will go to Draft Board in Eastland tomorrow or next week and volunteer. I am too young to Register!" They would not anti up. Tho they Registered and served. I volunteered.

I told them that as sure as you see the Sun in the East in the morning and it disappears in the west at night fall you will see 17 and hundreds of others go from this county. If you are in the Court House at Eastland you can see a Bronze Plaque, I would say 20 feet by 3 feet and a Star by the names of those that gave their "All On the Altar that Freedom". So just remember Freedom costs, "Sweat, Tears, Suffering and Death". General Pershing went to Marquie Lafayette's grave, and said "Lafayette we have come to repay our debt to you."
